

MARINES SOUNDLY
SLAY GERMAN HORDES

"Sea Soldiers" Smash Ahead
in Irresistible Style and Ad-
vance Is Unchecked.

BOYS KILL MANY GERMANS

Americans Dash Into Prussian Baby
Butchers and Do Brutal Work
With Bayonets and Bombs.
Treachorous Prisoners Shot.

(By the Associated Press.)
WITH THE AMERICAN FORCES ON
THE MARNE June 7, American
marines last night reached the out-
skirts of Bouresches, northwest of
Chateau Thierry and poured volleys of
machine gun fire into the enemy, in-
flicting terrific casualties. Bayonets
were used freely against many of the
Germans who attempted to make a
stand in the streets. At daybreak to-
day, the marines were slowly driving
the Germans back in the face of heavy
artillery fire, including gas shells.

The American artillery was perform-
ing magnificently in this operation.
Strong Positions Gained.
The marines in their forward sweep
yesterday took strong ground on either
side of Belleau Wood and cleaned out
the ravine south of Torcy, which linked
up the line with Hill 142, which was
taken earlier in the day. This gave
them a strong and dominating posi-
tion for a continuation of their attack.
Their total advance was approximately
two miles on a three-mile front.

The total number of prisoners taken
was not known this evening, but ad-
ditional captives were brought in
during the morning attack, which netted
about 100 prisoners.

A notable development was the low
morale of the prisoners, all of whom
are Prussians. They expressed them-
selves as tired of the war and glad
to get out of the fighting. This was de-
spite the fact, they say, that they were
furnished with food, although the Sax-
ons, Wurttemberg troops and others
may go without.

Huns Outfought by Yanks.

It must not be imagined, however,
that they did not put up a fight, for
their officers were among them, urging
them on. But the marines dashed into
them yelling like Indians and plying
bayonet and rifle. One marine who
was taking back a prisoner ran into
two German officers, who tried to stop
him. He tackled them singlehanded with
his rifle and bayonet, killed both the offi-
cers and wounded seven of the men.
Another sergeant was about to take
a prisoner when the German threw
himself on the ground and discharged
his revolver at the American after call-
ing him "coward." That settled the
German, for the sergeant shot him, as
he did four others who also had sur-
rendered, but refused to put up their
hands.

Trenches Are Incomplete.

The trenches the marines passed over
were clearly visible from below, but
they hardly served as a name for them,
they were simply lines of little holes,
each big enough to hold a man, while
the rear waves were equipped with au-
tomatic rifles. The front squads
of machine-guns jugging their col-
apsible guns. They crossed the open
space and topped up the slope bent over
like a hump.

Yanks Keep Going.

The battle was continued today, and
the Americans stormed their way to
Belleau, west of Chateau Thierry.
Between the Ourcq and the Marne
rivers the French today continued their
local operations and captured
Veully-la-Poterie. Progress also was
made toward the village of Bussaires.
Ground again was gained by the
French north of the Clignin River,
where the town of Villy fell into their
hands. The grove lying east of the
station of Veully-la-Poterie was taken
early today and enabled the French
to debouch from it when they swept
into the town.

Hill 204 Is Captured.

The French last night captured hill
204 by a spirited attack, while betw-
een the Marne and Rheims British
troops regained the village of Bligny,
inflicting heavy losses on the Ger-
mans.

LONDON, June 7.—The French

again have operated successfully
against the Germans near Loere, on
the Kemmel sector, southwest of
Ypres, according to the British offi-
cial communication issued this evening.

WITH THE FRENCH ARMY IN

FRANCE, June 7. — (By the Associ-
ated Press.) — The Germans, it is
generally believed, are now held at
every point of their recent advance.
They seem unable to execute more
than minor attacks, which are in-
variably repulsed, whereas the coun-
ter attacks which the allies are making
are proving notably successful, nearly
always bringing about an improve-
ment in positions.

Hun Artillery Active.

Throughout the daytime yesterday,
except in the sector northwest of
Chateau Thierry, where the French
and Americans made their brilliant
incursion into the enemy lines, and on
the Champlatt-Bligny line, southwest
of Rheims, where the French and
British co-operated in opposing a Ger-
man attack, there was little activity
along the battle line by the infantry.

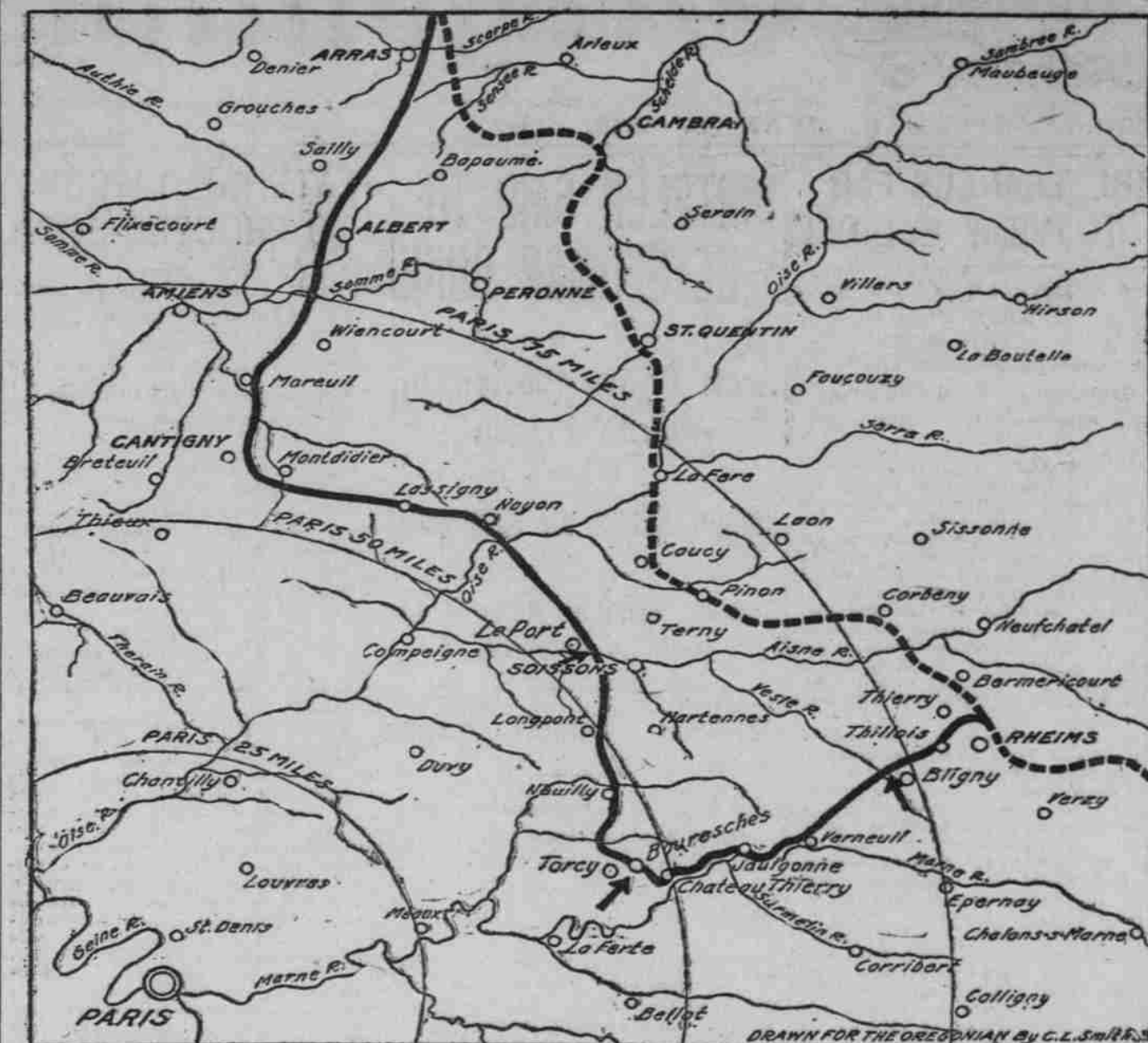
As for the artillery, the enemy has

increased his volume during the
last few days, but he confined his
attention chiefly to bombing the rear
of the allied positions. In return the
allied cannon left the enemy positions
very little peace, constant showers of
shells being thrown in.

Americans Show Initiative.

Whenever the Americans were en-
gaged they gave fresh proof of their

swept forward once more. The Ameri-

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7 CALLED TRAITORS

Alleged Sinn Fein Operators
Indicted at New York.

TWO GERMANS INVOLVED

Jeremiah O'Leary, One of Those Ac-
cused of Treason, Is Fugitive.

PEAS OF NOT GUILTY ARE
MADE BY FOUR.

NEW YORK, June 7.—Five American
citizens and two subjects of the Ger-
man empire, one of them a woman, are
named as fellow-conspirators in two
indictments handed down by a Federal
grand jury here today.

Investigators declared their opera-
tions the most sensational undertaken
by German spies, docks and troop trans-
ports with fire bombs; destruction of
quicksilver mines in this country to
hamper the manufacture of munitions;
assisting Germany in landing an
armed expedition in Ireland; fomenting
of a revolt against British rule in
Ireland; raising of funds in this coun-
try with which to finance these opera-
tions, and destruction of munitions fac-
tories and mines in Great Britain, are
charged as ramifications of the in-
trigue.

Broad Scope Suggested.

The wording of the indictments in-
dicates that the conspiracy may be of
even broader scope. This is suggested
by a paragraph in the treason indict-
ment, which alleges that in July, last
year, one of the defendants sent a ca-
blegram to Olen, Switzerland.

The principals named in the alleged
plots are:
Jeremiah O'Leary, prominent Sinn
Fein leader, fugitive from justice on
charges of espionage act violation
through distribution of alleged anti-
draft literature in the magazine Bull,
of which he was formerly editor.

Madame Maria K. de Victoria, alias
Baroness von Kroschman, a blonde-
haired German, fugitive from justice on
appearance and about 40 years of age.
Carl Rodiger, who claims Swiss citi-
zenship, but who is alleged to have
come to this country from Germany
under a fraudulent passport.

Willard J. Robinson, of New York,
aged 35, and under suspended sentence
for seditious "soapbox" here in
behalf of Sinn Fein interests.

John T. Ryan, a Buffalo (N. Y.) at-
torney, alleged to have been active in
spreading Sinn Fein propaganda in
this country.

Albert Paul Fricke, a Mount Vernon
(N. Y.) toy manufacturer, who says his
affairs are now being administered by
Allen Property Custodian Palmer.

Emil Kipper, prominently identified
with Sinn Fein activities in New
York City.

Two Defendants Dead.
Rudolph Binder and Hugo Schwell-
er, both of whom died last year, are
the other two "citizen defendants"
named in the indictments.

The seven individuals listed are
charged with complicity in both con-
spiracies.

"Madame" de Victoria, Rodiger,
Robinson, Fricke and Kipper pleaded
"not guilty" to both indictments be-
fore Judge Augustus N. Hand, and
were remanded to the Tombs to await
trial later today.

O'Leary now wanted on three
charges, and Ryan have not been ap-
prehended.

WASHINGTON, June 7.—All alien an-
archists in the United States will be
rounded up for immediate deportation
under a bill favorably reported to the
House today by the immigration com-
mittee. Present laws forbid their de-
portation if they have been here for
five years.

KREUZ ZEITUNG BACKS UP
Berlin Paper Repudiates Peace Of-
fensive Article.
AMSTERDAM, June 7.—The Kreuz
Zeitung of Berlin, referring to an ar-

ticle which appeared in its columns
and which was the signal for a peace
offensive in the German press, says
that the article was written by a col-
laborator and the newspaper does not
agree with him in thinking that the
time has come for a political offen-
sive.
It declares that when the time comes
for announcing war aims, the form
must be such that no doubt can exist
among Germany's enemies regarding
her consciousness of power.
The Berliner Tageblatt expresses the
opinion that the Kreuz Zeitung has
received orders from the Conservative
party leaders, or elsewhere, to drop the
announced peace offensive.
