

## JUDGE RYAN MAY YET BE CANDIDATE

Aspirant for State Treasurer-  
ship Is Urged to Run as  
an Independent.

### VOTE RECOUNT CONSIDERED

Present Assistant Treasurer, Re-  
cently Defeated at Primaries, Not  
Yet Fully Decided as to the  
Course He Will Take.

SALEM, Or., June 17.—(Special.)—  
Judge Thomas F. Ryan, Assistant State  
Treasurer, who, by the official count,  
was defeated for the Republican nomi-  
nation for State Treasurer by Labor  
Commissioner O. P. Hoff, by a narrow  
margin of 113 votes at the recent pri-  
mary, is seriously considering becom-  
ing an independent candidate for the  
treasurership.

He said today that he has two plans  
in mind—one to obtain a recount of  
the votes, and another to run as an  
independent.

"I have not yet decided whether to  
ask for a recount," said Judge Ryan  
today. "Attorneys in Portland are in-  
vestigating the situation and we have  
some affidavits showing that I received  
more votes in certain precincts than I  
was credited with in the returns. In  
the Taylor case, however, it was said  
by the Supreme Court that there are  
many restrictions about a recount. It  
is, in fact, a very difficult matter to  
undertake and the recount idea may be  
abandoned."

**Friends Urge Candidacy.**  
"Many friends have urged me to be-  
come an independent candidate, and if  
I decided not to ask for a recount I  
am giving that matter serious consid-  
eration and probably I shall become an  
independent candidate under those con-  
ditions. This is not definitely settled,  
however."

"The matter of the recount is being  
fully investigated and I have no hesi-  
tation in saying that if I find the re-  
count can be carried out, in view of the  
restrictions hedging it about, I prefer  
that plan to the other of becoming an  
independent candidate."  
The race between Mr. Hoff and Judge  
Ryan for the treasurership was a close-  
ly contested affair and for several days  
after the primaries it was undecided as  
to who had captured the nomination.  
It was so close, in fact, that shortly  
after the primaries Labor Commissioner  
Hoff had given up the race and con-  
sidered himself defeated and had pre-  
pared a statement in which he said  
he would support the winning nominee.  
His friends, however, induced him to  
withhold the statement, and later de-  
velopments showed that the official  
count carried him into the nomination  
by 113 votes.

**Judge Active in Campaign.**  
Judge Ryan made a particularly active  
campaign for the treasurership. He  
has been assistant State Treasurer for  
the past seven years, ever since the in-  
cumbency of State Treasurer Kay. Be-  
fore Kay entered the race, eight years  
ago, Judge Ryan was considered a pos-  
sible contender, but he did not run and  
became instead chief deputy under Mr.  
Kay.  
It was generally understood all along  
that as soon as Kay's last term expired  
Ryan would seek to succeed him. Mr.  
Hoff entered the race unexpectedly, an-  
nouncing that he would not be a can-  
didate for Labor Commissioner to suc-  
ceed himself, a few months before the  
primary election, and a short time af-  
terwards entering as a candidate for  
the Treasurership. Mr. Hoff has been  
Labor Commissioner for 15 years.

### CONVICT ATTEMPTS SUICIDE

Murderer Twice Felled in Effort to  
Kill Himself.

MONTESSANO, Wash., June 17.—(Spe-  
cial.)—Frank Palow, convicted of the  
murder of Charles Foxworth, of Ho-  
quiam, is on his way to Walla Walla  
to begin his life sentence, after making  
two attempts today to commit suicide.  
The first attempt was made about 11  
o'clock this morning, when Palow tried  
to hang himself in his cell with a rope  
made from his trousers. Failing in this,  
Palow sought to secure delay by tear-  
ing up his underclothing and refusing  
to dress. While being forcibly dressed,  
Palow again attempted to take his life  
by butting his head against the jail  
stone wall.  
Palow is a German enemy alien.

## MEASURE IS KILLED

Interior Department Blocks  
Bill to Aid Soldiers.

### BUREAUCRATIC ACT SCORED

Attempt to Get Preferential Home-  
stead Entries for Army and Navy

Men Stopped by Mr. Vogelsang.  
Mr. McArthur Angry.

WASHINGTON, June 18.—(Special.)—  
Alexander T. Vogelsang, Acting Sec-  
retary of the Interior, has disapproved  
of Representative McArthur's bill (H. R.  
11588), and an identical bill by Senator  
McNary (S. 4322), providing for prefer-  
ential homestead entries for soldiers  
and sailors. Mr. Vogelsang's letter of dis-  
approval of this legislation, which was  
recently addressed to Senator H. L.  
Myers, chairman of the committee on  
public lands of the United States Sen-  
ate, reads as follows:  
"I have the honor to acknowledge  
receipt of your request for a report on  
S. 4322. The bill provides that any  
man, now or hereafter serving in the  
armed forces of the United States dur-  
ing the present war, may through cer-  
tain named members of his family, or  
through an authorized agent, file a  
statement declaring his intention to  
enter under the homestead laws a par-  
ticular tract of public land, and may  
within six months after his honorable  
discharge from the service, make en-  
try for said land. Provision is made  
for credit on account of the period of  
his service and for entry on the part  
of his widow or heirs in the event he  
dies without having made entry.

**Proposed Law Opposed.**  
"I do not approve of the proposed  
legislation for I am of the opinion that  
its main effect would be to tie up the  
lands at a time when it is urgently re-  
quired that they be left open to appor-  
tion by actual settlers to the end  
that so much as possible of the public  
domain may be put into immediate  
cultivation.  
"I do not believe that the vast ma-  
jority of our soldiers and sailors have  
any desire to make homestead entry  
for a tract of public land, and espe-  
cially those coming from the eastern  
part of the country; and it seems en-  
tirely probable that only a very small  
proportion of these declaratory state-  
ments would be followed up by actual  
entries. While the entries might ac-  
tually be made in a few cases there  
would form such a slight proportion of  
the aggregate filings that the net gain  
to the soldiers and sailors would be  
very small indeed as compared with  
the undesirable results of tying up a  
very large part of the public domain."

**Mr. McArthur Disappointed.**  
When seen today Representative Mc-  
Arthur expressed great disappoint-  
ment over the attitude of the Acting  
Secretary of the Interior on the pro-  
posed legislation. The disapproval of  
the department means that the bill  
will not be considered by the commit-  
tee on public lands of either the House  
or Senate as no measure affecting the  
public domain is ever enacted into law  
in the face of an adverse recommenda-  
tion by the department.  
"I am very sorry that the Depart-  
ment of the Interior has frowned down  
upon this legislation," said Mr. Mc-  
Arthur today. "I have received many  
assurances of support from members of  
the House and am certain that the bill  
would have passed if favorably re-  
ported but under the practice of the

House which in my mind is altogether  
unwise the departmental recommenda-  
tions are always final in matters of  
this kind. In other words important  
legislation can be blocked by the heads  
of departments and bureaus with-  
standing the merits of such legislation  
or the views of men in the House and  
Senate who are supposed to constitute  
the country's lawmaking body.  
"Congress has almost abdicated its  
lawmaking functions as to all questions  
pertaining to the public domain; the  
real lawmaking power being the In-  
terior Department. We are drifting  
too rapidly toward legislation by  
bureaucrats and other executive ag-  
encies who are not directly responsible  
to the people."

## 40 SPEEDERS ARRESTED

MUNICIPAL JUDGE ROSSMAN AS-  
SESSES FINES OF \$400.

Charles Burns Fined \$50 for Driving  
Fast Streetcar Stopped to Dis-  
charge Passengers.

Forty speeders, who were haled into  
Municipal Court yesterday by Sergeant  
Ervin and his squad of motorcycle po-  
lice, paid toll to the amount of \$400 to  
the city at the direction of Municipal  
Judge Rossman.  
The maximum penalty was drawn by  
Officer Klopferstein for passing a  
streetcar while it was stopped to dis-  
charge passengers. Patrolman Klopfer-  
stein testified that a serious acci-  
dent was narrowly averted and that  
he could detect the odor of intoxicating  
liquor on Burns' breath. Judge Ross-  
man assessed a fine of \$50.  
E. F. Jones was merely speeding  
along the Linnton road when he ran  
afoul of Motorcycle Patrolman Horack.  
As a result of his hurry his machine  
was confiscated for 30 days by the court.
