TREASON WILL BE CHARGED

Trial of Brother of Man Run Down

WASHINGTON, June 17.—The capture of Jeremiah O'Leary, Irish-American leader, under indictment in New York, on a charge of conspiracy to obstruct justice for aiding the flight of his brother, James A. O'Leary, Sinn Fein leader, on the eve of his trial last month on charges of publishing anti-subscription articles.

NEW YORK, June 17.—Taking of testimony began in the Federal court here today in the trial of John J. O'Leary on charges of conspiracy to obstruct justice for aiding the flight of his brother, James A. O'Leary, Sinn Fein leader, on the eve of his trial last month on charges of publishing anti-subscription articles.

Flight Motive Traced.
Government counsel sought at the outset to establish a connection between Jeremiah O'Leary's flight and the spy and treason cases in which he was subsequently indicted with four Americans and two Germans, including Carl Rodiger, German naval officer.

John J. Haney, warden of Tombs prison, testified for the prosecution that William H. Daly, one of John J. O'Leary's lawyers in the present proceeding, had requested permission to mission to talk with Carl Rodiger, a former German naval officer accused in the spy and treason conspiracies, in three occasions immediately prior to Jeremiah O'Leary's escape on May 7.

The name of Madame de Victoria, the German woman indicted as a spy, entered the proceeding when Herbert F. Rosenbush, an apprentice seaman in the United States Navy and formerly employed in Jeremiah O'Leary's office, testified that last fall he was called by his employer and told to "bring the papers in the South American divorce case."

Rosenbush said it was his impression that O'Leary was representing Madame de Victoria in a divorce proceeding, but that the document he was directed to deliver did not have the appearance of a regular court petition.

Divorce Papers Possibly Code.
Further questioning of the witness seemed to strengthen the inference that "the South American divorce papers" was a code which O'Leary applied to some documents, the identity of which he refused to disclose.

Prosecutor Barnes brought out the fact that this conversation about the "divorce papers" occurred about the time the Government alleged known O'Leary had been active in Sinn Fein propaganda. A grand jury also was investigating O'Leary's alleged anti-subscription activities, it was shown.

Alexis O'Leary, a brother of the defendant, testified that "the whole family was opposed to Jeremiah's views as expressed in his magazine Bull, and had no sympathy for many activities in which he engaged."

There had been a breach between John and Jeremiah on this account, the witness declared, adding "they became good friends again only when Jeremiah got into trouble."

YOUNG RUSSIAN LEADS

Extra time was given that the defendant's counsel may have time to prepare an appeal.

Willis, of Mohawk; and Belinda G. Chase, of Salem, all widows of veterans of the Civil War, have been granted pensions of \$25 each.

CREST OF FLOOD PASSES

MUCH FLOUR TURNED BACK
Thursday Set as Last Day for Receiving Needed Product.

Monday brought another 1000 barrels of flour to the hands of the food administration officials for shipment to feed the men fighting the Huns, and also announcement that returns of flour in Oregon must end on Thursday of this week.

It will be impossible to handle returns of flour after June 19, it was announced at the office of W. B. Ayer, Oregon Food Administrator.

Parties wishing to give back white flour that it may be sent to France are urged to do so in the next two days. Dealers of the state must observe the "stop" order religiously, said Mr. Ayer.

PORTLAND NOT SHUT OUT
Merchants Will Have Same Opportunities to Sell to Army.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, June 17.—Senator Chamberlain today was assured by Assistant Quartermaster-General Duval that the establishment of a regional depot quartermaster purchasing office at San Francisco does not mean shutting out Portland on future Army purchases.

This is merely part of a general plan to divide the country into districts, San Francisco being headquarters for the entire Pacific Coast. Portland merchants will have the same opportunities now as before to sell to the Army.

Protests Must Be Filed.
OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, June 17.—Senator McNary, who today presented to the Railway Administration protests of Oregon farmers against the 25 per cent increase in freight rates, was told that farmers, as well as others desiring to protest against advanced rates, must file their protests with W. Robinson, chairman of the freight division, at Portland.

If Robinson is unable to grant relief, or deems it inadvisable, then shippers must file formal protest with the Interstate Commerce Commission at Washington.

Army Orders.

PORTLAND AGENT O'LEARY'S CAPTOR

"Thomas J. Corbitt," Purchaser of Little Poultry Farm, Was Arthur Lyon.

MR. HANEY TELLS STORY

Spectacular Arrest Due to Fact That
New York Fugitive Had Declared He Would Never
Be Taken Alive.

With Jeremiah A. O'Leary and his confederate, Arthur L. Lyon, far on their way to New York in custody of Federal agents, the lid of secrecy that covered details of their appearance in Portland and the spectacular arrest of O'Leary last Wednesday was tilted a bit yesterday by local authorities.

One of the big disclosures of the day was that "Thomas J. Corbitt," who served as efficiently as O'Leary's confederate and protector in Portland and across the river in Clarke County, where they decided to locate, was none other than Lyon, who was arrested last week at Tucson, Ariz.

Lyon, as dispatches have indicated, had served as confidential investigator for O'Leary in ferreting out facts and purported disclosures, given publicity in the magazine Bull, of which his chief was the publisher. His experience in sleuthing of this sort was doubtless of value to the watchfulness of the army of Federal agents bent on their capture.

Oregon Agents Given Cue.
Wide publicity given the fact that O'Leary and Lyon had been traced to St. Louis and were believed to be headed for "some point on the Coast" gave Oregon district Federal agents a clue which brought the fugitive propagandist into their clutches after days of clever search.

Little sooner had "John M. Wells," and "Thomas J. Corbitt" placed their names on the register of a Portland hotel than a special agent of the Department of Justice had the users of these aliases "spotted" as quite possibly the much-wanted Sinn Fein leader and his comrade. Suspicions quickly ripened into convictions that these were really the fugitives from justice, but the pair skillfully eluded the watchers.

There is unofficial intimation that a bank deposit of large size furnished one of the final convincing clues that "Wells" was O'Leary.

Federal representatives who staged the coup which brought O'Leary into the toils at the little chicken ranch across the river in Clarke County, near Sagar, Wash., admit that the pair were brought in by the narrowest of margins in completing arrests May 16, the date on which "Corbitt" completed purchase of the property from Thomas L. Sagar.

Motor Car Identified.
Good fortune intervened, and the purchase of the motor car by "Corbitt" May 18 came to have place in tracing the whereabouts of the men. The sleuths had a lead before they were able to spot the machine bearing Oregon license No. 246.

O'Leary possibly got the "hunch," and his aged ranch employee, Thomas F. Stine, certainly had it developed, though their car was under close scrutiny as they were in Ridgefield, Wash., making a purchase, not quite two weeks ago. From the time two men there displayed unusual interest in the machine and its number, vigilance out at the secluded poultry ranch had been redoubled.

There was no doubt that "hunch" it was that fateful trip to Ridgefield that brought about O'Leary's apprehension. The search for the machine and its user came to an end that day. There only remained the careful planning and staging of the capture.

To take O'Leary, who had now been deserted by his erstwhile "brother-in-law," was known to be a dangerous matter. It was feared that he would either "beat" one or more of the men who sought his arrest, or would take his own life rather than be captured. Of the latter possibility, he was known to have hinted.

Mr. Haney Makes Statement.
Except for the fact that the party included five civilians, chiefly ranchers picked up in the Sara community, the official statement issued yesterday by United States District Attorney Bert E. Haney, sets forth the method of the capture. Mr. Haney's statement is here given:

"Jeremiah O'Leary was taken into custody near Ridgefield, Wash., at about noon Wednesday, June 12, 1918, by W. B. Bryon, agent of the Department of Justice, attached to the office of the United States Attorney at Portland, Or."

"O'Leary is standing under two indictments in the District Court of the United States for the southern district of New York, and was, at the time of his arrest, a fugitive from justice. He had twice been in Portland within a few days prior to his arrest, once on May 16, when, under an assumed name he registered at one of the well-known hotels in this city and once between that date and the date of his arrest. On both occasions he narrowly escaped arrest."

"O'Leary brought to Portland, on the date above mentioned, by Mr. Bryon and three employees of his office without use of force. O'Leary, upon being arrested, was brought to the office of the United States Attorney in Portland and subjected to a four-hour examination the night of June 12, and was further examined Thursday, June 13, and thereafter was immediately started East in the custody of three of the employees of Agent Bryon."

"The defendant is a lawyer, a man of good education, has been and is president of the American Truth Society, and the publisher of 'Bull,' an ardent Irish-American publication which has been obnoxious to the Government for some time prior to its suppression. The defendant is charged with a violation of the espionage act and is the typical well-educated, clever and temperamental agitator."

Agent Bryon Praised.
"The arrest of O'Leary, in view of his importance to the Government and his statement that he could not be taken alive, is an additional testimony to the hard-working efficiency of Agent Bryon."

Local Federal agents take no credit for the capture of Lyon. They admit having a suspicion as to the clew that landed him in the clutches of Government operatives at Tucson.

O'Leary, it develops, was held in Portland some little time. During this period he is known to have been questioned by Mr. Haney, in the United States office, and that during office hours. It is apparent that the seemingly careless manner in which the prisoner was escorted from the Federal building proved the very safeguard against arousing suspicions that the captors anticipated. For obvious reasons, the definite time at which the noted prisoner was taken out of Portland, bound for New York, is not made known.

The little car which was purchased by O'Leary's "pal" for his use, and which contributed so materially to his downfall, was not purchased from Miss Minnie Wheeler, R. P. D. Box 363, Milwaukee, Or., but had been her property. The machine, Miss Wheeler states, was turned back by her in exchange for a new car to the Twin States Motor Car Company, 514 Alder street. From this firm "Corbitt" bought the car and the pair thoughtlessly used it without change of license.

Miss Wheeler said yesterday she had driven the car 38,609 miles and had experienced considerable trouble with it, due to a defective carburetor. "It had always been able to operate, it, but when anyone else tried to they seemed to have a lot of trouble," Miss Wheeler stated.

If the confidence of the aged caretaker of the ranch and companion of O'Leary for three eventful weeks, Samuel F. Stine, proves justified, this machine really becomes his property in reward for faithful service to his employer.

O'Leary has a wife and three children. Just where they now are or where they have been since he fled from New York rather than face trial for alleged flagrant violations of the espionage act has not been made known.

GERMAN LANDS IN TOILS
Gustave Erdtman Accused of Interfering With War Programme.

If Gustave Erdtman, of German citizenship, sought to induce members of the Loyce Legion of Loggers and Lumbermen to quit their jobs to escape being "slaves" of their employers, conviction for interfering with the Government's prosecution of the war may be his lot. Erdtman was confronted
