The Allied Provisions Export Commission, representing our associates in war, is now buyins through the division of purchases of the Food Administration. Private importations are now embargoed by allied countries.

BENTON GROWERS WILL CONSIGN CLIPS TO PORTLAND.

Farmers Will Save Local Buyers' Commission by Selling Through Approved Dealer to Government.

CORVALLIS, Or, June 18.—(Special.)—
To aid the Federal Government in getting wool to market, the Agricultural Council of Benton County is organizing a wool pool. This pool will be consigned to a Portland dealer who has been approved by the Federal authorities and who will offer it, graded, to the Government. The appraisal board appointed by the Government will check the grades and determine its value on the basis of the price of July 30, 1917.

The members of the council who are forming the pool say that it probably will take 30 days before final settlement will be made, but it will be possible to get an advance up to but not to exceed 75 per cent of the fair estimated market value of the pool. This advance will be free of interest after the wool reaches Portland.

By selling their wool through the pool the farmers will save the commission which is allowed to the local buyer. This commission amounts to 1½ cents per pound. The assurance is given that everyone will get full value for his wool as each clip will be graded separately.
