NEGRO IS SENTENCED.—Never use the hind-foot of a graveyard rabbit when you're on trial for your liberty. The truth of this assertion was brought home vividly to Bert Davis, a negro, yesterday when Circuit Judge Tucker sentenced him to an indeterminate term of six months to three years in the State penitentiary for assaulting Patrolman Bernard A. Smith, last. The negro shot the policeman in the arm while attempting to evade arrest. During his trial last week, Davis loudly lamented the loss of a rabbit foot which he had given to his attorney as a good luck token, but which the attorney promptly lost.

SPEED LIMIT STANDS.—Efforts to raise the speed limit on the approach to the Interstate bridge from 20 to 25 miles an hour failed yesterday, when a petition for such action filed by a group of car owners was denied by the County Commissioners. It was the unanimous opinion of the board that 20 miles an hour along this particular highway is sufficient for anybody. "As it is autoless already broken down eight of our light poles," declared Chairman Holman, in moving that the petition be denied.

BURNING CHAIR STUBS CAUSE TROUBLE.—Carelessness on the part of smokers in throwing lighted cigarette or cigar stubs on the bridges across the Willamette resulted in the arrest Sunday of George Falk and John Amabob. They received a fine of \$25 each in Municipal Court yesterday. Both had thrown burning stubs on the Burnside street bridge but their plea that they did not know an ordinance prohibiting the practice was in effect failed to bring them immunity.

LOAN CAPASTO ASK \$4000 FOR PROPERTY.—Another condemnation suit for the acquisition of property for the Marquam Gulch park and playground was started by the City of Portland yesterday in Circuit Judge Gantenbein's Court. Luigi Capastoto is defendant in the action. He demands \$4000 for his property which the City has appraised at \$15. The same difficulty in procuring jurors was experienced as in a case before Judge Kavanaugh last week and a special panel was drawn yesterday afternoon.

INJURED MAN NEAR DEATH.—Robert Potter, a farmer, aged 32, lies at the point of death at Good Samaritan Hospital from injuries received when caught in a chain hoist at Herman, Or., Saturday. Mr. Potter suffered fracture of one of his legs, internal injuries and the loss of one of his eyes. Lugen Combs, a neighbor, was drowned. Mr. Potter was brought to Portland by Dr. H. S. McKenzie, of Fossil.

SPEEDERS PAY PENALTY

RECKLESS DRIVERS FINED AND PLACED IN JAIL.

Judge Rossmann Gives Lawbreakers Chance to Study Traffic Ordinances While Guests of City.

Wilbur Carl, a University of Oregon student, yesterday found out that the reckless and fast driving of an automobile on Portland streets is a pastime not countenanced by the police officers. Municipal Judge Rossmann gave him an opportunity to absorb a knowledge of the traffic laws by holding him in jail for 10 hours. In addition a fine of \$25 was imposed.

W. L. Carman, also haled into court for reckless driving, received a sentence of 18 hours. Harry Smith, who had found the Linnton road a good place to test out his car, was held in jail for one day and paid a fine of \$25.

A. W. King drove his machine at a 35-mile clip along Lombard street, but was unable to explain to Judge Rossmann the reason for his behavior. He received a fine of \$40. He gave notice that he will appeal the case.

Other speeders who were fined yesterday included: E. C. Carman and L. Sutton, \$25 each; H. Fosberg, L. E. Elliott, W. Adams and E. Neustadter, \$20 each.

ARCHITECT DEMANDS \$6868

Litigation Over Vista House Contract Counted Probable.

That litigation is imminent in the controversy between the County Commissioners and Edgar M. Lazarus, architect who designed the Vista House, was indicated yesterday when Mr. Lazarus, through his attorney, Martin L. Pipes, presented his final bill to the board for payment. The board was asked to acknowledge receipt of the bill in order that the way may be cleared for further steps. Mr. Lazarus presents a total of \$6868.42 as the claim which he says remains unpaid.

The board refused to take any action yesterday and did nothing more than acknowledge receipt of the bill. The commissioners will oppose the payment of the claim as made by Mr. Lazarus. The final bill as presented yesterday includes a claim for \$222.25 for 54 trips which Mr. Lazarus made to the Vista House in his own machine.

HUN EFFIGIES TO DIE

Kaiser and Co-Workers to Be Plastered With Stickers.

IMAGES WILL BE RAISED

Portland War Stamp Buyers to Get Opportunity to Take Rap at Trio of "Scamps" When Purchasing Certificates at Temple.

Sometime this morning they're going to hale three rogues into Liberty Place, before Liberty Temple, and hold them up to the scorn of all Portland. Incidentally the trio must work at the task they like least—spurring on the war savings stamp campaign in Portland.

The three rogues are the Kaiser, Von Hindenburg and the Crown Prince, as they have been done in faithful effigy by Conrad Pedersen, designer of the Portland Sign Company, at the behest of the local lodge of Elks and the war stamp leaders. It is intended as a burlesque on the notorious wooden statue of Hindenburg, which Berliners drove full of rusty nails, to completely obliterate the trio during the Portland war stamp drive. Stickers will be issued to each purchaser of a war savings stamp, and the adhesive slips are to be plastered on any one of the choice lot.

"Cover these scamps with savings stamps!" is the appeal that the stickers carry.

"Hinky," as the designer conceived him, is a veritable ogre, gross and tushy, with his gray great-coat bearing decorations for the slaughter of Belgian children, for wine bibbling, and for like accomplishments. The royal Bill is a ludicrous clump, with his helmet topped by a dolorous raven. As for the Crown Prince, he wears the uniform of the Death's Head Hussars, a most preposterous nose, and as a decoration the slipper of a dancing girl. The effigy of the Crown Prince is 12 feet tall, and those of his accomplices are eight feet.

Three rare "birds" are they, that even in caricature are instantly known to all. The Elks' committee supervised their construction, and joined together in sign company in the cost. Before the twilight of next Friday they are to disappear beneath blankets of stickers.

BLAKE TO BE DEPORTED

SELF-STYLED SCOUT CONFESSES UNDER RAPID-FIRE PROBE.

Harrowing Tales of Atrocities "Suffered" Found to Be Purely Imaginary and Captive "Stuff" Faked.

Deportation of T. L. Blake, self-styled Australian Anzac Scout and impersonator of a Canadian army officer, to Canada and thence England is the probable next step in the career of the youthful impostor.

Sitting yesterday before a board of inquiry, consisting of officers of the Canadian recruiting station, United States immigration officials and inspectors of police, Blake weakened under a barrage of questions and told enough of his activities of the last three years to convince the officials that he has a police record in England as well as in Canada.

Although he could show no evidence of a discharge from the military service the officers now have no doubts but that he actually saw service as a private in France. When closely questioned he admitted that he never had been in a German hospital as a wounded captive and that the harrowing tales of atrocities he himself suffered were purely imaginary.

PAVING CONTRACTS LET

Warren Construction Company Is Awarded \$112,512 Work.

Contracts for the construction of \$112,512.13 of bitulithic pavement in various parts of Multnomah County were awarded to the Warren Construction Company yesterday by the County Commissioners. The work will be started at once and will be completed this summer.

The largest piece of work is on East Eighty-second street, from Division street to the county line. The contract price for this paving was fixed at \$45,134.80.
