YANKS FIGHT TO END

Germans Tell How Americans Refuse to Surrender.

TWO ARE OVERPOWERED

Teuton Newspaper Correspondent Describes Gallant Conduct of Party of U. S. Troops Who Were Surrounded by Hun Forces.

AMSTERDAM, June 27.—Telegraphing from the German headquarters on the Lorraine front under date of June 27, Herman Katsch, war correspondent of the Koelnische Volks Zeitung, says: “In the course of our dashing attack to the north of Remenches Wood (north-west of Seicheprey), the American occupants of a position which had been untouched by our preparatory fire refused to surrender and fought heroically, outnumbered to the last. We could only bring in as prisoners two men who were overpowered.”

Hun Methods Feared. The dispatch goes on to say that these two prisoners declared their detachment had fought so desperately because they had been told that Germans tortured and mutilated prisoners, which, the correspondent, of course, qualified as a base calumny.

WITH THE AMERICAN FORCES ON THE MARNE, June 27.—(By the Associated Press.)—The number of prisoners captured by the Americans in their drive on German positions in the Beaulieu Wood sector Tuesday night was officially increased today to 311. The Americans also captured 11 big machine guns, ten automatic rifles, a quantity of small arms and ammunition and other material.

New Positions Consolidated. The night was comparatively quiet on the whole Marne front. The Americans were kept busy consolidating their new positions. The additional prisoners mostly were stragglers found

Ex-Reporter and Ambulance Driver Soon to Return to France.

NEWPORT, Or., June 27.—(Special.)—Joseph Patterson, formerly a reporter on The Oregonian and later an ambulance driver in France, is visiting friends in this city. He had just received an appointment for active work once more at the Army front, and in a few days will leave for his home in Pittsburgh and arrange for departure overseas. For years Mr. Patterson has been a regular summer visitor at this resort. He left yesterday for Siletz River in company with Lester Martin, where he will fish.

An effort is being made by those in charge of the spruce workers to have Mr. Patterson visit as many of the camps as possible and tell the boys in knaki about life on the battlefield.

LIME PLANT GOES AHEAD

State Board Will Complete and Operate Gold Hill Factory.

GOLD HILL, Or., June 27.—(Special.)—Benton Bowers, of Ashland, member of the State Lime Board, announces that the board will continue to construct and operate the Gold Hill plant, which will be completed about the first of August. Funds to continue operation will be forthcoming, pledged on the credit of members of the board until such time the State Emergency Board or the next Legislature comes to their relief.

The plant will be operated without storage bunkers until funds are provided for their construction, by grinding the limestone and conveying it into the cars on the siding. A shortage of cars will necessarily close the plant.

CURRY COUNTY NEEDS RAIN

Dairymen Already Feeding Herds Newly Mown Hay.

MARSHFIELD, Or., June 27.—(Special.)—George Wilson, a resident of Curry County, who lives in the vicinity of Humboldt Mountain, declares that rain in Langlois, in Curry County, the season is dryer than for many years. Mr. Wilson says dairymen have been obliged to feed their herds newly mown hay in many instances, the vegetation on the higher ranges having dried up.

No rain has fallen in Curry County south of Langlois since April 15, and the ranchers are looking forward to a trying summer and possible loss of stock. They also expect disastrous fires unless rain falls within the next two weeks.

BUYERS BIDDING FOR WOOL

Government Maximum Prices Exceeded, Says Dealer.

MARSHFIELD, Or., June 27.—(Special.)—J. E. Gates, a wool buyer, who passed through here to negotiate for the Curry County wool clip, is quoted as saying competitors in the wool business are bidding much higher in many instances. He quoted 65 cents as being paid by some buyers.

Mr. Gates, in the face of recent Government statements that there is no scarcity of wool and none anticipated, said he expected to see the people of the United States wearing cotton before winter.

NEW MOTOR MARVEL

Liberty Engine Success, Says Colonel Disque.

EXPERTS DECLARE IT BEST

Wages and Hours of Labor in Inland Empire Timber Industry Placed in Hands of Government Spruce Chief.

SPOKANE, Wash., June 27.—(Special.)—“There has been considerable criticism of the aircraft programme and the Liberty motor, and I want to tell Spokane people that I was in the Dayton-Wright Company's plant in Ohio last month and that while they are not turning out as many machines as they would like, production is gaining every day.”

This was one of the statements made today by Colonel Bruce P. Disque, head of spruce production for the Government on the Pacific Coast, at a luncheon of the Chamber of Commerce military affairs committee.

One of the machines, which was equipped with four machine guns, its own wireless plant, its camera machine and its own heating plant, and as we went up I never had the slightest doubt that the machine would carry us to earth again,” said Colonel Disque. “Immediately after the machine landed it took about ten or twelve hours and you know an engine which heats up cannot do that.”

“I have talked to many men who have driven the new Liberty engine airplanes, both foreigners and Americans, and every one declared the Liberty motor the greatest he had ever driven.” Wages, hours of labor and working conditions in the timber industry of the Inland Empire were placed under review in the hands of Colonel Disque by representatives of the 33 largest lumber manufacturers and logging companies of the district at a meeting here today.

Similar action was taken by representatives of 25,000 employees of timber concerns in this section at a meeting here last Saturday, and Colonel Disque announced that he would issue a bulletin within a week fixing new wage and labor conditions.

Under a schedule issued by the spruce production division, which became effective April 23, 43½ cents an hour was fixed as the basic wage for common labor in woods and mills of the Inland Empire, with increases for expert labor. An increase over this scale is expected.

BORAH TALKS TO WILSON

CONFERENCE IS HELD CONCERNING SITUATION IN RUSSIA.

If Commission Is Sent to Russia to Undo Hun Propaganda, Idaho Senator May Lead Party.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, June 27.—Senator Borah, who today called on the President to solicit his aid in getting the Government to build a branch of the Oregon Short Line into the coal fields of Southeastern Idaho, had a prolonged talk with the President last regarding the Russian situation.

For some months, since his Russian speech, Senator Borah has been accepted as the leader of the movement to extend substantial aid to Russia and he and the President it is understood, are now largely in accord.

While the President's views were not made public, it is understood he is now seriously contemplating the sending of an American commission to Russia to set this country right in the eyes of the Russian people, and to undo the vicious work of German propagandists who succeeded in creating a widespread belief in Russia that the United States is a Government of the money power for the oppression of the poor. If such a commission goes to Russia, Senator Borah is likely to be among its members, if not at its head.

School Bond Issue Barred.

ASTORIA, Or., June 27.—(Special.)—The Astoria School Board received a letter today from the capital issues committee of Washington declining to authorize the proposed \$125,000 issue of school district bonds for new school buildings. This means that the board will be compelled to reopen the Shively

building next Fall and erect either portables or temporary structures for the increased number of pupils in the west and east ends of the city.

Godsol to Be Extradited.

WASHINGTON, June 27.—Frank J. Godsol, a French citizen, held here on charges of the French government that he profited several millions of dollars on motor truck contracts, was held today by the District Court for extradition to France.
