America's simplest duty—to send
food to the war sufferers within the
entire world—is being made a reality
by the action of the Belgian and
Northern France and to the soldiers
who are risking all for humanity—is
brought home to the people of Oregon
in the ringing message of Mrs. Vernon
Kellogg who for them and which she
will deliver today at 3 o'clock in the
Heilig Theater, where she will speak
under the auspices of the United States
Food Administration.

Because Mrs. Kellogg has been in Belgium so recently, because she was the only woman member of the Belgian Food Commission and because she has the interests of the people there so keenly at heart, she knows no too much of what she speaks, she can give to this country a story, an appeal and an opportunity for helpfulness such as is seldom given.

Spirit Still Unbroken.
She calls the sufferers in the devastated regions of Northern France and Belgium "a people who are fighting a day against indescribable odds, with a spirit unbroken, a people who know the sublimity of victory," and she can tell why she can know no too much of what she speaks, she can give to this country a story, an appeal and an opportunity for helpfulness such as is seldom given.

America's Duty Pointed Out.
"But—and here is America's duty, standing out in letters of fire—these people hold out their hands to us and ask for help. They are asking for ammunition they can use—food, wheat, fish, sugar. To do this America is asked by the Food Administration to produce self-denial. Is that much to ask?"

Mrs. Kellogg says that the sustaining spirit of sisterhood and brotherhood in the world today is keeping the people alive. Suffering she says is a democratizing force that makes princesses and telephone girls work shoulder to shoulder right on the same basis, each finding out that the other is sisterly and their mutual understanding is making them understand what the sufferers from war are feeling and the principles for which the soldiers are ready to die.

Message Brought Stirring.
This, in brief, is a glimpse of the vision she will give to her hearers at the mass meeting today at the Heilig. Mrs. Kellogg is the wife of Professor Vernon Kellogg, formerly of Stanford University and later a member of the Belgian Commission, who was in Europe for nearly two years before his wife went to help as a member of the commission. She is a woman of distinguished appearance, kindly, womanly, one whose message is stirring up the country what she has to go. She enjoys working with the food administration, she says, because it is worth while, practical and a great factor in helping along the cause of world democracy.

MUCH FLOUR IS RETURNED

Patriotic Americans Surrender 5390
Barrels First Week.

SALEM, Or., June 13.—(Special.)—In effect little more than a week this system of flour return by patriotic Americans totals 5390 barrels, announced Mrs. Vernon Kellogg, representative of the Food Administration, in her address here tonight.

Mrs. Kellogg stated that the figures represented the flour returned to the Government through the Grain Corporation, up to June 13, which was 5390.35 had been paid to the citizens who relinquished it as food for our allies.

PARIS, June 13.—The War Office communication today follows:
"During the course of the day the Germans launched a powerful counter-attack from Courcelles to the north of Mery (Montdidier sector). Caught under the fire of our guns, the assaulting troops were obliged to reach our positions, but were obliged to retreat to their line of departure after having suffered very heavy losses."

"On June 12 our bombing planes

dropped in the battle zone 16 tons of projectiles and 25 tons last night on cantonments, convoys and marching troops behind the enemy front, and bombarded, as well, the villages of Reims, Matz, Riquebourg and the region of Hoya and Guignicourt. Several fires were observed. The same day seven enemy airplanes were brought down and nine were put out of action."

"In the first week of June 13 enemy planes were brought down by anti-aircraft guns."

"Early theater, June 13.—The operations on Mount Kaza and Lens were continued with success. We have occupied 11 villages and the number of prisoners taken is 319."

PORTLAND MAN WINS BRITISH MILITARY CROSS.

Lieutenant A. A. Grossman, son of Mrs. Tillie Grossman, Norton Hotel, has won the British military cross for gallantry and devotion to duty while serving last November in the fighting at Cambrai as an officer in the Medical Reserve Corps of the United States Army. News of his honor has just been transmitted to Portland.

Lieutenant Grossman is attending at 624 Battalion, Machine Gun Corps, and has been nine months in France. He was a member of the West Riding Division of the British Expeditionary Force at Portland Academy, the University of Oregon Medical School and Philadelphia. Lieutenant Grossman was the first man in his division to win the military cross.

war report. Heavy casualties were inflicted upon the enemy. One hostile machine gun was brought back to our lines and two others were destroyed. "On the British front we lost two machines and destroyed five German machines. Two other hostile machines were driven down out of control, while the principal targets attacked being the Don Junction, railways at Courtaul, Armentieres and Chaulnes, a dump at Bapaume and the Bruges docks."

Yesterday two successful raids were carried out by our squadrons against the Metz Sablon railway station and sidings. Many heavy bombs were dropped. On Thursday one squadron of our airplanes attacked the station at Treves, another dropped a ton of bombs on factories and the station at Dillingen. At the same time factories and the station at Hagendangen were subjected to an attack. At Dillingen direct hits were observed on two furnaces. Successful long-distance photographic reconnaissance were carried out by other machines."

ANGER ZONE SOON TO BE DECLARED

Kaiser Will Specify Waters
Off East Coast of U. S. From
Mexico to Canada.

NEUTRALS TO BE WARNED

Official Washington Inclined to Regard Report of Teuton Naval Warfare Intentions as Grim Bit of Humor.

LONDON, June 13.—The German Admiralty intends to declare the eastern coast of the United States from Mexico to Canadian waters a danger zone and will warn neutral shipping, says a dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph from Amsterdam, quoting reports received from Berlin.

WASHINGTON, June 13.—In view of what has been happening during the last few weeks, officials here tonight were inclined to regard as a bit of grim humor the report from Berlin, via Holland, that the German government is about to declare the Eastern American coast a danger zone and to warn neutral shipping of its purpose.

Raiding submarines have already served warning of the danger in more forceful terms than Berlin could formulate in a diplomatic communication. Several of the 14 vessels sunk by the raiders were neutrals, carrying no war supplies. Neutral governments are not likely to have overlooked that fact, warning or no warning.

It is recognized, however, that the forthcoming "warning" may prove to be a formal announcement of a zone in American waters where ruthless sinking of all ships is to be the order of the day, forecasting a continuing menace off Atlantic ports through regular submarine patrols.

Officials here have been fully awake to the fact that such patrols could be maintained if the German authorities thought the results obtainable justified the diverting of a large number of boats from operations off the French and British coasts. It has been figured out that by starting a new raid or flotilla of raiders every five days, one could keep the German fleet busy in the Atlantic, always would be on duty in American waters.

Such operations would mean that for every boat actively engaged on this side there would be several on the way over and several more on the way back to Germany, none of which would have any substantial value while en route in either direction.

On this account many officials have discounted the patrol idea, believing that much better results from the German viewpoint would be obtainable by using the same number of boats where they are now used, in the North Sea or adjacent waters.

RESCUE WORK COMMENDED

Commander of Steamer Roosevelt

Receives Official Message.

WASHINGTON, June 13.—Commendation of Commander Hans Blerd and the crew of the steamer Roosevelt for saving 707 persons and the ice-bound Alaskan merchant fleet in Bering Sea was telegraphed to Commander Blerd today by Fisheries Commissioner H. M. Smith.

A brief report on the Roosevelt work said the Roosevelt was forced to cut its way at times through 16 feet of ice. When forced by the ice to tow and to open water, the ship St. Nicholas was being crushed by the ice and would have been a total loss in 12 hours.

There were 300 persons on board, including 115 from the steamer Tacoma, which was sunk. Twenty-one other persons from the Tacoma who had taken refuge on the ice were picked up by the Roosevelt.

The Centennial, with 160 persons, and the Star of Chile, with 250, also were taken to safety.

FRENCH PRESIDENT APPRECIATES

HELP OF UNITED STATES.

Telegram to President Wilson Expresses Admiration for War Effort Made by United States.

PARIS, June 13.—On the anniversary of the arrival in France of the first American troops, President Poincaré has telegraphed to President Wilson an expression of the admiration of France for the magnificent effort put forth by America, and felicitations over the conduct of the troops who are commencing to give on the field of battle examples of their gallantry and bravery.

In his message, President Poincaré said:
"The allies, owing to the Russian capitulation, are living through the most difficult hours of the war, but the rapid formation of new American units and the uninterrupted increase in their numbers are leading us with certainty towards the day when the equilibrium is restored."

President Poincaré also sent a message to General Pershing, heartily praising "the gallant troops of your command who behaved so magnificently in the recent battles."

The President expresses the firmest hope in the continuation of the American successes.

BOCHE GAS SURPASSED

ALLIED WARFARE SAID TO EXCEL

KAISER'S WORST.

Senate Committee Is Informed That U. S. Is Making Great Strides in Developing Military Aids.

WASHINGTON, June 13.—The allies now excel the Germans in gas warfare, Carl L. Alsberg, chief of the bureau of chemistry, told the Senate agriculture committee today. They not only have more gas at their disposal and are applying it more effectively than the Germans, he said, but in defensive warfare they have more improved gas masks.

Senator Hitchcock, chairman of the sub-committee, said the testimony showed that extensive experiments are being conducted by the War Department in the development of gas for military purposes, and that it will be produced on a quantity basis within a short time.

The recent German offensive demonstrated to the War Department, it was said, the increasing importance of the use of gas and spurred the department to renewed activity in developing gas warfare.

Practically all the testimony was of a highly confidential nature and was given to the sub-committee behind closed doors.

Funeral of Roswell B. Jordan Held

at Home Church.

ALBANY, Or., June 13.—(Special.)—The funeral of Roswell Bryan Jordan, who died yesterday at his home near this city at the age of 68 years, was held this afternoon at the Central Christian Church about eight miles east of Albany. The funeral service was conducted by Rev. D. Lloyd Morgan, pastor of the First Christian Church of this city.

Mr. Jordan had been a resident of Oregon for more than 20 years. He was born in Illinois in 1849, and spent the early years of his life in Illinois and Nebraska. He came to Oregon in 1871.
