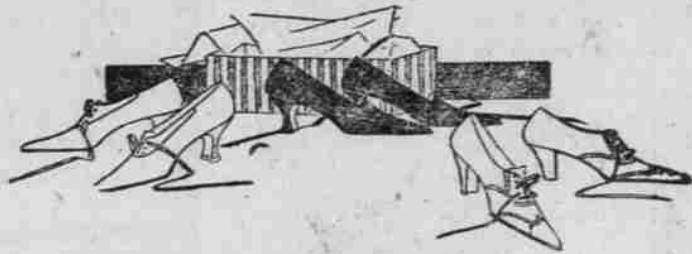

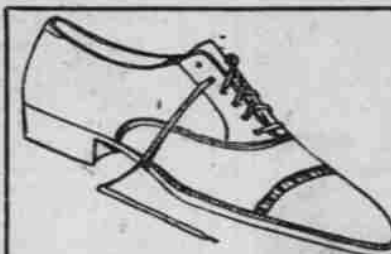

PEOPLE MAY DECIDE

Legislation for Extra Funds Is
Held Unnecessary.

REMEDY IN VOTERS' HANDS

Act of 1917, Says Attorney-General,
Provides Fully for Emergency
Such as Now Exists in the
State Government.

SALEM, Or., July 5.—(Special).—An act of the 1917 Legislature, prepared by Attorney-General Brown and introduced in the Senate by Senator Pierce, may obviate the necessity of calling a special session of the Legislature to relieve the financial stringency evidently caused by the 6 per cent limitation amendment, increasing current expenses, and the failure to place the emergency war fund tax bill on the November ballot.

Attorney-General Brown today called the attention of Governor Withycombe to this act, which provides that tax levying bodies, when the 6 per cent limitation amendment bears too heavily upon them and they are unable to raise the necessary amount by the amendment, may place the matter before the people at the regular November election.

"Whenever, in the discretion of the State Tax Commission," a portion of the act reads, "or other body levying state taxes, it is necessary to levy a larger amount of taxes than the amount limited by the constitution, except upon a vote of the people, the said tax commission, or other body levying state taxes, shall certify to the Secretary of State that such necessity, in its opinion, exists, stating the reasons therefor in not to exceed 100 words and the amount of such necessary increase. Such certificate shall be delivered to the Secretary of State not less than 40 days before the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November of any year. Thereupon the Secretary of State shall, not less than 35 days before said date, give notice to each County Clerk in the state of Oregon that an election will be held throughout the state on said date for the purpose of submitting to the vote of the people the question of such increase, and shall include a copy of said certificate of the State Tax Commission or other body levying state taxes."

Under this act the Attorney-General suggested to the Governor the need of a special session to be called by the Governor announced today that he will act under this statute if it is found feasible.

Cherries and small fruits make the largest displays this week.

Lambert, Bing and Royal Anne cherries are selling at 15 cents a pound for the cream of the crop, 12 1/2 cents and 10 cents for good seconds, with three pounds for a quarter and two for 15 cents to 10 cents to finish what remains, including Black Republican and Tartarian.

Choice consignments of Lambert and Royal Anne of local growth, are held in large quantities, and the amount of money that is allowed by the amendment, may place the matter before the people at the regular November election.

Caiflower, 15 and 20 cents a head; cabbage, 5, 10 and 15 cents each—very fresh and firm.

Green pepper, 25 cents a pound; 10 cents a dozen.

Spinach and mustard greens, two pounds for 15 cents.

New potatoes, California Garnet variety, 5 cents a pound; Early Rose, six pounds for a quarter.

Last season's spuds, sixteen pounds for 25 cents.

Bermuda, or silver-skinned onions, two pounds for 15 cents; red, dried, three pounds, 10 cents.

Peppermint, carrots, beets and green onions, 5 cents a bunch—each attractive.

In the fish market. Some choice Columbia River sturgeon has the honor of being the highest-priced fish—30 cents a pound.

Other white sturgeon, 27 cents; ocean or red, 20, two pounds for 35 cents.

Black and tomcod, silver perch, smelt and sand-dabs, 15c a pound.

Chinook salmon, 22 1/2, 23 and 25 cents a pound.

Newport halibut and cheeks, 25 cents a pound; other stock halibut, 19 cents a pound.

Flounders and carp, 5 cents; red snapper, 6 cents, and rock cod, dressed, 8 cents a pound.

Barren cod, 15 cents a pound.

Shad, 10 and 12 1/2 cents; shad roe, 35 and 50 cents a pound.
