Conferred and Gallant
Actions Are Cited.

BOYS DO VALIANT DEEDS

General Pershing Describes How
Troops Overcome Germans in
Attacks on Boursches, Bois
De Belleau and Torcy.

WASHINGTON, July 5.—General Pershing today reported to the War Department that he had awarded distinguished service medals to the following officers and men of the Marine Corps for acts of gallantry:

Corporal Raymond W. Boone—After receiving three severe wounds he continued in the advance on Boursches, France, on June 6, 1918. Having been sent to the rear, he returned close to the advanced lines and there assisted in bringing in the wounded.

Corporal Harry B. Fletcher—After being severely wounded in the capture of Boursches, France, on June 6, 1918, he refused to go to the rear for treatment, remaining at his post and urging on his men to renewed efforts.

Corporal David L. Spaulding—He returned to the front line, encouraging his men, after having been sent to the rear with a severe wound, in the advance on Boursches, France, on June 6, 1918.

Platoon Leader Shielded.

Private Albert E. Brooks—At Boursches, France, on June 6, 1918, he was conspicuous for the heroic action of placing his body in front of his platoon leader while under heavy machine-gun fire, in order that he might dress the latter's wounds. He was shot twice in the hip while shielding the body of his leader.

Private John G. Flecken—During the capture of Boursches, France, June 6, 1918, twice hit in the leg, he dragged his automatic rifle 200 yards forward, opened fire on an enemy machine gun and silenced it.

Private Erics C. Hufstader—After being severely wounded in the occupation of Boursches, France, on June 6, 1918, he refused to go to the rear. He remained and assisted with the wounded, displaying great self-sacrifice and devotion to duty.

First Lieutenant Julius Upgawell—Having been previously wounded in the bombardment of La Cense Farm, he refused to leave, remaining with his company and conducting his platoon with marked bravery and skill in an assault on a formidable machine-gun position until seriously wounded on June 6, 1918.

Corporal Harold J. Randless—In the Bois de Belleau on June 6, 1918, in delivering messages, voluntarily chose the most direct route through a machine gun barrage to deliver information which prevented the bombardment of positions that had just been occupied. He chose the path of danger to save his comrades because it was the shortest.

Courage Is Shown.

Corporal Donald R. Sheaff—Was decorated for the same act as Corporal Randless.

Corporal John J. Ingalls—Wounded in the assault on machine gun positions in the Bois de Belleau, June 6, 1918, he refused to leave, assisting in the evacuation of the wounded, thereby displaying qualities of self-sacrifice and devotion to duty.

Corporal Ray W. Chase—Assumed command of his platoon in the attack on enemy gun positions in the Bois de Belleau on June 6, 1918, during which they captured two machine guns and killed their crews. He did not retire from the action until all his men had been killed or wounded.

Corporal Frank A. Vial—Although exposed to fire from strongly entrenched machine gun positions in the Bois de Belleau on June 6, 1918, he repeatedly carried messages from one post to another, in the face of heavy machine-gun fire he volunteered and brought to his position a detachment which had been left to hold a point while companies were being reorganized.

Corporal Fred W. Hill—Regardless of personal danger, he showed conspicuous bravery in carrying ammunition from a dump into the fighting line in the face of a heavy machine gun and rifle fire from the enemy in the Bois de Belleau on June 6, 1918. Learning of the need of the hand grenades in the assault against strong enemy machine-gun positions and without waiting for orders, carried same to that point.

Message Is Delivered.

First Lieutenant James McB. Welles—On June 6, 1918, at Boursches, France, carried an important message through heavy artillery and machine-gun fire and delivered same, although seriously wounded, making a report of value at a critical stage.

Private Earl Belfry—He showed great courage in the capture of Boursches, France, on June 6, 1918, entering the town after being wounded and taking a leading part in causing the machine guns of the enemy to evacuate.

Private James W. Carter—After having been wounded in the capture of Boursches, France, on June 6, 1918, he displayed remarkable energy and courage in fearlessly attacking superior numbers of the enemy and materially assisting in their defeat.

First Lieutenant F. H. Harkley—In the Bois de Belleau on June 6, 1918, displayed coolness, judgment and utter disregard for danger in leading platoon in its objective under heavy fire.

Corporal Joseph A. Garges, Corporal Benjamin Tilghman, Corporal Howard Childs, Private Herman R. McLeod—These four men were prominent in the attack on enemy machine-gun positions in the Bois de Belleau on June 6 and 8, 1918, were foremost in their company at all times and acquitted themselves with such distinction that they were an example for the rest of their command.

Town Is Captured.

Lieutenant James F. Robertson—Displayed remarkable courage and resourcefulness in capturing the town of Boursches, France, with one platoon of his company, on the night of June 6, 1918. In the face of a heavy machine gun barrage he entered the town and heroically withstood all attempts to dislodge him.

First Lieutenant Charles I. Murray—Displayed conspicuous bravery and efficiency during the advance upon the town of Boursches, France, on the night of June 6, 1918. Having been shot through both arms, he refused assistance and walked to the rear alone. Captain Randolph T. Zane—While holding the town of Boursches, France, on the nights of June 7 and 8, 1918, he displayed such bravery and coolness as to inspire the garrison to resist successfully a heavy attack by machine gun fire and infantry.

Private Wilet A. Stair, Private Earl C. Rockwell—Near Torcy, France, on the night of June 4, 1918, as members of a reconnoitering patrol, displayed great courage and devotion to duty by fearlessly entering the German lines and obtaining there valuable information.

Vendor of Fake Liqur Accused
of White Slavery.

"WHISKY" CACHE IS FOUND

Prisoner Threatens to Bare Names
of "Liquor" Purchasers in Event
He Is Prosecuted by Federal Officers.

A charge of white slavery was formally lodged against Harry Baker, one of the "ninety-nine per cent Baker Brothers" late yesterday. The charge of violating the Mann act followed development disclosed yesterday, when Lieutenant Thatcher, of the War Emergency Squad and Inspector Goltz and Howell motored to Crown Point in company with one of the girls, who pointed out the location of a cache of the Old Crow, "Aged in the Woods" in a clump of brush near the main highway.

Eleven sacks of the 99 per cent water and 1 per cent artificial coloring were loaded on a truck and taken to the police station. It is believed by the officers that several other caches of the make-believe liquor will be revealed within a few days.

The operations of the Baker brothers take in a larger scope than any other alleged bootleggers yet apprehended. Owen Baker, a brother of Harry, is still at large.

The girls told the officers that the Baker brothers took them out the Columbia Highway in an automobile and one of the young men beat her over the head with a suitcase, while the other told her to get into the car. This scene occurred a short time before the girls appeared at police headquarters to complain against the two men.

Ever since his arrest, Wednesday Baker has remained secretive regarding the identity of his Portland "patrons," but yesterday he intimated that he would reveal their names if he is forced to face either a state or Federal charge. The name of one purchaser, who is said to have paid the Bakers \$2100 for 21 cases of the "bottled in the woods" product, has been learned by the police, but his identity is withheld for the present.

The police also learned yesterday where the Bakers had their product bottled and where they had their labels printed. Ten burlap sacks, each containing enough quart bottles of fake whiskey to make up a case, were found buried just off the Columbia River Highway at Crown Point Thursday afternoon by Officers Thatcher, Goltz and Teeters, engaged in investigating the case of Owen and Harry Baker, the latter of whom was arrested Wednesday, following the discovery of their clever scheme of selling colored water to thirsty Oregonians who thought it was the "real stuff."

It is the opinion of officers that the Baker brothers took friends on joy rides out the Highway and upon reaching the spot where the cache was concealed, would display it to them. The friends, as all true joyriders would do, seized upon the opportunity to secure the precious liquid which they thought was in the bottle and were willing to pay exorbitant prices for it. When the party of officers reached Troutdale with the "evidence," which took up a great deal of room in the car, they requested an expressman to carry it to Portland for them. The man was willing, but a woman who was standing nearby, saw trouble in it and remarked, much to the amusement of the officers in street clothes, "I warn you not to take that job because you are sure to get into trouble and be arrested for bootlegging."

"Bottled in Woods" Product Held as Evidence Against Harry Baker, Now in Custody, and Label Showing How the Baker Brothers Stayed Within the Law in Some Particulars.

FIRE LOSS \$150,000

Heppner Conflagration Is Believed Result of Accident.

HERALD PLANT DESTROYED

Mrs. J. L. Wilkins, After Arousing
Hotel Guests, Is Cut Off by Fire
and Jumps 15 Feet Into
Arms of Rescuers.

HEPPNER, Or., July 5.—(Special.)—Heppner is busy today taking an inventory of the loss in yesterday's fire, the worst yet experienced in the town's history and the second serious conflagration within a few weeks. The loss is estimated at about \$150,000, possibly half covered by insurance.

While the origin of the fire will perhaps never definitely be known, all indications are that it was accidental, perhaps the result of carelessness in dropping a match or cigarette stub into the refuse matter in the rear of the Palace Hotel barber shop.

Miss Crowe Sounds Alarm.

Miss Maud Crowe, of Portland, who is spending the Summer in Heppner, the guest of her father, Pat Crowe, who was night clerk in the Palace Hotel, was at the desk in the lobby when Mrs. J. L. Wilkins, wife of the proprietor, and it was she who first discovered the blaze. She immediately gave the alarm to Mrs. Wilkins, who ran to the second and third floors and spread the alarm to the few guests who happened to be in their rooms. All responded promptly, but so quickly did the flames spread that Mrs. Wilkins was forced to use the fire escape from the third floor to reach the ground. The lower end of the fire escape was 15 feet from the ground and as no other ladder was available she had to drop the distance, being caught by several men and saved from serious injury.

The fire soon jumped to the south side of May street, quickly destroying the Eastern Hotel, Heppner Herald, newspaper and printing office; Mrs. L. G. Herren's millinery store, and four blocks of residences and minor business property.

COUPLE ARRESTED, FINED

Portlanders Register as Man and
Wife at Eugene Hotel.

EUGENE, Or., July 5.—(Special.)—W. J. Hurl, a Portland man, who has been attending the Summer military camp at the University of Oregon, and Mrs.

Jessie Walruth, also of Portland, were arrested here today and fined \$25 each for "offensive and disorderly conduct." The complaint under which they entered pleas of guilty charged that they had wrongfully registered at a hotel, the Osburn, as man and wife and spent the night together.

Mrs. Walruth came to Eugene yesterday. During the day her husband put in an appearance and complained to Sheriff D. A. Elkins, who made an investigation which resulted in the arrest of the couple today.

They escaped a statutory charge, because the husband under the Oregon law must swear to the complaint in such cases, and Walruth refused to prosecute. Sheriff Elkins preferred the minor charge.

At the university tonight it was said that there is no W. J. Hurl enrolled in the Summer camp. Officers are authority for the statement that the man in the case has been attending the camp. The university is making an investigation with a view to the dismissal of the offender, if he is one of the men receiving military instruction at the school.
