

DURANT TAKES BIG MONEY AT TACOMA

Millionaire Racer Wins 25 and 50-Mile Heats and Is Second in 75.

DAY'S WORK BRINGS \$6300

Long Race Captured by Eddie Hearne; Durant's Best Average 98 Miles an Hour; One Lap Torn Off at 100-Mile Pace.

RESULTS AT TACOMA RACES.
TACOMA, Wash., July 4.—(Special.)—Durant won the 25 and 50-mile races at the Tacoma Speedway, averaging 98.36 miles an hour in the first and 92.73 in the second. Eddie Hearne won the 75-mile race, averaging 92.30; Durant, second, and Cooper, third; time, 47:43.5. Durant won the special purse of \$3000 for the greatest number of points.

TACOMA, Wash., July 4.—(Special.)—Taking first in the 25 and first in the 50 and second in the 75-mile heats of the liberty weekstake, Cliff C. Durant, millionaire automobile racer, set the pace in his Chevrolet practically throughout the 150 miles on the Tacoma Speedway today.

His total of points for the three heats was 33, at \$100 a point he won \$3300, plus the grand prize of \$3000 making his race worth \$6300.

Hearne Gets Second Money.
Eddie Hearne in his Duesenberg who won the 75-mile event finished second in the 50-mile and third in the 25-mile. His total of points was 32, paying him \$3200.

Eddie Pullen Wins \$1200.
Eddie Pullen, in his Mercer, finished fourth in the 25-mile, fifth in the 50-mile and after the first lap because of engine trouble, and finished fourth in the 75-mile event, taking fifth place with a total of 12 points, paying \$1200.

The fastest time of the day was in the long race when one lap was made by Durant at 100 miles an hour. Pullen was the first man to pass Durant. It was a spectacular affair, Pullen getting the lead in front of the grandstand. Tire trouble lost the lead for Pullen. The largest crowd ever attending a speedway was present today.

DE PALMA WINS HANDICAP

Tom Milton Second, Mulford Third in Cincinnati Event.

SPEEDWAY, Cincinnati, July 4.—Ralph De Palma won the 100-mile liberty handicap automobile race at the Sharonville speedway here today by finishing almost a full lap of the two-mile course ahead of Tom Milton. The latter had out of small margin over Ralph Mulford, while Barney Oldfield was a half mile behind, but landed in fourth place.

Louis Chevrolet won the ten-mile handicap, taking the preliminary heat and then winning the final. His best time was 5:49. Joe Boyer finished second in the final heat, while Ralph Mulford, third, and Dario Resta, fourth.

De Palma drove a consistent race and was favored by not having to stop during the run. He took the lead at the 35th mile and was never headed. Denny Hickey, after repeated trouble with his engine, came in fourth, and Louis Chevrolet, who was a favorite, was forced to the pits three times with tire trouble, but finished sixth.

Dario Resta was forced out of it on the 30th lap, while Arthur Duray, Milton McBride and Joe Boyer went out before the 50-mile mark was reached. De Palma's time was 57:00-2-10.

DEMPSEY PUTS OUT DEVERE IN 1 ROUND

Scheduled Twelve-Round Altercation at Joplin Lasts Less Than 2 Minutes.

LEONARD BEATS BRAZZO

Lightweight Champion Uses Eight Ounce Gloves on Opponent, So It Is Necessary to Stop Fight Before End of Eighth Round.

JOPLIN, Mo., July 4.—Jack Dempsey knocked out Bob Devere here this afternoon in the first round of a scheduled 12-round fight. Devere apparently was not in good condition, while Dempsey was hard and fit.

A short left hook, landed as the men separated from a clinch, sent Devere down for the count. The fight lasted less than two minutes. The men are heavyweights. Dempsey and his manager left tonight for Atlanta, Ga., where Dempsey meets "Forky" Flynn Saturday night.

WILDWOOD, N. J., July 4.—Benny Leonard, lightweight champion, defeated Jack Brazzo, of Hazelton, Pa., here tonight in what was to have been an eight-round bout, the referee stopping the fight in the eighth with 40 seconds to go, to save Brazzo further punishment. Eight-ounce gloves were used, and Leonard proved his ability to use them, landing on his opponent almost at will.

AKRON, O., July 4.—Ted Lewis, welterweight champion of the world, easily outpointed Johnny Griffiths, of Akron, in their 20-round match here today, according to newspaper critics. There were no knockdowns and the affair was tame throughout.

EVERETT, Wash., July 4.—(Special.)—Mickey King, of Seattle, and Jimmie Darcy fought four rounds as a draw in the principal bout of the open-air card staged by the Eagles here today.
