New Pastor of Wilbur Memorial Church Speaks.

BALLROOM SERVICE SCENE

Rev. Francis Burgette Short, D. D., Preaches on Subject of "Bear Ye One Another's Burdens" in First Portland Sermon.

"Bear ye one another's burdens." The message of the sermon of the Rev. Francis Burgette Short, D. D., reached hundreds of hearts yesterday morning when the newly chosen pastor of the recently organized Wilbur Memorial Church preached in the ballroom of the Multnomah Hotel, the temporary meeting place of the congregation.

It was not the first time that Dr. Short had addressed a Portland congregation. He came back to his old friends and to many new ones. Several years ago Dr. Short was pastor of the old First or Taylor-street Methodist Church and many of his former church members among those who greeted him yesterday. It was a capacity audience. And although a balcony housed the worshippers the atmosphere of a sacred place was there. The stately ivory-tinted walls were hung with handsome flags. Palms and a service flag adorned the pulpit and a large choir with Miss Elise Cramer as soloist occupied the platform.

Several John Church. Dr. Short in a brief introductory greeting asked the members to cooperate with him and to give their hearts and minds and best efforts toward making the down-town church success. "I want to co-operate with the other pastors of the city," said Dr. Short, "I shall carry no bitterness in my heart for any man or woman. I want your advice. Don't permit yourselves to jump at conclusions. Let us build steadily and solidly. If you are asked to do anything and don't want to do it, why, don't do it, but don't grumble. At the conclusion of the sermon, as several came forward to unite with the church, Dr. Short said, "We want you if you are willing to bear burdens. Being a church member like being a citizen, is no longer a soft job."

It was a simple, earnest, sincere sermon that Dr. Short gave to his new church-folk. "Life means activity and responsibility," he said. "What is the Government of the United States doing today, but trying to set forth to every one of its people this fact? If you don't fight, you must work, it has said. That is life's meaning. You, that too, in the message for church-members. We must battle for the advancement of God's kingdom and we must work, must take our share of burden-bearing."

Co-operation Is Needed. "Life is something more than buying and selling. There must be mutual co-operation. No man can live of himself alone. No man can live a hermit life and be a success in the world. It takes the help and the interest and the backing of other people to make people great. Do not be weary in well-doing, for in due season you will reap. If we are ever successful, it is a result of co-operation. We must all share responsibilities. And success is gained by the sweat of the brow and often after many a weary day. There is some good in every soul if we have the grace and the patience to find it," said Dr. Short. "There's not a man in this room who hasn't a spark of goodness. He may not be reached by a sermon but his friendship may be won if you take him fishing."

Among those who attended the service were Bishop of the Diocese of Oregon, Dr. H. C. Jennings, of Spokane, manager of the Methodist Book Concern, Dr. H. C. Jennings, of Spokane, Robert M. Hughes, editor of the Advocate, and Dr. C. E. Cline and Rev. D. A. Waters. Dr. Cline and Dr. Waters, who were in the city for the first time, were warmly welcomed. After the meeting scores of old friends gathered round Dr. and Mrs. Short to welcome them to Portland.

It is the purpose of the Wilbur Church, named in memory of the first pastor of the old Taylor-street Church, to found an institutional church that shall minister to the needs of the district and that shall do social service work and shall meet the needs that shall arise with the returning of soldiers from the various industries of the city. While the church itself will be Methodist in its work, it will be open to all regardless of creed, thoroughly democratic and helpful.

Dr. Short arrived a few days ago from Spokane to take charge of the work. He was pastor there for more than five years and was for several years in Salt Lake City since his former residence in Portland.

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U. S. FLAG LATER

Pastor Says America Is Chosen to Lead World.

HIGH IDEALS SET FORTH

Rev. W. R. Sawyer Declares That American Flag Banner of Assurance of Victory and Comfort to Heavy-Hearted Peoples.

"The American Flag is given of Almighty God to be borne throughout all the Nations." This is the belief of Rev. W. R. Sawyer, as expressed in his sermon at the East Side Christian Church yesterday morning.

The subject of the sermon was "Song of the Stars and Stripes," and in delivering it, Rev. Mr. Sawyer brought out impressively not a new but a highly elevated and probably the most worthy viewpoint of the American Nation, its history and ideals.

Dr. Sawyer first reviewed the early history of the flag, telling of the momentous event of the first salute to the flag by a foreign nation, France. That flag was floating from the mast of the U. S. S. Ranger, he said, "and when the first French ship was fired in salute it marked one of the mightiest epochs in the history of the world. Spain also saluted the flag on the Ranger; Spain, who was then the mighty mistress of the seas. And soon afterward England saluted it. That was the beginning of a new world in which all others were destined to bow down to."

Dr. Sawyer then explained that the song of which he was about to tell was "the song which, from the heart of the flag, sings of liberty and righteousness and of the Land of Destiny."

America Leads Way. "The remarkable history of the American people means something more than the mere achievement of man," he continued. "It means that the American people are chosen of God, are a part of the plan of the Almighty, just as the Israelites in the Bible are the chosen people of God. God planted the American people that they might lead in the civilization of the world and finally lead in the regeneration of the earth. They are the gift of God, a part of the plan of the world and the guardians of a righteous peace."

"Wherever the American banner has gone, the Bible has gone. It has never been borne in an unrighteous cause. It was sent against Mexico with the result that the territory which now comprises the states of California, Utah, Nevada, New Mexico and Arizona are civilized. Compare the conditions in those states today with those that were in the border in the state of Idaho—Fair north, partly cloudy and occasionally threatening south portion; continued warm. Edward L. COAL BUKERS NEEDED PACIFIC COAST COMPANY CONSIDERING INCREASING SPACE. Supplies for Ocean-Going Vessels Leaving This Harbor Will Require Storage of 25,000 Tons. Plans for establishing coal bunkers for handling 25,000 tons of coal for ocean-going ships leaving this harbor will be taken up today in Portland by George Moore, vice-president and general manager of the Pacific Coast Coal Company, of Seattle. Mr. Moore expects to reach the city in late 24 hours. He took with him a party of several engineers and others interested, for the purpose of surveying the situation.

The company now has small bunkers here, holding probably not more than several hundred tons. In view of the fact that the company is planning to be developed from this port, it is understood Mr. Moore has written to Portland men interested in port development, asking what might be done. He is anxious to establish his company here, it is understood, and has mapped out plans on a large scale.

A differential in coal rates between Seattle and Portland now existing may prove a stumbling-block in working out a successful plan for which the large bunkers here. This differential is about \$1.40 a ton, as against the rate of \$1.00 a ton in Seattle. The company would like to have the differential worked out to absorb this differential, the bunkers will be built here.

The establishing of coal bunkers here is allied somewhat with the movement to have ships directed to Portland for handling the Montana and Dakota coals that drop from the coast instead of by rail to the Atlantic coast. Because of this, Max Houser, of the Grain Administration, has been interested in Mr. Moore's movement. The conference today probably will be held at the Benson Hotel. Mr. Moore is due to arrive on the morning train from the north.
