JAPAN TO KEEP OUT

Intervention in Siberia Said to Be Called Off.

SUPPORT OF U. S. AWAITED

Tokio Press Tells Decision of Advisory Board to Refrain From Armed Action in Russia for Present.

TOKIO, Friday, June 21.—(By the Associated Press.)—The newspapers today report that as a result of the deliberations of the advisory board on diplomatic affairs Japan has decided not to comply with the request of the entente and to refrain from intervention in Siberia at present.

In diplomatic circles it is believed that Japan, unless directly menaced, will not act without support of the United States.

A PACIFIC PORT, June 25.—Prince Tokugawa, heading a Japanese Red Cross mission, declared here today that Japan is ready to send a large corps of Red Cross workers to France. He is authorized to make an offer of help if inspection reveals a need for workers, he said.

Prince Tokugawa's mission will visit American Army cantonments and Washington, D. C.

BILLION DOLLARS ASKED

SINNOTT INTRODUCES LAND BILL IN SENATE.

Reclaiming of Arid Areas to Provide Farms for Soldiers, Sailors and Marines Proposed.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, June 25.—Representative Sinnot, following up his movement to secure legislation that will provide suitable farms for returning veterans of the war with Germany, introduced a bill Monday which if enacted will get results proportionate with the cause he is seeking to serve.

His bill, in brief, authorizes the appropriation of amounts up to a maximum of \$1,000,000,000 for reclaiming arid lands to provide farms for soldiers and sailors, marines and Red Cross nurses who have seen service in

the war against the Kaiser and are honorably discharged.

The House public lands committee today filed its report on the Sinnot bill, as amended, providing for the acquisition by the Government of the lands of the Coos Bay wagon road grant.

As reported the bill provides that the land grant counties, Coos and Douglas, are to receive 25 per cent of the receipts from sales of lands taken over, the remaining 75 per cent to go into the Federal treasury.

Something over \$400,000 will be paid the counties in back taxes in addition to their 25 per cent and the wagon road company will receive \$232,000, which is at the rate of \$2.50 per acre.

When the bill comes up in the House Representative Sinnot will make a fight to get a portion of the receipts for the state and a portion for the reclamation fund, as was done in the case of the O. & C. grant.

PRISONERS TOPIC OF TALK

United States Asks Germany to Send Representatives to Conference.

WASHINGTON, June 25.—Germany has been asked through Spanish diplomatic channels to send representatives to Bern, Switzerland, to meet American representatives there on August 5 to discuss maintenance treatment and exchange of prisoners. In response to a proposal from the state department, the German government recently signified its agreement in principle to such a conference.

The United States also has asked Germany to permit a Swiss commission to visit German prison camps to determine what American prisoners may be classed as invalids and released for internment in Switzerland. Reciprocal privileges are promised.

Phelps, Dodge Loses Chairman.

NEW YORK, June 25.—Dr. James Douglas, for many years president and lately chairman of the board of directors of Phelps, Dodge & Co., copper mine owners, died at his home here today in his 81st year.

IRISH, HUNS IN PLOT

Secretary Shortt Says German Activity Real Menace.

COMMONS HEARS FACTS

Certain Residents of Emerald Isle Declared to Have Been Found in Communication With Germans.

LONDON, June 25.—Edward Shortt, chief secretary for Ireland, speaking in the House of Commons today on the Irish question, said he hoped to satisfy the House that the German plot in Ireland was a real and imminent danger to this country.

He said he was satisfied that both the clergy and the Nationalists had used their influence, respectively, to assist in keeping the peace.

Secretary Shortt said the government had found that Germany was in touch with Ireland and that not only were messages going to Ireland from a German source, but that they were going from Irish sources to Germany.

The collapsible boat in which the man, who now is a prisoner, landed in Ireland from a submarine, Mr. Shortt said, was made of canvas similar to that made at Hanover before the war.

Mr. Shortt said the government knew that in a certain port of Germany a large amount of ammunition was loaded into a German submarine and that, moreover, submarines had been seen in localities where the destruction of shipping could not have been their object.

Premier Lloyd George urged the need of settling the Irish problem because it was increasing the difficulties not merely of the British government, but

the difficulties of the United States Government in conducting the war.

OPERATORS GET OLD JOBS

Union Men to Be Reinstated by Postal Telegraph Company.

SEATTLE, Wash., June 25.—Union telegraph operators who were locked out recently by the Postal Telegraph Company because, they claimed, of their union affiliations, today were reinstated, it was announced.

Thirty-five operators were affected. The union took their old places tonight or tomorrow, it was expected.

Dr. Boyd Talks at Camp Lewis.

CAMP LEWIS, Tacoma, June 25.—Dr. John Boyd, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of Portland, this afternoon addressed the 316th Field Signal Battalion in Y. M. C. A. No. 8, the entire battalion being assembled for the patriotic address. Tonight he addresses the 316th. Train and military police at the same place.

Sugar Administrator Named.

WASHINGTON, June 25.—Food Administrator Hoover has selected G. A. Zabriskie of the milling division of the administration, to become sugar administrator and direct enforcement of drastic new sugar regulations which are to be announced shortly effective July 1.

Republican Senator Wins.

WASHINGTON, June 25.—Senator Sutherland of West Virginia, Republican, is entitled to his seat in the United States Senate, the Senate privileges and elections committee decided today in dismissing the election contest brought a year ago by ex-Senator Chilton, Democrat.

Paris Placed in Army Zone.

PARIS, June 25.—President Poincare today signed a decree declaring the Department of the Seine, which includes Paris, within the army zone.

Astoria Laundryman Fined \$150.

ASTORIA, Or., June 25.—(Special.)—

Julius Bakk, whose laundry was raided by the police a few days ago, when a quantity of liquor was seized, was found guilty this afternoon on a charge of having liquor in his possession illegally and fined \$150. He gave notice of appeal to the Circuit Court. A similar charge against Mrs. Bakk was dismissed.

U.S. MAY TAKE PHONE LINES

Action Expected if Companies Fail in War Service.

CHICAGO, June 25.—A warning to the more than 1000 members of the United States Independent Telephone Association in convention here today that Government ownership of all telephone lines must be expected unless the companies make good in carrying out war obligations to the Government and the investors, was sounded by F. B. Mackinnon, of Washington, vice-president.

Gardner Kellogg Dies.

SEATTLE, June 25.—Gardner Kellogg, pioneer, former Seattle postmaster, and one time local fire chief, died here last night.

Dynamite Explodes at Tunnel.

MONTREAL, June 25.—The explosion of a quantity of dynamite near the mouth of the Canadian Northern Railway tunnel here late today caused considerable property damage, but not loss of life. Windows were smashed a mile away.

Lake Residents File Petition.

SALEM, Or., June 25.—(Special.)—J. E. McCool, of Lakeview, and several others have petitioned the State Water Board for an adjudication of the water rights on Thomas Creek in Lake County.
