ROSE SHOW SELECTS JUDGES.—The Rose City Park Rose Show, to be held at the clubhouse Friday afternoon and evening beginning at 2 o'clock and continuing through the evening, has named as judges, Mesdames Thomas Gray and W. C. Seachrest and J. A. Murray, all of whom are expert judges of the rose. Four brief classifications are given out by the chairman, Mrs. J. Curtis Simmons, and every resident of the district is invited to exhibit their choice blossoms under at least one of them. They include: (1) Best individual rose, (2) best basket display of roses or other flowers, (3) best garden display of roses, (4) best collection of 50 Carolina Testout. The exhibits will afterwards be sent to the Rose Hospital at Vancouver for the sick soldiers.

LINCOLN FIREMEN AID CAUSE.—The Lincoln Volunteer Fire Department gave a Red Cross benefit dance on June 1, which netted the Red Cross \$55.75. On May 15 the department gave a dance for the purpose of securing an American flag for the fire hall. Enough money was secured to purchase the flag and also a service flag to represent its members who are now serving Uncle Sam in cause of democracy. The department has nine members in the service, of whom eight are volunteers and for some time have been somewhere in France. Since the declaration of war by this country, never had a membership of more than 21.

PIONEER OF OREGON PASSES.—Mrs. Margaret Nepp, a pioneer Oregon woman, died of a heart ailment yesterday morning at the residence of her daughter, Mrs. O. F. Lester, of 412 North Twenty-first street. Mrs. Nepp had resided at Cornelius, in Washington County, for 48 years. She was 72 years old. Besides the husband, John Nepp, and the one daughter, three sons survive. They are: John Nepp, Jr., Theodore Nepp, Henry Nepp, Jr. The funeral will be held at 1 o'clock tomorrow morning from the First Methodist Church at Cornelius.

SUICIDE'S DEAD BODY.—The dead body of Charles Loebl, aged about 35 years, was found yesterday afternoon in a half-suspended position in the heavy brush at East Twelfth and Beech streets. Loebl, evidently tired of life, wandered into the vacant lot, fastened a noose to a small tree and died from strangulation. The body was discovered by two small boys and the coroner notified. The body was removed to the morgue. Loebl had been living in a private home near the scene of the tragedy.

SHIPBUILDING CLASSES AT LADD SCHOOL.—The night shipbuilding classes which have been conducted at the Benson Patriotic School have been transferred to the Ladd School, Jefferson and West Park, and a new series of 12 lessons will start tonight at 7:15 o'clock. J. L. Hinchey, instructor of hulls of the United States Shipping Board, will have charge. The classes meet every Monday and Thursday nights. The Benson Patriotic School has been occasioned by turning Benson into a military unit.

FRAUD IN SALE ALLEGED.—Fraud, deceit and misrepresentation are charged against Charles Topham in a civil action filed yesterday in the Circuit Court by S. Baxter, who alleges he was defrauded out of \$332 in a realty transaction. He asserts he purchased two lots from Topham at the agreed price of \$750, relying on the defendant's representations that they were free of all encumbrances. Several days later, he says, he learned they were incumbered in the sum of \$332 and he seeks judgment for that amount.

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LAND OWNERS GET AWARD.—A verdict for \$4002 was awarded to Lena Serloko and others by a jury in Circuit Judge Gatens' court yesterday as a result of condemnation proceedings brought by the city of Portland for the acquisition of property in South Portland for the Marquam Gulch park and playground. The property owners and city were unable to arrive at a settlement out of court.

"CANDY" CONSPIRATOR PUNISHED.—Sentence was pronounced yesterday in Federal Court upon Tom K. Tanaka, convicted last week in the "candy conspiracy" liquor cases and said to be a highly influential liquor dealer among the San Francisco Japanese. Tanaka was ordered to serve 12 months in the Multnomah County Jail and pay a fine of \$500.

SPEEDER FINED \$40.—For driving his car at the rate of 43 miles an hour on Milwaukee street H. Glenden received a fine of \$40. Sergeant Ervin, who arrested the autoist, testified that Glenden drove his machine at the excessive rate of speed for a distance of half a mile. Glenden gave notice that he would appeal the case.

TWO CHARACTERS IN SPECTACULAR PLAY THAT COMES TO PORTLAND NEXT SUNDAY.

 "The Wanderer," one of the most notable productions ever made upon the American stage, will begin a week's engagement at the Helling next Sunday night. It is from the pen of Maurice V. Samuels, William Elliott, F. Ray Comstock and Morris Gest are the producers. The name of its stage director was kept a profound secret until its premiere in New York, when every well-posted "first-nighter" recognized the many little deft touches that only Belasco knows how to impart. The next day public acknowledgment was made that the mighty David had performed a labor of love and devotion in staging "The Wanderer," for which he had refused any remuneration whatsoever.

It is an interesting fact, not generally known, that two of this triumvirate of successful young managers, who have given the stage several of its greatest successes in recent years, are sons-in-law of Belasco. They are William Elliott and Morris Gest.

WIPE CHARGES NON-SUPPORT.—C. F. Harding, a driver for the Union Oil Company, was arrested yesterday by Deputy Constables Watkins and Dimel on a District Court warrant charging him with non-support. Complaint was made to the District Attorney's office by his wife. He is held in the County Jail in default of bail.

HENRY FLEMING DIES SUDDENLY.—A telegram received yesterday announced the death of Miss Emma Fleming, stenographer in the office of United States Marshal G. S. Alexander, that her brother, Henry Fleming, had dropped dead at his home in Montana. Miss Fleming and her mother departed last night in response to the message.

GAMBLERS ARE FINED.—W. S. Babb has fined \$125 by Municipal Judge Rodgers yesterday for conducting a gambling game. Thirteen witnesses received a fine of \$5 each. DIFFICULT ROLE TAKEN

JOSEPHINE DILLON REPLACES RUTH GATES AT BAKER.

When Leading Woman is Called East Suddenly, Miss Dillon Learns Part in Quick Time.

When Ruth Gates, leading woman with the Alcazar Players, received telegrams calling her to the bedside of her mother, seriously ill with brain hemorrhage in a New York hospital, there happened in the company one of these episodes that occur usually only in magazine stories of the stage, or in press agent accountings.

Miss Gates' telegram apprising her of her mother's turn for the worse came on Sunday, when she had opened in "Paid in Full." She gave a beautiful performance and only the company members knew under what a nervous, unhappy strain she was laboring. Manager Seaman told her of her distress, and when Miss Gates told him she would leave for New York on the next morning, he immediately put Josephine Dillon to watching Miss Gates in the role.

Miss Dillon learned the lengthy part, 55 sides, on Sunday night after the show, and rehearsed all day Monday, going on in the evening "letter perfect" and having had only two hours' sleep in the meantime. She gave an immense performance and received an ovation from the audience.

Miss Dillon is a dramatic actress of ability and is especially remembered for her seasons as Max Figma's lead.

JURY HARD TO OBTAIN

ONE REGULAR AND TWO SPECIAL PANELS EXHAUSTED.

Preparation for Trial of City Land Condemnation Suit Proves Slow and Difficult.

Two special jury panels, in addition to a regular panel of 19, were exhausted yesterday in a futile effort to procure 12 men to determine the damages to be awarded to Gaetano Destefano in condemnation proceedings brought by the City of Portland for the acquisition of property for the Marquam Gulch public park and playground.

Disatisfied with verdicts which have been awarded in other cases within the past two weeks, Henry E. McGinnis, counsel for the defendants, exercised his right to excuse all prospective jurors who own property in Portland.

REASSESSMENT IS ASKED

Council Authorizes Collection of Costs on Previous Estimates.

An ordinance was passed by the City Council yesterday authorizing a reassessment for the improvement of Upper Drive. The new assessment cost will be in accordance with the original estimates drawn by the City Engineer for the improvement, amounting to approximately \$9000.

The cost of the improvement exceeded this estimate by several thousand dollars and to avoid the payment of the excess charges property owners affected instituted court proceedings. The courts held that a reassessment should be made by the city.

LICENSE TO BE REQUIRED

OWNERS OF FOR HIRE CARS WILL BE HELD RESPONSIBLE.

Council Passes Amendment to Ordinance Expected to Compel Drivers to Take Examinations.

City officials are preparing to prosecute for-hire car owners and taxicab company managers who hire drivers who do not possess city licenses.

For months City Commissioner Mann has worked to force all for-hire car drivers to submit to an examination as to fitness in operating automobiles, in order to protect the public using the machines. In many cases it was found that the owners of for-hire cars were responsible, but openly ignored the law, knowing that they could not be held
