ANNUAL REUNION IS CALLED.—The annual reunion of the Society of the Sons and Daughters of Oregon Pioneers will be held in room B, Portland Auditorium, tonight at 8 o'clock. Election of officers for the ensuing year and other important business will be transacted. The membership of the board of this society is composed of: Mrs. D. P. Thompson, president; Frederick V. Holman, vice-president; Lillian M. Hockelman, secretary-treasurer; James F. Failing, Colonel Robert A. Miller, Mrs. S. R. Hutton, Mrs. Beatrice Miller, Mrs. W. B. Crane, M. C. George, Mrs. A. B. Croasman and J. W. Minto, directors. Oregon pioneers are cordially invited to attend.

SOLDIERS TO TAKE OATH.—The oath of citizenship will be administered by United States Judge Wolverton at the Armory some day this week to 260 soldiers now at Vancouver Barracks. The exact date for the imposing ceremony cannot be fixed until the necessary supplies have been received from Washington. Arrangements for the ceremony are in the hands of John S. Smith, chief of the bureau of naturalization for the Pacific Northwest, who is giving his personal supervision to the naturalization of American soldiers under the law passed by Congress last month.

WORKER MUST SERVE COLORS.—When J. W. Denton, 30, an employee of the Multnomah Box & Lumber Company, completes a jail sentence of ten days, imposed by United States Judge Bean yesterday, he will be forthwith sent to the army for active military service. Denton pleaded guilty to perjury, by which he gained a deferred classification under the military draft law. He claimed to be married when as a master of fact he was not, although he had for five years been living with a young woman whom he represented to be his wife.

V. G. HINSHAW MAY COME.—In a letter to Mrs. A. H. Wallace, of this city, prominent prohibitionist city worker, Virgil G. Hinshaw, National chairman of the party, has indicated that he probably will attend the prohibition state convention which will be held at the Imperial Hotel, Saturday, June 29. J. P. Newell, chairman of the state organization, who has been assisting the Canadian government to appraise the value of railroads it has taken over, expects to return in time for the convention.

AUXILIARY MEETING CALLED.—A special business meeting of Auxiliary to Company C, 118th Engineers, has been called for Wednesday evening at 8 o'clock, room 218 Railway Exchange building. The members have secured the rights to a block of seats at the Orpheum for Monday and Tuesday evening, June 24 and 25. The regular meeting of the auxiliary will be held Friday at 2 o'clock at the University Club. There will be no sewing this week.

JURY GIVES VERDICT OF \$1085.—W. F. Schooley, whose leg was badly crushed in a streetcar accident a year ago, was awarded a verdict of \$1085 by a jury in Circuit Judge Kavanaugh's court yesterday, against the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company. The defense admitted Schooley was entitled to recover, but contested the amount to be awarded. The plaintiff brought suit for \$10,000.

NEW ENGLAND SOCIETY TO MEET.—The New England Society will hold the last meeting of the season Friday night at the Portland Hotel assembly hall. There will be vocal and instrumental music and readings under the direction of Miss Marie A. S. Soule. New England anecdotes and chorus singing will be followed by dancing. POSTOFFICE ROBBERS SENTENCED.—Milward Patterson and Harry Vogel pleaded guilty in the United States Court yesterday to robbing the postoffice at Umatilla January 23, last. They were sentenced by Judge Bean to serve 12 months in the McNeil's Island. The men obtained only \$8.50 in money from the robbery.

BIRTH CONTROL LEAGUE TO MEET.—"Report of the National Birth Control Conference at New York" will be the chief topic for discussion before the Portland Birth Control League, which meets this evening at 8:15 in room A, Central Library. The meeting is public and some of the latest developments in the birth control movement will be brought out.

JESSE B. HAVENS FOUND DEAD.—Jesse B. Havens, aged 72 years, was found dead in his bed at 28½ North Front street, this morning. Deputy Coroner Goetsch took charge of the body and announced that death was due to natural causes. No relatives are known of, but friends of the aged man have volunteered to give him a burial.

SLACKERS PUNISHED.—Ray Alexander Woolery, of Gervais, and Conrad Gilbert, of this city, slackers, pleaded guilty in the Federal Court yesterday and were sentenced by United States Judge Bean to serve ten and one days, respectively, in the County Jail. They will then be inducted into the military service.

JAPANESE GET U. S. AUTOS.—Portland Firm Sends Second-Hand Cars to Troops in Siberia.

To supply the needs of Japanese troops who are working with the United States Engineers in Siberia, second-hand automobiles have been shipped to Japan. The S. Ban Company, of Portland, shipped 12 machines to Tokyo last week and intends to send many more. "We are sending second-hand machines for temporary use," said Y. Nakaya, manager of the S. Ban Company. "The reason for this is that our orders for new cars cannot be filled fast enough on this side of the water. During the last two weeks this company has sent to Tokyo 50 cars."

Mr. Nakaya has recently returned from Japan, where he organized the Safety Motor Car Company as a subsidiary company to the S. Ban Company, of Portland. The motor car firm has its main office in Tokyo, where the machines are shipped from Portland.

GREEK GRAFTER PUNISHED.—James Sourapis Gets 60 Days in Jail and Must Pay Fine of \$2000.

James Sourapis, reputed leader of the local Greek colony, was yesterday sentenced by United States Judge Wolverton to serve 60 days in the county jail and to pay a fine of \$2000. Sourapis had pleaded guilty to an indictment charging him with interfering with the selective draft law.

Evidence in the possession of United States Attorney Haney showed that Sourapis, who was arrested several days ago, had fleeced a number of his countrymen out of about \$3000 in the aggregate by representing that he could secure for them deferred classification upon the payment to him of a sum ranging from \$150 to \$300 each. He operated chiefly among ignorant workmen in the logging camps.

L. B. CASE IS FINED \$50.—Motorcyclist Who Knocked Down 4-Year-Old Boy Found Guilty.

L. B. Case, 1600 East Eighth street, who ran down and seriously injured little Robert McMullen, aged 4, of 892 Harvey street, at East Thirteenth and Tacoma streets, June 9, was found guilty of reckless driving and fined \$50 by Municipal Judge Rossmann yesterday. Mr. Case was riding on a motorcycle and testimony showed he was traveling at an excessive rate of speed. The lad was walking across the street and witnesses said the machine traveled more than 25 feet after it knocked the boy down. The lad suffered a compound fracture of the leg and a fracture of the skull. He is in Sellwood Hospital and it is now thought he will recover.

Talks will be given by United States Attorney Haney, United States Marshal Alexander, Captain George Gund, of the Army Intelligence Bureau; Chief of Police Johnson, John B. Hibbard, commander of the Multnomah Guards; Major Daick, of the Oregon military police, and others.

The Sheriffs will be given a luncheon at the County Jail Friday noon. On Saturday the Sheriffs of Oregon will go to Vancouver, where they will meet jointly with the State Association of Sheriffs of Washington.

FIRE IS INVESTIGATED.—MARSHAL BELIEVES BLAZE STARTED IN PILE OF SAWDUST.

Loss of Rice-Kinder Lumber Plant at Lents Junction Estimated at \$50,000—Insurance Cuts Figure.

After investigating every clue which would lead to the discovery of the origin of the fire which destroyed the Rice-Kinder lumber plant at Lents Junction Monday night, Captain Fred W. Roberts, of the fire marshal's office, said yesterday afternoon that to all appearances the fire was not of incendiary origin.

Officials of the mill suspected one man after another and in every case each man suspected of the crime was able to prove an undisputed alibi as to his presence at the time the fire broke out. Captain Roberts also found the identity of the two men who were seen going from the plant shortly before the fire was discovered. One was Edward Glover, mill foreman, who left at 8:15 in a hurry and without a coat. He had worked overtime and was in a hurry to get to his dinner, as also was E. C. Colgan, another employee, who left the plant at 7 o'clock. There is no suspicion directed against these men.

The theory of the firemen is that the sawdust in the engine-room caught fire. Mr. Roberts said that he had raked the sawdust back away from the fire grate, but it is thought now that this is the only possible cause of the fire.

The damage is estimated at \$50,000. Insurance to the extent of \$15,000 is said to have been carried.
