**ADVISERS URGED TO HELP**

Men in Many Cases Find It Difficult to Fill Out Blanks—Draft Board Officials Swamped With Work.

Completed questionnaires are beginning to come in to draft boards of the state from the young men who registered on June 5. To the last of whom blanks were mailed yesterday. The initial mailing of 25 per cent of the documents went out on Tuesday.

**TARIFFS MAY GO UP**

Lift in Intrastate Express Rates Sought.

**STATE PERMISSION ASKED**

New Company Created by Merger of Old Concerns, Which Takes Control on July 1, Proposes 10 Per Cent Advance.

SALEM, Or., June 28.—(Special.)—A general increase of 10 per cent in all intrastate express rates will be asked for by the American Railway Express Company, the new company created by the merger of all old companies, and which takes control on July 1.

This prospective increase in intrastate rates in Oregon is indicated in a telegram received today by the Public Service Commission from D. S. Elliott, of the company, in New York City, in which the commission is asked if it will accept for filing on five days' notice such increased rates on first and second-class merchandise in block tariffs.

The commission replied that it would accept such tariffs for filing on 10 days' statutory notice. "Specific intrastate commodity rates as published by F. G. Ains in Tariff I. C. C. No. C-1252, and other specific commodity rates put in on order of this commission, cannot be

advanced without formal hearing and appropriate order," the commission adds.

"This action does not indicate that the proposed tariffs will be accepted as final by the commission," said Commissioner Buchtel today. "It merely means that the commission will accept such tariffs for filing under the Oregon law, and they will be subject to further consideration and review by the commission, if it so deems fit."

While it is not made definite in the letter received today, it is evident that the company may plan to do away with class rates altogether, and in event this is done in many instances a much higher increase than 10 per cent will be asked for. An instance is indicated in a complaint received from the Deschutes Ice Company at Bend today in which an increase of from 25 cents to 49 cents was shown contemplated on ice shipments. This is considerably more than a 10 per cent increase and apparently is based on an abandonment of the class rate on ice, basing the increase on a commodity block tariff rate.

The specific commodity rates mentioned in the commission's reply telegram include milk, butter, vegetables, laundry, ice, crabs and shellfish, and similar shipments which, in specific cases between certain points take a specific commodity rate, which is lower than the second-class rates.

"The commission will follow the legal procedure in regard to these proposed increases," said Commissioner Buchtel. "It is powerless to do otherwise, and when the tariffs are filed they will be considered accordingly."

**MR. WEST TO GO ABROAD**

EX-GOVERNOR TO UNDERTAKE MISSION FOR SHIPPING BOARD.

Former Oregon Chief Executive Says That U. S. Senatorial Candidacy Will Have to Care for Itself.

"I plan to leave Portland soon after July 4 for Washington to confer with Edward N. Hurley, president of the Emergency Fleet Corporation, regarding a mission to Europe, which I shall undertake," announced Oswald West,

ex-Governor of Oregon, last night. "Recently I received a telegram from Mr. Hurley asking if I would go to Washington for a conference, indicating July 15 as the time, with a view to making a trip to Europe, and a few days ago I advised him that I would accept the duty to proceed abroad. I do not know the details of the mission, its nature not having been disclosed, and I do not wish to speculate, though I am convinced it has to do with shipping matters."

When in Washington during the last several months, ex-Governor West has interested himself in shipbuilding features having to do with Oregon yards and prospective contracts, and that, together with his relations with the Administration, is probably responsible for him having been selected. Other things transpiring of late have lent

color to reports that the Shipping Board is reaching out in the Pacific, as well as in the Atlantic, toward improvements in the way of foreign connections.

Naturally the inference here is that Ex-Governor West's mission is of a diplomatic character and that it will take him to France as well as England. Evidently he is prepared to proceed across the Atlantic whether the detail is as he assumes, or whether it takes on some other aspect, trusting to his friends to look after the Senatorial battle while he is closer to the real war as enacted on the other side.

Mr. West said last night that his campaign for election to the United States Senate on the Democratic ticket would have to take care of itself in his absence.

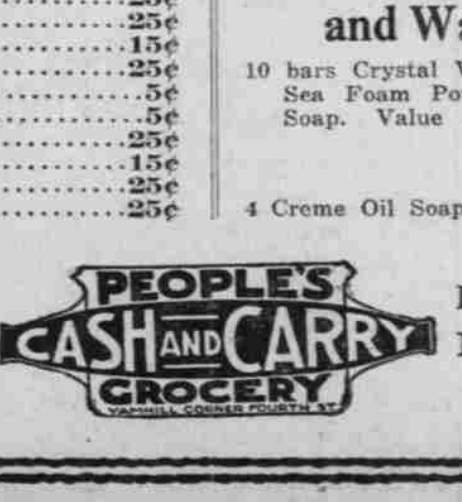
