FRENCH TAKE 1400

Washington Encouraged as
Result of Poilus' Stand.

HUN SLAUGHTER IS LARGE

Powerful Counter-Attacks Attempted
by Germans on French Left
Break Down Under Allied Fire
With Terrible Losses.

WASHINGTON, June 13.—Results of the fierce fighting between the Poilus and the Oise are viewed with general satisfaction in France, says an official dispatch today from Paris. The situation on the left is regarded as particularly encouraging, the dispatch noting that the powerful German counter attacks against positions won by the French have been unsuccessful. Fourteen hundred prisoners from four divisions, several cannon and numerous machine guns were taken.

"On the left the Germans launched powerful counter attacks in order to retake the ground won by the French troops," says the dispatch. "But they only succeeded in aggravating their losses, already very heavy, which they suffered during the day. A total of 1400 prisoners belonging to more than four different divisions remained in the hands of the French at the end of this brilliant affair, as well as several cannon and numerous machine guns."

"On the center the enemy vainly tried to throw back the French troops on the Aisne, but he broke himself against an invincible resistance."

"On the right, after a whole series of fruitless and costly assaults, he succeeded in getting a foothold on the south bank of the Matz."

"Between the Oise and the Aisne the French troops fell back to the south of the forest of Carpent. The Germans only perceived this falling back 24 hours afterward. Suffice it to say that it was carried out without the slightest difficulty. The right spread itself out to the south of the Aisne. The Germans attacked between the river and the angle north of the forest of Villers Cotterets in order to threaten Compiègne on the flank. The most violent struggles took place throughout the day."

"The Germans only obtained a slight progress on the plateau west of Domiers without being able to take either Ambly or Saint Pierre Aigle. Thus on the whole of this front the enemy has been entirely held. Besides, his offensive tendencies are being considerably blunted."

"Hecatombs that he has suffered are beginning to take effect."

BODY MAY BE EXPLORER'S

Disappearance of Frank Meyer Recalled by Find Near Wuhu.

PEKIN, Monday, June 10.—A body resembling that of Frank N. Meyer, an explorer for the American Department of Agriculture, who disappeared from a steamer on the Yang Tze Kiang River, between Kiching and Wuhu, has been found near the latter city.

There were no indications as to the cause of death.

INSTRUCTOR IS OUSTED

California Professor's Attitude Toward War Unsatisfactory.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 13.—(Special.)—Professor H. J. Weber was dismissed from the staff of the University of California at the meeting of the board of regents in San Francisco and at the same time action was taken eliminating the buildings of the state institution to meetings where the proceeds will go into war benefit funds. Thus, at one stroke, the faculty was rid of an instructor who has been declared guilty of a "general unsatisfactory attitude toward the war" and the fine college structures were enlisted to do their share toward winning the struggle.

Professor Weber was first suspended by the advisory committee some time ago. The suspension was approved by the regents and his dismissal was then ordered.

CAMP VACANCY IS FILLED

FIFTY FIRES RAGING

Lightning Starts California
Forests Blazing.

SEVERAL COUNTIES SWEEP

Situation Better in Idaho and Montana—Incendiarism Suspected and One Arrest Said to Have Been Made.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 13.—A serious outbreak of forest fires in Northern California was caused by the electrical storm that swept the northern part of the state yesterday.

Between 50 and 100 fires of various magnitudes are raging in the National Forests and other portions of Tuolumne, El Dorado, Lassen, Trinity and Shasta counties, according to reports reaching Acting District Forester Roy Headley here today.

MISSOULA, Mont., June 13.—The forest fire situation in Western Montana and Northern Idaho, District No. 1 of the United States Forestry Service, was improved today at all points.

Forest service officials said today that they think many of the fires are incendiary. According to a report received at headquarters here, one man was arrested in the St. Joe region in Idaho, and more arrests, it is expected, will follow.

The substitution of coal for bill in the logging engines in the woods is held by some lumbermen to have been responsible for some of the fires.

HELENA, Mont., June 13.—Governor Sam V. Stewart today issued a proclamation urging the people not to enter the forests unless it is absolutely necessary and to exercise the greatest care to avoid starting fires, if they must go in.

At a meeting of the state land board today State Forester J. C. Vanhook was ordered to Lincoln and Flathead counties to take charge of the fires there.

LIGHTNING BELIEVED CAUSE

Second Fire Now Burning in Santiam National Forest.

ALBANY, Or., June 13.—(Special.)—

A new forest fire was reported to the headquarters of the Santiam National Forest in this city today. It is burning east of Independence Prairie, near Bingham Basin, about 20 miles east and a little south of Detroit. It is a little north of Marion Lake, a well-known Summer resort.

C. C. Hall, supervisor of the Santiam National Forest, has sent in a crew of men to fight it. Very little definite information regarding the fire has been received, except that it is yet a small fire. It is presumed that this fire probably started as a result of a storm in that section of the mountains several days ago. It is probable that lightning struck some old snag and the fire has been smoldering along for several days until it began to spread. Forest officials believe that since it was discovered before it obtained much headway it can be controlled.

This is the second fire now burning in the Santiam National Forest. The other is burning near the Pyramids, at the headwaters of the middle fork of the South Santiam River. A crew of men has been in there for two days and while no definite word has been received, it is thought this fire can be controlled also. This latter fire is in an old burn.
