

GERMANY NOTES AMERICA'S MIGHT

Teuton Opinion of This Nation
Changes When Yankees
Appear in Trenches.

BAKER DENOUNCES HUNS

Secretary of War, in Chicago Speech,
Says Teutons Have Corrupted
Religion to Make Almighty
Partner of Kaiser.

CHICAGO, July 4.—Declaring that the war can have but one end, a league of liberty to vindicate the principles of freedom, Newton D. Baker, Secretary of War, tonight addressed more than 5000 persons at a Fourth of July patriotic meeting.

Just one year ago Germany regarded the United States with contempt, he said, but that feeling has changed, now that "1,000,000 Americans face them in the trenches from the channel to the Swiss frontier, fighting them as bravely as any antagonist they have ever met or ever will meet."

Picturing Germany as a nation which had even corrupted its religion to picture God as a partner in the crime, Baker said that the most unfortunate of all nations, France as depicted in black, but with her spirit entirely unbroken, and Great Britain as determined to keep up her sacrifices on the altar of freedom, he declared that the triumph of the principle of heart over head and right over might was certain.

ROCKFORD, Ill., July 4.—Newton D. Baker, Secretary of War, addressed the soldiers of the 86th Division at Camp Grant today.

"You are the army of a free people," he declared, speaking from a roped arena prepared for boxing contests and addressing thousands of troops grouped on a hillside before him. "Your country is sending you to rescue France from the heel of an invader who represents, we hope, the last principle of the autocratic and despotic upon this earth of ours."

"When your victory is finally won it will mean that there will be no more servient populations to be governed by victors and it will rescue the very principles of liberty for the sons of men everywhere. You are going to have the great privilege of seeing the final vindication of right on the very frontiers of freedom."

MANY CITIES CELEBRATE
Hundred Thousand Mostly of Foreign Origin Parade at New York.

NEW YORK, July 4.—More than 100,000 men and women—mostly Americans of foreign origin—representatives of 34 nationalities, were in line today behind a contingent of American fighting men in a patriotic parade and pageant.

The last contingent composed of Russians, Ukrainians, Mexicans and Hungarians was not due to assemble until 6 P. M., or 10 hours after the first section formed in line.

PHILADELPHIA, July 4.—Native Americans and citizens of foreign birth joined here today in a spectacular celebration of Independence Day.

Nearly 100,000 foreign-born men, women and children paraded, and then delegates representing 30 nationalities marched to Independence Hall, where they signed a pledge of allegiance in the room where the Declaration of Independence was signed, the furniture used by Jefferson and his fellow patriots being used today.

WASHINGTON, July 4.—Nations allied with the United States in the world war united in the celebration of Independence Day at the Nation's capital.

More than 10,000 persons took part in a gigantic pageant entitled "Democracy Triumphant" given on the grounds surrounding the Washington monument.

CLIFFSIDE PARK, N. J., July 4.—The German Emperor was executed in effigy here today as a part of the independence day celebration. The "Emperor" was taken from the streets, a mock trial held and was lined up against a wall and shot by a detachment of soldiers.

LA CROSSE, Wis., July 4.—An effigy of the Kaiser, replying inside a coffin, marked "The Kaiser's Funeral," was one of the popular features of the independence day parade here this morning.

NEW BEDFORD, Mass., July 4.—In this city where American-Japanese friendship began nearly three quarters of a century ago, Viscount Ishii, the Japanese Ambassador, today dedicated his nation's whole-hearted devotion to the cause of liberty and paid tribute to America's part in the war.

The Ambassador presented to the neighboring township of Fair Haven a Japanese sword of the 14th century as a mark of appreciation of kindness shown by the township people in 1850 to a Japanese sailor who lived eight years after being brought in by a whaler to New Bedford.

This boy, Manjiro Nakahama, went back to Japan with a story of his experiences and American ways that paved the way for Commodore Perry, whom he served as interpreter.

GAINS SCORED BY ALLIES

(Continued From First Page.)
There was a flurry of rifle fire from the startled enemy, and hostile machine guns began to chatter viciously.

Hun Artillery Weak.
The German artillery began to reply but it was without effect.

The guns of the tanks began to hurl explosives. The Australians charged on with their iron friends, and as they went they found the going easier. The enemy infantry declined to face these invulnerable forts and the khaki-clad men from the far lands, who fought like demons and staked their lives as they would a sixpenny piece on the green cloth.

All along the line Germans began their frenzied: "Kamerad! Kamerad! Mercy!"

About them their unfortunate comrades were falling in great numbers before the fire of the tanks and the play of the Australian rifles and bayonets.

One German battalion commander and nearly all his command were rounded up and sent on their way to the rear. Three German divisions were opposite the Australians—the

Thirteenth, which had just been brought to the sector from the north, the Forty-third and the Seventy-seventh. Notwithstanding their strength, however, they were unable to make any showing.

One Point Fights Hard.

At only one point did the enemy hold the attacking troops up and then only for a brief time.

Just north of this, between the Ancre and the Somme, a minor operation was in progress. Here the British made one small attack and two raids which kept the whole line boiling. The British advanced their line 400 yards along a front of 1200, in addition to capturing a considerable number of prisoners.

The German artillery was shelling Hamel at the latest reports, but no counter attack had developed and the Australians with their U. S. allies were consolidating their new positions.

As a tribute to America, the Australians had designated their drive as a Fourth of July attack and today was set as the time for the operation because it was the American anniversary.

Upon the Belgian front a celebration of a more quiet kind was being conducted this morning in honor of the American anniversary day, the Belgians having arranged a special ceremony of tribute to the Stars and Stripes.

Americans Are Decorated.

At another place in the British area American engineers who have done gallant work for many months for the British were receiving decorations for valor.

PARIS, July 4.—French troops hurled back the German three-fifths of a mile on a front of more than three miles in the neighborhood of Autrech, northwest of Soissons, last night according to the War Office announcement today.

The advance was effected in two closely consecutive operations and resulted in the capture of 1066 wounded prisoners, including 18 officers. One battalion alone captured more than 300 Germans.

Two Attacks Are Made.

The first stage of the French advance began at 7:30 o'clock last night on a front of two kilometers between the Oise and the Aisne west of Autrech. The police drove ahead for 800 meters. Later in the evening a new attack was made in the same region between Autrech and Moulin-sous-Toutrent, just as the enemy was preparing a counter attack. Further ground was gained by the French.

The War Office also announced that the French carried out several raids and brought back prisoners north of Montdidier, between Montdidier and the Oise and on the right bank of the Meuse.

CARLTON STATES VIEWS

PRESIDENT OF WESTERN UNION
ADDRESSES EMPLOYEES.

Postmaster-General Burleson Quoted
on Subject of Government Employees Organizing.

NEW YORK, July 4.—Newcomb Carlton, president of the Western Union Telegraph Company, today addressed the following statement to employees in reference to the proposal that his line be taken over by the Government.

In order that employees may have a full understanding of present conditions, it seems proper for me to say that on the eve of the formation of a Western Union Employees' Association the Government is considering taking over the telegraph lines because of the threat of an outside organization of about 25,000 members.

No one would pay any attention to such a threat were the Nation not at war. It is, therefore, pertinent to call attention to the Government's point of view of outside unions as expressed by Postmaster-General Burleson before the House Committee on Tuesday last, as follows:

"I have before me the Government employees organizing, but if the telegraph and telephone lines are taken over, the employees should not be affiliated with an outside organization. The sole affiliation should be with the Government and no outside organization should be allowed to influence their action."

From the foregoing it would appear that the policy of the company is precisely that of the Postmaster-General.

When your association is formed it is proposed that the company make an exclusive contract with it under which the company deal with the association in matters relating to wages, conditions of employment, sickness benefits, pensions, life insurance and any other matters affecting the interests of employees.

Meanwhile you may be urged to do something foolish by self-seeking individuals who hope to improve their own position and such an individual, representing a small union of about 25,000 members, a few Canadian, proposes on his own authority to call you—loyal men and women of the Western Union Telegraph Company—in order to defeat the association which you are about to form. I am confident you will answer this attempt by an additional demonstration of your loyalty to your Government by continuing at your post of duty without fear of criticism by right-minded people.

NON-PARTISANS IN IDAHO NAME TICKET

Platform Declares Principal
Issue Is to Win War; Borah
Receives Indorsement.

TOWNLEY FAILS TO APPEAR

President of League Stays Away
From Boise Convention After He
Is Advised of Action Taken by
Members of Defense Council.

BOISE, Idaho, July 4.—(Special.)—The Non-Partisan League in convention this afternoon indorsed C. R. Jeppson, of Butte County, as a candidate for Congress from the First District, and L. I. Purcell, of Weiser, for the Second District.

A. C. Townley, president of the league, did not come to Boise, having been advised of the action of the Idaho Defense League of Ada County and Mayor Hays' refusing to permit him to speak in Boise.

The Defense Council and city executives came in for sharp criticism on the part of the league speakers because of their action. An attempt was made to adjourn the convention to Nampa, but failed to carry.

Platform Is Adopted.

The chief planks of the platform adopted are: The paramount issue is to win the war. State-owned packing plants, terminal elevators, flour mills and sugar factories; state-owned warehouses and storage plants for farm products; rural credit banks operated at cost; state ownership and distribution of the water power; favor raising the minimum and maximum weekly payments of compensation from \$5 and \$12 to \$9 and \$18; amendment of eight-hour law for underground workers, making shift eight hours from surface to surface; eight-hour day and minimum of \$15 weekly for women and girl workers; legislation providing for the time of opening and closing barber shops, as relief measure for American barbers now suffering from Asiatic competition.

The platform also urges enfranchisement of women of America; deplores the weakness of Idaho's present representatives in Congress and urges sending to Congress "men who will not only merely respond to rollcall in support of the war programme of President Wilson, but will as well give to the winning of the war vigorous, militant attention"; praises the record of Senator Borah and gives him the league's unqualified indorsement.

Price Regulation Urged.

The platform also says: We demand of Congress that it accede to the request of the President and grant further authority for regulating the prices of farm products and other commodities in which there is excessive profiteering.

"We respectfully petition the Federal Government so to shape its plans that it will not relinquish control over the grain markets after the war, but keep them open and free from the oppressive practices of monopoly. We indorse the taking over by the Federal Government of the railroads and suggests Government seizure and operation of all supply factories where excessive profiteering is taking place."

Other planks in the platform advocate Government seizure and operation of all factories in which industrial disputes do not yield to mediation; Government operation of all mines and all shipyards on Government work; direct contracts between the Government and all workers on Government work through their organizations; short-time loans to the farmers by the Government on crop security, whether owned or rented land; Government control of the price of commodities necessary for the farmers' use; imposition of penalties in the shape of idle acres tax for the holding of land out of use.

LAD, HIT BY AUTO, IS DEAD
Frank Scherankz Succumbs to Injuries Received Wednesday.

Frank Scherankz, 435 West Russell street, who was seriously injured when an automobile driven by Abraham Zurburg, of Linnton, crashed into him while he was riding his bicycle on the Willamette boulevard Wednesday night, died at his home yesterday afternoon.

According to witnesses, the lad was riding east on the boulevard about 35 feet behind an auto going in the same direction, when two other machines, going west, in passing the first machine forced the cyclist off the road. One car then attempted to pass the lad, and in doing so struck the lad to the pavement, knocking him unconscious.

HEPPNER HAS BAD FIRE
Four Blocks Razed, 50 Families Homeless, Loss \$100,000.

HEPPNER, Or., July 4.—(Special.)—Starting in the Palace Hotel block at 4 P. M. fire today destroyed that building and swept four blocks of business and residence property. Perhaps 50 families are homeless and the property loss is estimated at more than \$100,000. The town is almost depopulated when the fire started, many citizens having gone to other points to spend the Fourth and few men were left to handle the fire equipment. The electric light and water plant was saved, but the company lost 1000 cords of wood, which may cause a shutdown of the plant. The town is dark tonight.

TRAINS HALTED BY FIRES
BURNING FORESTS CAUSE DELAY OF THREE HOURS.

Flames Break Out in Two New Places Along Tillamook Line Near Railroad.

Two new fires were burning in the mountain timber district along the Tillamook line of the Southern Pacific last night, one on each side of the railroad at points between Scofield and Buxton. Little was known as to the extent of these fires except that they were in the vicinity of the railroad and caused delay of about three hours in the movement of trains.

The other fires that have been burning for several days were under fair control, with improved conditions, according to day reports. Two trains are serving in the fire-fighting, moving detachments of the troops of the Spruce Division from place to place as becomes necessary. The danger is not regarded as past in the fire-swept district, for there is still a great field of embers that might start new conflagrations should heavy winds spring up.

Room Listing to Start.
Thomas J. Swivel has called the committee on accommodations for the encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic to take up the active campaign of providing suitable rooms

for the visitors who will be guests of this city August 12-21 and many of whom will spend considerable time here.

This is one of the big conventions in Portland this year. It is to attract an exceptionally large attendance because of the rate of 1 cent a mile for the distance actually to be traveled in making the round trip to attend.

Preliminary meeting of the committee was held Wednesday afternoon, when it was decided that next week the actual work of listing rooms that will be available at the convention time will be started. The commercial hotels are well filled practically all of the time and it is recognized that the visitors will have to be taken care of to a large extent in private homes.

CHERRY PICKERS NEEDED
Automobiles Also Called For to Take Volunteers to Trees.

Cherry pickers and machines to take them to the trees are asked for by the Kanning Kitchen of the National League for Woman's Service. The pickers and machines should gather at the Kanning Kitchen, Grand and Hawthorne avenues, this morning at 8:30 o'clock.

The fruit from ten trees has been donated to the soldiers for preservation by the volunteer workers of the Kanning Kitchen, and the call sent out last night was urgent.
