

## CAPTURE OF STILL CLOSES LONG VIGIL

Captain Williams, of Oregon  
Military Police, Plays  
Part in Raid.

## PLANT IS HIDDEN IN BRUSH

Bell Clark, Sam Holden and Ben  
Jarrell Alleged to Have Brought  
Still to Oregon From South  
Carolina—Liquor Taken.

Captain Harry E. Williams, of the Oregon military police, returned to Portland yesterday from Pendleton, bringing with him the details of the raid on a moonshiners' still in Morrow County.

The still was discovered on the top of a hill, in the sagebrush country of Morrow County, screened from view of the outside world by thick brush. It was the largest and perhaps the only real Southern moonshiners' still ever in actual operation in Oregon.

The discovery was made last Saturday by Captain Williams, Sheriff Taylor, D. Taylor, of Umatilla County, and a posse of deputized citizens. Three men, Bill Clark, Sam A. Holden and Ben Jarrell, were arrested and charged with manufacture of contraband liquor in prohibition territory. Jarrell escaped from the officials on the return trip to Pendleton, where the other two members of the trio were placed in the County Jail.

**Still Hidden in Brush.**  
Captain Williams, Sheriff Taylor and Deputy Game Warden Averill composed the advance party. Remaining members of the posse spread out in skirmishing formation and followed the three leaders.

The officials were forced to desert their machines two miles from the still. From the roadway they crawled up a steep hillside. No trails nor paths were to be found to aid them, although Sheriff Taylor knew the general location of the still from previous visits made by him on several nights before the actual raid.

The scene of the alleged moonshiners' operations could not be seen by the officers until they were within 30 feet of the plant. When they peered through the brush they saw Jarrell asleep, with a rifle lying by his side. The other two alleged moonshiners were seated near the furnace with rifles lying across their laps, apparently ready for any emergency.

**Operators Heavily Armed.**  
At a given signal the three officers leaped into the camp and effected the arrest of the three men without a struggle. They found the still hidden beneath the furnace, over which the kettle of brew was boiling. The steam was curling through the "worm" in the process of being condensed and flowing out into buckets and vats.

Ten large vats filled with liquor of varying degrees of strength was a part of the equipment. Some of the vats contained only about 10 per cent alcohol and tasted much like beer. Other contained liquor of 100 proof test.

Thirty gallons of white corn whiskey is the approximate capacity of the still, and reports indicated that the men under arrest had been doing a flourishing business in the sagebrush country.

The still was located on the head of the Little Butler Creek, about 50 miles southwest of Pendleton. Captain Williams said the location was ideal for such a business, as it was difficult to locate the still. No buildings had been erected in the little camp, the men sleeping under the sky with only a couple of light cotton blankets for covers.

**Long Vigil Is Closed.**  
The three men charged with manufacturing the moonshine liquor formerly lived in South Carolina. It is believed they came to Oregon from the Southland with their still several months ago. The first suspicion that someone was preparing to manufacture "white liquor" came when a Walla Walla merchant reported the sale of a large quantity of corn meal to three men.

During the past few weeks, Captain Williams says, he had observed the moonshine liquor, or some intoxicating drinks had been sold in large quantities in the Eastern Oregon country. Sheriff Taylor began an investigation and located the plant about a week ago. Several nights were spent in the open while the officer watched the operations of the plant.

Officials in all parts of the state are watching for Jarrell, who made his escape from the party on the return trip Saturday. The escape was made possible during a brief moment, while Sheriff Taylor was adjusting a minor defect in his automobile. Jarrell seized the opportunity, plunged into the woods by the side of the road and made good his escape. The officials were handicapped in capturing him because of the darkness and lack of knowledge of the trails in the woods.

**Operators Held in Jail.**  
Jarrell was formerly a postmaster in South Carolina, according to information received by the officials. He is about 40 years old, weighs almost 200 pounds and is six feet tall. He is dark-complexioned.

In addition to arresting the three men, Captain Williams confiscated the "still" and carried away 25 gallons of moonshine whiskey and 1000 pounds of cornmeal. Clark and Holden today were placed under \$2000 bonds each. They will have a hearing tomorrow. Pendleton business men have given Captain Williams the old Commercial Club quarters to be used as headquarters for his company in the Round-up city.

## HUNS LOSE 80,000

Montdidier-Noyon Offensive Is  
Costly to Hindenburg.

## FRENCH STAND IS LAUDED

Andrew Tardieu Says Huge Losses  
Enough to Make Boche General  
Stop and Think—Clemenceau  
Is "Completely Satisfied."

PARIS, June 18.—Eighty thousand Germans were killed, wounded or made prisoner during the offensive between Montdidier and Noyon, Captain Andrew Tardieu, who accompanied Premier Clemenceau to the front on Sunday, told Marcel Hutin, editor of the Echo de Paris, upon his return to Paris.

"This is a figure which should make even Ludendorff reflect," he said.

**Huns Completely Blocked.**  
"One cannot insist enough upon the exceptional importance of the results obtained by the counter attacks of divisions under General Mangin against the right flank of General von Hutler's armies," he continued. "This magnificent operation has nailed the enemy to the spot and completely checked the advance toward Compiègne."

"German officers who were made prisoner do not attempt to hide their chagrin at their inability to reach Compiègne, which they admit was their objective."

Premier Clemenceau contented himself by remarking: "I am completely satisfied."

PARIS, June 18.—In a local operation south of Valency today the French took 100 prisoners. It is announced officially. Between the Oureq and the Marne prisoners were taken in patrol encounters. A German raid near Avocourt was repulsed.

**British Make Raids.**  
The British carried out a successful raid last night north of Lens, and this morning English troops raided enemy trenches south of Bulloch and captured several prisoners after hard fighting.

## GRACE LUSK SENTENCED

MURDERER TO SERVE 10 YEARS IN  
WISCONSIN PENITENTIARY.

Slayer, Pronounced Sane by Alienists,  
Collapses When She Hears  
Fate Announced.

WAUKESHA, Wis., June 18.—The final episode in the trial of Grace Lusk, convicted of the murder of Mrs. Mary Newman Roberts, wife of the former Wisconsin state veterinarian, was enacted here this afternoon when Judge Martin Lund sentenced the woman school mistress to 10 years imprisonment at hard labor in the Wisconsin State Penitentiary at Waupun.

Sentence was pronounced after a committee of alienists appointed by the court had examined Miss Lusk and pronounced her sane. She will be taken to prison tomorrow, provided that she recovers from the collapse she suffered when sentence was pronounced.

In pronouncing sentence the court delivered a severe pronouncement of both Miss Lusk and Dr. David Roberts, whose intimacy with Miss Lusk extended over a period of a year and led to the murder. The doctor, who was married by the woman sentenced today.

"You and Dr. Roberts assailed society at its most sensitive and vulnerable point," the court said. "You assailed the home, and neither of you had any right to deprive Mrs. Roberts of those rights that became hers when Dr. Roberts married her as his wife."

"Some circumstances in this case cast greater blame upon Dr. Roberts than upon you. Still you had no right to organize in the state of Wisconsin, in the world; you had a good education."

As the sentence was pronounced Miss Lusk, who had been standing at the court rail, collapsed into the arms of her attorney and was carried from the room unconscious. Tonight she was in a hysterical condition in the County Jail.

## DEPORTATION NOT LIKELY

Oregon Soldier, Witness at I. W. W.  
Trial in Chicago, Tells of  
Strike at Olaha Lumber  
Company's Plant.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 18.—Mrs. Adolphus Busch, St. Louis, returning from a long stay in Germany, is held temporarily at Key West, Fla., for examination by the immigration authorities. She is chief owner of the great brewery and other properties ordered taken over yesterday by the alien property custodian.

Various questions are to be asked Mrs. Busch, concerning chiefly her American citizenship, her movements while abroad and what, if any, means she now has of communicating with persons in Germany.

Deportation is not contemplated, officials said today, and Mrs. Busch's release in a day or two is expected.

**CHICAGO, June 18.**—Sergeant W. Y. Arthur, of the Oregon State Guard, testified today before Judge Landis in the I. W. W. trial concerning the picketing of the Olaha (Oregon) Lumber Company during a strike there.

"The head of the pickets," testified the witness, "told me that the men hoped to get a day of eight hours, then six, then four, and finally 'the whole works.'"

Frank Milward, superintendent of the lumber company, testified concerning three fires which broke out during the strike. One destroyed a pile of spruce intended for government airplane construction.

There were many other fires during the summer, he said, but those were the ones which caused the most damage and were not apparent.

## WESSEL'S RACE EXCITING

STEAMER SPEEDS SHOREWARD  
WHEN FIRE THREATENS.

Crew Fights Flames for Long Time  
and Then Finally Abandons Craft  
Which Is Run on Beach.

A CANADIAN PACIFIC PORT, June 18.—An all-night race against fire was made by the Pacific Steamship Company's Alaska-bound steamer Ravalli before she was beached north of here Saturday, according to members of the crew who reached here today.

"The fire started Friday night," said M. J. Robie, second mate. "We fought the flames for a long time and when the fire got too hot we decided to control we batted down the hatches and headed for the nearest beach."

"It was an all-night run. The fire kept gaining and, after time, blew both hatches off. We kept the wireless going and the Canadian steamer Venture came to our relief. The Ravalli poured water into the hold, but soon gave up the task and took off the Ravalli's passengers. We then drove the Ravalli onto the beach, opened the sea cocks and let her settle."

## CHECK "KITER" ARRAIGNED

Roy Creel Pleads Guilty to Passing  
Worthless Paper.

Roy Creel, arrested by Inspectors Hellyer and Graves Monday on a charge of obtaining money by false pretenses was bound over to the grand jury yesterday afternoon when he appeared for preliminary hearing before Judge Rossman in the Municipal Court.

A cash bail of \$500 was stipulated by the court. He pleaded guilty.

Three complaints were filed against Creel in Portland for passing worthless checks. He cashed a worthless \$10 check at the Imperial Hotel. Charles C. Banfield, 1210 Division street, is another victim. He cashed a check for Creel for \$10.

According to information from the Burns Detective Agency, Creel has been "kiting" checks in Washington and is wanted by the authorities at Connell, Wash., where he cashed worthless paper.

## LOUISIANA TO VOTE ON SUFFRAGE.

BATON ROUGE, La., June 18.—A House resolution providing for a referendum at the election next Fall on a state constitutional amendment granting suffrage to women was adopted tonight by the Louisiana State Senate 29 to 11. President Wilson urged submission of the question to the people in a recent letter to the State Assembly.

She was elected under the auspices of the Presbyterian Ladies' Aid, who will this year donate the proceeds of the queen contest to the Red Cross. The rose show will be held Saturday, June 22, in this city, and other Columbia County towns are expected to participate.

**New Rates Effective July 25.**  
WASHINGTON, June 18.—New rates on export and import freight on a basis of something over 25 per cent increase over existing rates were ordered today by the Railroad Administration to become effective next July 25. This modifies the recent rate order which cancelled existing export and import tariffs and applied domestic rates to that tariff.
