

O'LEARY TRIES TO PROVE "FRAME-UP"

Alleged Letter of Sinn Feiner's Former Attorney Submitted as Evidence.

WOOD CASE MENTIONED

Lawyer Represented as Fearing He Would Be Kept Out of Army Service if He Conducted Client's Defense.

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This evidence was presented at the termination of Jeremiah's two-day questioning by his brother's lawyer and Earl B. Barnes, Assistant District Attorney.

It consisted of a letter purporting to have been written by Henry A. Wise, a New York lawyer, to John J. O'Leary, announcing his decision to withdraw from Jeremiah O'Leary's defense against accusations of publishing seditious magazine articles, because, the letter read, "the officers of our Government are so bitter that if I should defend your brother in this case they would probably treat me as they have treated General Wood and refuse to accept my offer of service."

The letter was written in April, shortly before O'Leary's case was set for trial. It explained that Wise had had military training and that he intended to offer his services to the Government. He said a commission might be refused him if he did not withdraw.

The letter was admitted with the understanding that Mr. Wise be permitted to explain it during a later session.

Through a grueling of several hours Jeremiah O'Leary maintained that it was Arthur Lyons, and not his brother John, who bought the tickets on which he and Lyons started their westward trip on May 7, Lyons, an employee in Jeremiah's law office, who was jointly indicted with the O'Leary brothers for criminally aiding his employer's escape, had declared John O'Leary bought the tickets.

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He said also that he was not aware that William H. Daly, a lawyer associated with the O'Learys, was counsel for Rodiger under the same name. He had also read, he said, that Rodiger's name was linked with that of Madame de Victoria, the German woman also accused in the treason and spy case.

The Sinn Feiner's examination was dominated by bitter denunciation of his prosecutor, Assistant District Attorney Barnes. He was permitted by Barnes to tell the jury things he had told his brother before he fled.

He said he had complained that every time a German was arrested, Government agents always asked if he knew Jeremiah O'Leary. The purpose was "to link me with disloyalty when I was a man of mine was that of a loyal American citizen."

He had said Barnes was prosecuting him for his activities against British propaganda "to make the United States an integral part of the British Empire."

Barnes, he said, had made insinuations to his lawyer, Henry A. Wise, to induce him to drop the case and "had allowed his personal ambition to override his public duty."

WIFE TO REMAIN FIRM

MRS. BEATRICE FLETCHER THOMPSON BARES WEDDING MYSTERY.

Malmo Hotel Owner Said to Have Sent Attorney South to Effect Property Settlement.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., June 21.—(Special.)—The attorney for Mrs. Beatrice Fletcher Thompson, formerly of Seattle, who is suing Robert Henry Thompson, Portland millionaire, for divorce, today said he had information that Mr. Thompson had sent an attorney to San Francisco in an effort to effect a property settlement out of court and that he believed there would be no con-

test when the case is called for trial. "If Thompson files a cross complaint or contests the divorce," said Attorney Algonzo Crofton, representing the pretty young bride, "we are prepared to file an amended complaint containing much more serious charges. The complaint filed here recently simply charges cruelty and describes the cruelty as the use of profane language to Mrs. Thompson in the presence of relatives and friends."

Mrs. Thompson today explained the mystery as to why the wedding took place in Los Angeles. She said it was to keep the fact secret, as Mr. Thompson desired, and that the secret was well kept that it was not generally known in Portland that Mr. Thompson married under the name of the divorce suit was carried by the papers.

Mr. Crofton said he had not heard directly from Mr. Thompson's attorney.

NEW YORK, June 21.—(By the Associated Press.)—Because of a disagreement with German consuls concerning the change of war prisoners, the Russian war prisoner college has issued an order to stop immediately the repatriation of all Germans between the ages of 16 and 45 years who are fit for military service.

WASHINGTON, June 21.—General Semenov's force of Cossacks in Siberia was defeated by the Bolshevik troops and is retreating into Chinese territory, the State Department was advised today in a dispatch sent from Harbin last Wednesday.

Latest previous information regarding the General at the State Department was that the fighting was on the River Oran, some 200 miles west of Chita. His force then was 2000 men.

This is not the first time General Semenov has been compelled to retire to Chinese territory.

NEW YORK, June 21.—Joseph P. Rutherford, successor of "Patented" Russell, as head of the International Bible Students Association, and six of his associates were today sentenced to twenty years imprisonment for conspiracy to violate the espionage law.

WASHINGTON, June 21.—Anti-war propaganda of the International Bible Students Association was not only circulated in the trading camps in this country, but was sent under the guise of religious literature to the Italian army, said a statement issued tonight by the Department of Justice in connection with sentencing at New York today of Joseph P. Rutherford and six other officials.

The statement said the propaganda was sent to the Italian army in connection with the espionage law.

Formal complaint was made of the activities of the organization by the Italian government shortly before the trial in New York, according to the statement. The literature sent to the Italian army was mailed into Italy from Greece.

HELENA, Mont., June 21.—Chancellor E. C. Elliott, was directed by the State Board of Education today to make an immediate preliminary investigation of the public utterances and private teachings of two or three members of the faculty of the several in Helena, Mont., who were indicted by the Federal grand jury recently in connection with the Bixbee deportation on July 12, 1917.

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STAY WITH JOB-DISQUE

SPRUE PRODUCTION CHIEF ASKS FOR LOYAL EFFORT.

At Time Like This No One Has Right to Expect More Than Decent Living, Says Colonel.

On the eve of his departure for Spokane to help settle problems of the Loyalty League of Loggers and Lumbermen of the Inland Empire district, Colonel Bruce P. Disque wrote a stirring message to employers and employees of the Northwest asking for patriotic and co-operative with the Government to increase the efficiency of the spruce production division. This message was printed in the monthly bulletin of the Loyalty League of Loggers and Lumbermen. In part it follows:

"No American can continue profiteering during this war, whether he is a laboring man or an operator. All classes have done it and some of each class are still doing it, but gradually the practice is being discovered and stamped out."

"At a time when we are fixing the pay of a soldier at \$30 and sending him to make the supreme sacrifice no one has a right to expect more than a decent living, and before we win this war this Nation must go on such a basis. Public sentiment has changed greatly since we joined in the war and the time is here when a profiteer is looked upon as a traitor."

"One of the most difficult problems before this office is that of the turnover of labor. Since March 1 there has been an improvement in this of almost 50 per cent, but your Government still suffers from the inefficiency of labor due to excessive turnover, which must be reduced."

"This changing about from one job to another is largely due to a desire to increase one's income. This office is satisfied that the men of the Loyalty League of Loggers and Lumbermen realize the importance of remaining on the job, the efficiency of our operation will plunge ahead with a real punch."

"Your Government is acquainted with the conditions of the war and is doing it more and more. It is believed that we are getting a square deal and when evidence to the contrary is produced adjustments will be made."

"Therefore if all comes to this basic question: Have you absolute confidence in your Government and will you stand with your Government to the limit?"

NEW ORDER IS PROTESTED

Yeomanettes Fear They Will Lose Divisions of Army Life.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., June 21.—(Special.)—Several business yeomanettes, on duty in the 32nd Naval District, are worried because Captain Robert L. Russell, commander of the district, has issued an order that all yeomanettes must be in prescribed uniform by July 15. That part of the order that is the following sentence: "The uniform will be worn at all times. Many of the girls who are perfectly willing to wear the uniform while on duty assert that Captain Russell has forgotten that in their young lives there remain such things as dances, parties and the theater."

The Government allows the yeomanettes \$60 for clothes. The girls say that \$60 will not buy the complete uniform.

INDIANAPOLIS, June 21.—Leonard A. Snitkin, a Municipal Court Justice of New York, with his brother, Maurice L. Snitkin of Indianapolis and A. Joseph Schur were found guilty of conspiracy to obstruct the draft, in the United States District Court here this afternoon.

SACRAMENTO, June 21.—George F. Voetter, alleged industrial worker of the World, was found guilty today, by a jury, of conspiracy to obstruct the draft, in the United States District Court of having dynamite in his possession unlawfully on December 22 last, when he was arrested.

He was also found guilty of transporting dynamite unlawfully.

ROADS LOSE 250 MILLION

Heavy Deficit Recorded for Four Months of U. S. Operation.

CHICAGO, June 21.—The railways of the United States, after four months of Federal operation, show a deficit of \$250,000,000, according to computations announced today by the bureau of railway news and statistics of Chicago.

The figures show a decrease of \$123,294,182 when compared with the corresponding months of 1917. These figures were said to cover an average of 281,754 miles operated against an average of only 252,951 of Class 1 taken over by the Government.
