

CHINA AT PARTING OF WAYS; HELP NEEDED

Note of Impending Danger to Ancient Nation is Sounded in America.

OPPORTUNITY KNOCKS NOW

Sherwood Eddy, Associate General Secretary of Y. M. C. A., Just Back From Far East, Gives Warning of Crisis at Hand.

Possibilities of increased trade with China ever have held interest for the prophets and seers of the business world. It remains for Sherwood Eddy, associate general secretary of the Y. M. C. A., who has been spending a day or so in Portland, to turn their fancy to a dream of prophetic China.

But he sounds a note on impending danger to that ancient nation—and a challenge to America to prove her friendship by espousing the cause of China in an hour of need.

Of course, Mr. Eddy said it merely by way of illustration, when he arrived in Portland yesterday after a recent landing at Vancouver, B. C., en route home from the Orient, and he conjured a plausible picture of uncounted millions of Chinese wielding fountain pens.

How Exports May Grow.

"If we could sell one good fountain pen to each person in China," he said with gravity, "our exports to that one country would be equal to our entire export trade at the beginning of the war."

It is to be presumed that Mr. Eddy knows whereof he speaks. For 20 years engaged in volunteer Y. M. C. A. work, he has spent much of that period in the Orient—an industrious crusader who defrayed the expenses of the cause from his own purse, and who left his own business in New York to look after itself.

There is a crisis in the Far East, warns the returned Y. M. C. A. official—one that we are apt to overlook in the interest of the world war. With 4000 years of history and 24 dynasties behind her, the oldest of nations is in grave and imminent danger of losing her independence.

Internal Warfare Hurts.

"While the Western nations are occupied by the war in Europe," said Mr. Eddy, "China has been divided by internal warfare between the north and south. Famine and flood, plague and poverty have swept her, and she is helpless plight, with none of the Western nations able to help her, she has been losing her priceless treasures of coal and iron and mortgaging her own future."

So serious is the situation, Mr. Eddy declared, that the "open door" for which America long has contended may be slammed in the faces of the nations, who are certain to be in need of the growing trade of the Far East when the war is terminated.

"There is more at stake in the Far East than we realize," he continued impressively. "The trade of the coast from Vladivostok to Singapore is already more than \$1,000,000,000 annually. The trade of China, India, India totals more than \$3,000,000,000, or a larger amount than the total exports of America before the war began. "If the standard of living in China rises to that of our own, it would add four Americas to the world's trade, and with the opening of the Panama

Canal and the nearness of our Western Coast, America and Japan would be the two countries most profited by the increase in trade.

China at Parting of Ways.

"China stands today at the parting of the ways. Her central government has become weak and divided and tied, helpless at the mercy of foreign powers. It is an easy opportunity, with the Western nations engaged in a life and death struggle on the western front, for any nation that would exploit China, seize her priceless treasures of iron and coal and mortgage her future by trying to close the open door of trade."

"It is an opportunity to exploit China for militarism and make the Far East a 'yellow peril' to the world. But it is also the golden opportunity for any nation that would befriend China and help her in her hour of need."

Traditionally, America has always stood as China's best friend. We have a large stake in China. Here are two sister republics, facing each other across the Pacific—China, with 400,000,000, and America, with 100,000,000. This great nation which has survived the rise and fall of all the old empires after 40 centuries of her ancient past, must have some great significance for the future.

Now is Time to Act.

"Now is the time, in the hour of China's need, to prove our friendship for this ancient nation, which has become our sister republic."

Prior to his recent visit to the Orient, Mr. Eddy was, for some time, engaged in Y. M. C. A. work in France, preparing for the advent of the American troops. He declined to discuss this phase of his work, in view of the fact that affairs have marched far forward since last he took an active part in them.

Mr. Eddy will speak at noon today at the "Y" auditorium to a group of Y. M. C. A. members and workers at a luncheon given in his honor. All reservations have been made for this occasion, though it is possible that a room may be found for a few more guests.

Mr. Eddy is accompanied by Mrs. Eddy. They leave tonight for Denver on their return to New York.

BONES TO BE EXAMINED

REMAINS EXHUMED NEAR UMATILLA DECLARED PREHISTORIC.

Mammoth or Mastodon Once Possessor of Tusk, Is Opinion of Dr. Harry B. Torrey, of Reed College.

Either a mammoth or a mastodon was once the living possessor of the bones exhumed near Umatilla, Or., last week, according to the result of an investigation by Dr. Harry B. Torrey, professor of biology at Reed College. Traces of these monster prehistoric creatures have been found in the Northwest, but the present specimen, removed from a gravel pit by a construction crew of the O. W. R. & N. Co., is, as far as records show, the first to be described in the Umatilla country.

At the request of Charles E. Cochran, of the railroad, the bones were delivered yesterday at Reed College, where further estimates will be made by qualified scientists, and in the meantime the railroad company has consented to leave any new discoveries in the ground, so that the relics can be carefully preserved by a representative of the college.

The first hint of the ancient remains came when the workmen excavated a bone or tusk about eight feet in length, apparently of ivory, which, as Dr. Torrey has said, has lost its hard quality through weathering. Unfortunately this valuable specimen was shattered in shipment, because of its extremely fragile nature. The fragments are pure white and crumble with chalk-like ease. The exterior surface of the bone, which is firmer than the center, shows the great forces of weathering it has undergone.
