

FIRE SUFFERERS IN CLE ELUM HELPED

Relief Supplies Arrive and 1800 Homeless Are Receiving Good Care.

COAL MINES AGAIN OPEN

Loss, in Destruction of 205 Dwellings Does Not Include Numerous Shacks of Miners—Damage Will Be at Least \$1,000,000.

CLE ELUM, Wash., June 26.—(Special.)—Mayor Baumer and the executive relief committee tonight made a statement that 205 homes, 29 mercantile establishments, three churches, a sawmill and a creamery had been destroyed and that the most pressing need was children's clothing and shoes, provisions and money to carry on relief work and to rehabilitate the miners in their homes. The 205 residences do not include many shacks in which miners lived, said the Mayor. "On some lots there would be many foreign miners living in shacks and boarding in the home of some married miner of their own nation."

The property loss is at least \$1,000,000. A Free Restaurant Closed. The committee closed the free restaurant tonight and will issue provisions to families tomorrow. One hundred and ten tents arrived on evening trains, while the Red Cross civilian relief committee has 2000 blankets and about 200 portable stoves.

Ellensburg sent two automobile loads of potatoes and green vegetables today and a carload will arrive from Ellensburg. They also sent in an automobile load of vegetables. Promises of help are coming from nearly every city in the Northwest.

The Mayor and his committee said that after the immediate needs are satisfied, many thousands of dollars will be required to get the miners rehoused in their homes. It will be necessary to issue foodstuffs for several days, and perhaps weeks. The number of children in a family among the foreign population is high, many families having 10 and 12 children. These families are largely dependent on their earnings and these have been largely destroyed by the terrific heat.

Relief Work Done. The Northwest division of the Red Cross, citizens and relief officials are here assisting materially in the work. Kittitas County chapter Red Cross officials have taken charge of distribution of tents and blankets. Adjutant-General Moss made a night drive in his automobile from Seattle last night, arriving this morning, and is ready to assist in all work.

The fear that many miners will leave the community and make a shortage of help in the mines is prompting the city officials to appeal for outside financial assistance. The Independent Coal Company has agreed to furnish tents to floor tents for all their employees and to equip them with cots and bedding, and will allow credit at stores until the men can begin to get on their feet. Officials are hoping other mining companies will make similar provisions to care for other miners.

Miners Return to Work. The three coal mines at Cle Elum have resumed operations. The miners who were the heaviest losers taking up their work again while the rebuilding of their homes is going on.

Numerous instances of where valuables were recovered by their owners in poking about the ruins of their homes came to light today. Pleasant Guigal, a miner, is said to have recovered a metal box containing \$1800 in cash which he had buried in his cellar.

YAKIMA, Wash., June 26.—W. P. Folsie, of Seattle, chairman of the home service division of the Northwest Red Cross, has taken charge of the relief work for the 1300 Cle Elum residents rendered homeless by the fire which destroyed the greater part of the little mining city yesterday. Persons from Ellensburg and other nearby towns and a number from this city are assisting in the relief work.

Workers and supplies have also been brought to Seattle. Yakima Red Cross workers have assumed the burden of relief, and about 30 workers in charge of W. P. Folsie will go to Cle Elum with supplies for 100 persons.

NAVAL RESERVES LEAVE

RECRUITING PARTY OFF TONIGHT FOR PUGET SOUND.

Success Crowns Efforts of Ensign F. B. Upham and Party on Trip Through Oregon.

The naval reserves' traveling recruiting party, in charge of Ensign F. B. Upham, which has been located at 252 Alder street for the past week, will leave tonight for the United States Navy-yard, Puget Sound, Wash. It will have completed one of the most successful recruiting drives ever staged by a naval recruiting party in Western Oregon.

There has been some confusion as to what the naval reserves are. The enrollment of men in the naval reserve force was authorized by Congress in October, 1916, the object being to build up and train a large body of men who could step in during an emergency and help man the great fleet of Uncle Sam's fighting craft. The work of the navy the past year has been to enroll the reserves who are not enlisted for Coast defense service, but for general service, and may be sent to any part of the globe.

Men who wish to enlist in the naval reserves or United States Navy may apply at the Navy recruiting headquarters in the Dekum building.

Moore to Be Arrested. Warrant out for Golden West Hotel proprietor.

Boniface Accused of Helping Suspects to Escape During Police Search of Premises.

A warrant was sworn out last night for the arrest of George Moore, proprietor of the Golden West Hotel, 341 Everett street, who is charged by Officer C. E. Parker of the war emergency squad with assisting in the escape of a man who officers appeared to search the premises.

The hotel conducted by George Moore has recently figured prominently in raids conducted by members of the war emergency squad. Arrests have always followed.

The officers found a gambling game in progress in the hotel. Moore appeared later and posted \$25 bail money for the release of each prisoner.

Men have been arrested on his premises for bootlegging and in each case Moore has always supplied the necessary bail money for the release of the offenders, say the officers.

Negro porters and dining-car waiters who have been arrested at the Union Depot and the North Bank Station for violating the prohibition law are shortly afterward released when Moore appears at the police headquarters and furnishes the required bail, it is alleged.

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W. W. Walker said he was introduced to Davidson by Sagalla as "a bootlegger." He testified that he made four trips here with the former tailor. He had heard the conversation between Davidson and Sagalla with reference to obtaining five-gallon kegs instead of 10-gallon size, and had been present when some of the tanks were being filled in the liquor house in San Francisco, Walker told the jury.

Donald Nix Testified. During the cross-examination of Donald Nix the name of Policeman S. E. Vessey, officer at the Union station, again came into the record. Nix told how he entered the bootlegging game through offers made by Edmunds at a time when he "went broke" in San Francisco and needed money.

He related how he had told Officer Vessey that a friend was bringing in several trunks in which were small quantities of whiskey, and how Vessey accompanied him when the train bearing these trunks arrived. Nix declared that \$25 had been paid the officer, of which Edmunds had put up \$20. He made up the extra amount himself, he said, in order to gain the officer's good will, the amount promised having been but "\$20 or \$25."

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GLASS BANK IN GRIP

Methods of Bootleggers Laid Bare in Court.

NOVEL SUITCASES FILLED

Further Interesting Disclosures Are Promised by Government in Trial of Alleged Conspirators Who Brought Liquor to Portland.

Testimony given yesterday in the joint trial of Alex Davidson, Lambert Whitehurst and George Smith, charged with complicity in the bootlegging conspiracy which landed large quantities of intoxicants in Portland, was largely in the nature of corroboration of the stories told on the stand by H. B. Edmunds and Joe Sagalla. The trial has been in progress in Federal Court before Judge Bean since last Friday.

Edmunds, Bolt, familiarly known as "Ben" Bolt, detailed incidents of the one and only bootlegging trip he had made with Sagalla to the former tailor.

Suitcase "Tanks" Held Liquor. By the prosecution he was led to dwell especially on the manner in which he met Sagalla and saw him in the act of filling one of his novel suitcase tanks from a demijohn in the Blue Ribbon Beer Company establishment, of which Davidson is the head.

Six grips and suitcases were brought to Portland on the trip, said Bolt, and all were dropped from the train as they reached the city limits to avoid apprehension. One of the tanks was broken by the fall and lost its contents, he stated.

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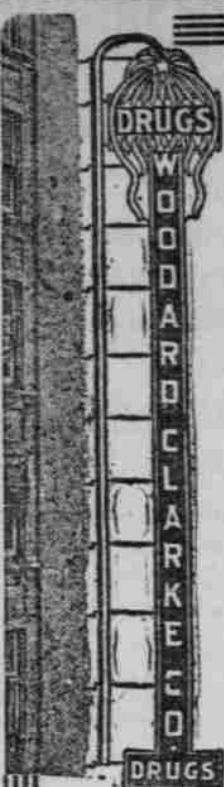
