

BRITAIN RALLIES UNDER U. S. FLAG

Mother Country Joins in Big
Celebration—Friendship
Ties Cemented.

SPECIAL SERVICES HELD

Central Hall, London, Scene of For-
may Ceremonies of Day—Bryce,
Sims, Biddle, Churchill
Deliver Addresses.

LONDON, July 4.—The British people today added the Fourth of July to the anniversaries that they celebrate. All England, from metropolis to hamlet, joined in ceremonies commemorating an event in Anglo-American history heretofore recalled by England with feeling devoid of rejoicing.

Announcement from Washington that America had sent her first million troops kindled immense enthusiasm and gave impetus to the celebration. Wherever there were American soldiers and sailors they were entertained with great hospitality.

All London Flies U. S. Flag.
The Fourth began in London on Wednesday night. Theaters, clubs, music-halls were decorated with the Stars and Stripes and several thousand American soldiers and sailors on leave were entertained at various places.

American flags are out on official and business buildings all over London. For the second time in history the Stars and Stripes waved above the great tower of the Parliament buildings in Westminster alongside the Union Jack.

The American flag also on the Lord Mayor's mansion in the heart of the city. Many English people wore small American flags on their coats.

Bryce Addresses Meeting.
The formal celebration began with a fellowship meeting in Central Hall, across the street from Westminster Abbey. Five hundred seats there were allotted to American soldiers and sailors. The meeting opened with the band of the Coldstream Guards playing the "Star-Spangled Banner."

Viscount Bryce, former Ambassador to the United States, presided and spoke feelingly of the past and present relations between the two countries.

Churchill Voices Greetings.
Winston Spencer Churchill, Minister of Munitions, then proposed "a greeting to the President and people of the United States. This was seconded by Arthur Meighan, Canadian Minister of the Interior."

Major George H. Putnam, of New York, proposed a resolution expressing "profound satisfaction that the two great English-speaking races find themselves for the first time fighting side by side in the cause of justice and liberty."

The resolution was seconded by Professor Canby, of Yale University. Vice-Admiral Sims, commander of the American naval forces in the war zone, and General Pershing, commander of the American army, followed. The meeting concluded with the singing of "God Save the King."

Wounded Fighters Attend.
All American organizations in London had representatives at the meeting and blocks of seats were set aside for wounded British, French, Belgian and Italian soldiers.

At noon the bells of St. Paul's and the Southwark Cathedral were rung. The dean of Westminster conducted a special service at the meeting.

At which the "Battle Hymn of the Republic" was sung and the "Star-Spangled Banner" was played. The Rev. J. H. Towse read a special service in Westminster Chapel and services were conducted in many other churches.

Concert Given by Y. M. C. A.
The band of the Irish Guards gave a concert in the morning at the Eagle Hut of the American Y. M. C. A., which is the headquarters for American soldiers.

In opening the meeting in Central Hall, Viscount Bryce, who presided, said in part:

"The new world has come to redress the balance of the old, its fresh and fiery spirit has the promise of victory. This spirit, this zeal to serve the cause of right, this sense of common duty and common purpose in these perils which the American and British soldier-citizen armies drawn from the people are facing side by side—all this has brought Great Britain and America closer than ever they were under one government before the far-off day of independence which we are celebrating here."

"Now, these things will be the surest pledge of affection and co-operation in the future, stretching before us as far as human thought can reach. Britain and America, to quote and adapt the famous words of Pitt, have altogether led the world of freedom by their example. Together they will save it, they will save it for freedom by their exertions."

U. S. Navy Brigaded.
Remembering that the press had emphasized the fact that American troops had been brigaded with the British and French, Admiral Sims said he wanted to call attention to the fact that for nearly a year all the American naval forces in European waters had been brigaded with British and other allied forces.

"It is unnecessary," said Admiral Sims, "to state that the reason for this has no connection with the competence of the Admirals to direct their own forces. From the very beginning it was established as an inflexible policy that unity of command and direction was a prime requisite for success."

The American forces, he declared, were small compared to the united naval forces, but they had performed their duties to the satisfaction of their supreme commanders.

America's naval effort was not at an end, although she has in the European waters 250 ships, 30,000 officers and 40,000 men serving in all the European areas from the Adriatic to the White Sea. In the coming year, more than three times the present number of destroyers will be fighting with the allies and more than 150 submarine chasers will be in the war zone. More than half of them are here now.

Submarine Menace Felled.
"The submarine campaign has been met," the Admiral asserted. "At the present time the allies are sinking submarines faster than they are being built and building ships faster than they are being sunk."

Speaking as the representative of the American Army, General Biddle said that in the vicinity of almost every city in the United Kingdom are Americans either in transit or in training. Everywhere was displayed the same friendliness and generosity by authorities and individuals.

"I can assure you," he said, "that we all feel this deeply and from this day, added to the many that have preceded and the many that will follow, will result in an understanding and respect and liking between America and Great Britain which will last as long as the countries last—and that is forever."

Referring to the movement of American troops to the battlefield, General Biddle said:

"The significant thing about soldiers and sailors we see in London today of those marching along the streets of your cities and living in your camps is that we have 10,000,000 just like them who can and will be brought over here when they are needed."

Joy and Gratitude Expressed.
In his speech at the fellowship meeting, Winston Spencer Churchill, Minister of Munitions, said in part:

"We desire to express to our American kith and kin our joy and gratitude for the mighty aid they are bringing. The presence in Europe of a million American soldiers, awaiting side by side with their French and British comrades, the ultimate victory of the common enemy, is an event that seems to transcend the limits of purely mundane things and fills us with the deepest awe. Amid the carnage, the unrelenting grief and the desolation, I am convinced that the world is being guided toward something better and much finer than has ever been known."

Arthur Meighan, following Mr. Churchill, denounced in scathing terms the sinking of the hospital ship, Lianoverry Castle, by a German submarine. "It is better that the world should perish than that those murderers should live," he declared.

Referring to the American Declaration of Independence, Mr. Meighan said: "A country cannot be wholly lost to liberty that is not wholly lost to liberty."

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Reckless Driving Causes Death.
ASTORIA, Or., July 4.—(Special.)—Reckless driving caused the death of the late Calle Jaakkala, according to the verdict of the coroner's jury, following an inquest held this afternoon.

Jaakkala was fatally injured on June 23, when an automobile in which he was riding was struck by a truck driven by William Johnson, plunged over an embankment and was wrecked. The verdict has been expected. Johnson will be prosecuted on a charge of manslaughter.

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SHIPYARD BURNS; LOSS \$1,500,000

Orange Maritime Corporations
Plant in Louisiana
Total Loss.

3 VESSELS ARE DESTROYED

Two Men, One Said to Be Swedish
Subject, Arrested—Naval Bar-
racks at Sewells Point
Are in Ashes.

ORANGE, Tex., July 4.—Federal and Texas maritime officers are investigating the fire which early this morning destroyed the entire plant of the Orange Maritime Corporation on the Louisiana side of the Sabine River, valued at \$1,000,000, and three half-completed 2,000-ton schooners valued at \$225,000 each.

Two men, one said to be a Swedish subject, are under arrest. Their names are withheld.

Charred bodies of two men, one believed to be a contractor of New York, and one, that of an old man, an employee, have been found.

CAPE MAY, N. J., July 4.—Fire of unknown origin which started while the enlisted men were on parade today destroyed the naval barracks at Sewell's Point, near here. The loss is estimated at more than \$500,000.

VANCOUVER, B. C., July 4.—The logging camp and equipment of Bloedel, Welch & Stewart, in the Powell River district of British Columbia, was destroyed by a forest fire yesterday. Loss was estimated at \$50,000.

The same fire today was reported to be threatening two billion feet of timber near by, considered one of the finest "timber stands" in the province.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 4.—Dismembered bodies of three boys were brought to the coroner's office for identification early today after an explosion of picric acid when a lighted match was dropped in the warehouse of a fireworks plant here. Another boy, John Brennan, 16 years old, was burned severely about the face and hands.

One victim was identified as Louis Stener. The other two were shattered beyond recognition.

Young Stener told police he and four other boys entered the warehouse to steal fireworks.

A number of structures of the fireworks plant were destroyed by explosion and fire. Damage was done to several dwellings in the vicinity.

KILLING IS PLANNED
TOLEDO SLAYER AND SUICIDE
WRITES OF INTENTIONS.

Message Is Written on Window of
Car and Is Read by Carol G.
Roberts, of Bakersfield, Cal.

NEWPORT, Or., July 4.—(Special.)—The condition of Orin G. Flowers' mind prior to his killing his wife and committing suicide Tuesday at Toledo, in a jealous rage over Lee Davis, a music dealer of Toledo, who formerly of the Willamette Valley, was revealed here today in a peculiar manner.

Carol G. Roberts, of Bakersfield, Cal., who arrived Tuesday night, addressed a stranger at the breakfast table in the Abbey House and inquired if he knew Orin G. Flowers.

"On the window sill of the Corvallis & Eastern Railroad coach I read this peculiar message," said Mr. Roberts. "I am going back to Toledo to see my wife, Imogene Altree, and there is going to be something doing. We are both going on a long journey."

Part of the message was printed and the rest written evidently by a lead pencil pressed down hard enough to indent the varnish. Mr. Roberts had been traveling all day and had seen no newspapers of that day. He was greatly astonished to learn that Flowers had killed himself and wife on the morning of the day he had read the message. The day before Flowers had thrashed Davis' son, Lee, and had been out of his store in Toledo. A group of about 10 soldiers were with Flowers, who was a soldier, to give him moral support during the fight.

Medical Inspection Pays
Albany School Board Plans to Ex-
tend Work Next Year.

ALBANY, Or., July 4.—(Special.)—Pleased with the first year's work in medical inspection of students of the local schools, the Albany School Board is planning for more extensive work along this line during the coming school year. Dr. G. E. Riggs, who has in charge of this work, has reported results to the School Board, and while the interest shown by parents was somewhat lacking, much good was accomplished. It is believed that next year parents generally will take an interest in suggestions made for the improvement of their children's health with the ultimate object of better mental development.

The School Board also is planning to inaugurate a system of compulsory physical training. The schools have adequate facilities for this work and it is planned to have courses in physical exercises for all students.

bers of a local motor party declare the Central Oregon roads are in good condition. The journey was made by way of Tygh Valley and the Warm Springs reservoir.

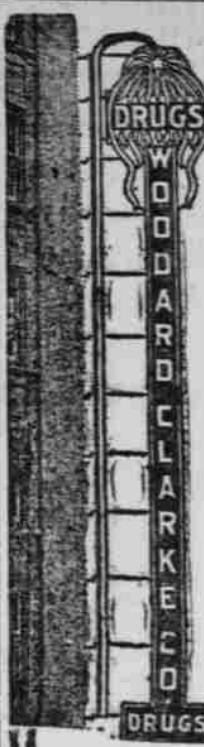
