EDDIE CAMPBELL DEAD

Well-Known Boxer Victim of Accidental Gunshot.

OPERATION PROVES FUTILE

Clever Featherweight, Known Here as One of Best Mitt-Wielders Ever Seen in Action in Local Rings. Fighter Popular With Fans.

HOLLISTER, Cal., June 20.—Eddie Camp, one-time aspirant for the lightweight boxing championship, died in a hospital here today from the effects of an accidental gunshot wound received yesterday.

Eddie Camp, the well-known California boxer who died at Hollister, Cal., yesterday from a fatal gunshot wound, was well known in Portland and throughout the United States.

Camp started in professional boxing in 1913 and won several successes from the start. A year after he had been boxing, Eddie met such bantamweights as "Kid" Williams, Frankie Burns, Charles, Edna, and Benny Chavez.

Camp later met "Kid" Williams for the title, but lost in 12 rounds at Vernon, Cal. Camp lost to take off too much weight for the titleholder and was unable to stand the strain.

After several years boxing at the bantamweight limit he outgrew that class and started boxing featherweights. Some of the featherweights he met are Tommy Toughney, Willie Jackson, Billy Fitzsimmons, Jimmy Murray, Battling Linn, K. O. Eggers, Dick Loadman, Al Shubert, Billy Poo, Matt Brock, Harry Brammer and Micket Brown.
