

LIQUOR CROWD SAID TO SWING BIG CLUB

Administration Declared to Be
Threatened in Attempt to
Defeat Prohibition.

RANDALL MAKES CHARGE

Californian Asserts Secret Confer-
ence Held to Discuss Postpone-
ment of Action Until
After Elections.

WASHINGTON, June 21.—Fearing absolute prohibition might so affect the labor of the country as to interfere with prosecution of the war, the Senate agricultural committee today decided to reopen next Tuesday the hearings on the Jones prohibition amendment to the \$11,000,000 emergency agricultural appropriation bill.

In reaching agreement to continue the hearings, the committee called upon Secretary Daniels, Postmaster Burleson, Chairman Hurley and Bainbridge Colby of the Shipping Board, Director General Schwab of the Emergency Fleet Corporation and heads of a number of industrial plants employing large numbers of men to appear as witnesses. Senator Gore, of Oklahoma, chairman of the committee, returned to Washington last night to take charge of the bill.

Representative Randall, of California, prohibitionist, in a statement today declared that at a secret conference in Washington last night, "some famous Democratic prohibitionists" discussed whether it would be practicable from a political standpoint to postpone until after the November elections passage of a prohibition law.

Mr. Randall declined to amplify his prepared statement, which gave no names.

Double Threat Alleged.
"My amendment to the food bill," said the statement, "precipitated a situation in Administration circles which is properly described as pandemonium. The party in power is threatened by the brewery and liquor interests in the large cities with the loss of the next House of Representatives if prohibition is enacted now."

"On the other hand, failure to act now is sure to cost the Democrats a score of country districts."

After a three-hour session, the Senate agricultural committee today decided to postpone action on the Jones prohibition rider to the agricultural appropriation bill until after the next hearing for the purpose of further investigating statements made by Bainbridge Colby, of the Shipping Board, that to take beer away from shipyard employees would reduce the output of American yards 25 per cent.

The committee has asked Chairman Hurley, of the Shipping Board, and General Manager Schwab, of the Emergency Fleet Corporation, as well as Mr. Colby and other representatives of the board to appear tomorrow.

Senator Smith, of South Carolina, acting chairman, said members of the committee feel that if prohibition of the manufacture and sale of beer and wine will handicap the country in winning the war, they are willing at this time to abandon their efforts.

Colby's Talk Believed Inspired.

Mr. Colby, speaking for the Shipping Board, urged the committee Wednesday not to take any action that would in any way cause labor unrest, and in that way handicap the prosecution of the war.

Some Senators were inclined to the belief that Mr. Colby reflected the attitude of the White House, although the President recently declared to take any part in the discussion.

CHINA READY TO HELP

SUPPORT FOR ALLIED CAUSE IN
WAR IS ASSURED.

Red Cross Campaign Popular in Shang-
hai, Says Consul-General Thomas
Sammons.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 21.—"China and the Chinese stand ready at any and all times to join any movement which may bring success to the allied cause; that is the message the Chinese asked me to bring to the United States," said Consul-General Thomas Sammons, of Shanghai, here today.

The American Consul addressed the Chinese Consulate Club here, telling of the support given by the Chinese to the American Red Cross.

"You can count on us for anything to help win the war, they told me to tell you," he said. "The Red Cross movement was the most popular campaign ever held in Shanghai."

"Now exists the greatest opportunity for development industrially in China, with the least resistance," declared E. S. Cunningham, Consul-General at Hankow, who spoke at the same gathering.

The two consular officers told of China's trade last year exceeding \$1,000,000,000 and steadily increasing, having doubled in the past 10 years. They declared exports of China to the United States last year were \$155,000,000, an increase of \$15,000,000 over the preceding year.

"Last year China sold us \$33,000,000 worth of raw silk, and the steamer on which I came here this week brought \$2,000,000 worth of raw silk," declared Consul-General Sammons.
