

TREASON CHARGE ESCAPED BY 3 DAYS

German Payments to Rumely
Reported Ended Just Be-
fore U. S. Entered War.

BERNSTORFF MAIL EDITOR

Policy of New York Evening Paper
Declared Made in Germany.
Propaganda Issued Under
Camouflage of Americanism.

NEW YORK, July 9.—That Dr. Edward A. Rumely, publisher of the New York Evening Mail, escaped facing a treason indictment by just three days, was the assertion of a state official here today.

Dr. Rumely, it is said, had received his last remittance from pro-German sources on April 2, 1917, and the United States declared war on April 6 of that year.

Count Bernstorff and Dr. Albert, formerly commercial attaché of the embassy in Washington, were said to have been the "brains" of the Mail's pro-German propaganda before the United States entered the war.

It was Von Bernstorff's method, according to the official, to dictate the editorial policy of the Mail and to make it secretly pro-German although apparently strongly American. This was done, he said, by means of pro-Irish and anti-British and anti-Japanese fulminations.

Accountants Tracing Funds.
Accountants were said to be working on the books of the Mail and Express Company today with a view of ascertaining just how the \$1,361,000 said to have been received by Rumely from German sources was expended.

Assertions that Rumely placed all his records at the disposal of the Department of Justice during personal visits to Washington led to bail being fixed at \$25,000, instead of \$50,000, as originally asked by Federal counsel when Rumely was arraigned today before United States Commissioner Hitchcock on a charge of perjury.

Hearing in the case, involving allegations by the Government that the Mail is owned by the German Imperial government, was deferred for two weeks.

Shortly after the arraignment of Dr. Rumely, a Federal grand jury began consideration of the case. It was said many witnesses would be called.

Ownership to Be Decided.
The question as to the future ownership and management of the newspaper will be decided in Washington at a conference tomorrow or Thursday between Henry L. Stoddard, chief bondholder of the property, Paul Block, who is said to own \$50,000 worth of the stock, and A. Mitchell Palmer, alien property custodian.

Stoddard and Block, "for the time being," will conduct the paper. All German equity in the property will be seized, Frances P. Garvan, investigator, announced.

LIE PASSED IN O'LEARY TRIAL
Attorney for Accused Sinn Feiner
Alleges "Frame-Up."

NEW YORK, July 9.—Clashes of attorneys marked the trial in the trial court here today of John J. O'Leary, a New York lawyer, charged with having aided his brother, Jeremiah A. O'Leary, to escape just before he was to be tried for publication of alleged seditious articles in the Boston Herald.

Felder Alleges Frame-Up.
In opening for the defense, Thomas B. Felder called the case against his client a "frame-up."

Earlier in the day Mr. Felder objected to the admission of certain evidence on the ground that Jeremiah O'Leary's office had been "raided" and papers illegally seized.

Mr. Barnes said this was a "false statement." Mr. Felder replied: "You are a liar."

After Mrs. Marie K. De Victoria, indicted with Jeremiah O'Leary and others on charges of conspiracy to commit treason and espionage, had been identified in court by Jeremiah's office boy as a woman who had called twice on his employer last year, Mr. Felder, notwithstanding his vigorous objections, was called as a witness by the Government.

After being examined as to his engagement as counsel for the O'Learys, Mr. Felder cross-examined himself before opening the case for the defense.

LANE PARENTS SEND FOUR
Mark Larwood, of Eugene, Enlists
in United States Navy.

EUGENE, Or., July 9.—(Special.)—Mr. and Mrs. T. H. Larwood, of Eugene, have given their fourth son to their country's service. Mark Larwood, aged 17, student in the Eugene high school, left today for Portland, where he will enlist in the United States Navy. His brothers, Donald, Walter and Leonard F. Larwood, are now serving with General Pershing's forces in France.

The boys are great-grandsons of Rev. H. H. Spaulding, who came to the Oregon country with Dr. Whitman in 1836.

U. S. HOLDS FOOD HOARDER
Benton County Man Unable to Fur-

23 SHIPS FINISHED
Tonnage Turned Out First
Week in July, 122,771.

TOTAL NEW VESSELS 223
Chairman Hurley Announces Ship-
ping Board Has Let Contracts
for Construction of 92
Army Transports.

WASHINGTON, July 9.—Completion of 23 ships of 122,771 deadweight tons in the first week of July made a total of 223 new vessels built under the direction of the shipping board. Their aggregate tonnage is 1,415,021.

Of the new fleet 218 vessels already are in service.

July production is at the rate of more than 5,000,000 tons for the remainder of the year, and if this pace is maintained by the rapidly expanding shipyards the year's output will be close to 5,000,000 deadweight tons.

The first week's total in July comprised 14 requisitioned steel vessels and five contract steel vessels, with an aggregate tonnage of 168,271, and four wooden ships have been launched to date. Twenty-four steel ships have been built on contract, the remainder being requisitioned vessels.

Chairman Hurley, after a visit to the White House today, announced that the shipping board has let contracts for 92 Army transports. After the war the transports will be put into the passenger-carrying trade.

Deliveries will be made before December 21, 1919. A number of the transports are being built on the Pacific Coast.

BELFAST, Ireland, July 9.—(By the Associated Press.)—Workman, Clark and Company, local shipbuilders, have achieved a world's record in completing a 3000-ton standard ship in 15 days after she was launched.

The vessel was launched at 9 o'clock in the morning. By 8 o'clock the same evening all her engines and boilers were in position.

LONDON, July 9.—Speaking in the House of Commons today, Sir Leo Money, parliamentary secretary to the Ministry of Shipping, said the percentage of ships lost while homeward bound to the United Kingdom since January 1, 1918, was rather more than 1 per cent. The losses of food ships for the same period was less than 1.4 per cent.

The result of the convoy system, Sir Leo said, continued to improve. Since January, 1917, when the system was put into effect, 42,000,000 gross tons had been conveyed to British and French ports, with a loss up to June 29 of 1.25 per cent. This includes loss by the dispersal of convoys through bad weather.

ANCHORAGE, Alaska, July 9.—Sub-divisional agricultural land surveys will be made this Summer and Fall in the "Talekna" district, 116 miles north of Anchorage, which is penetrated by the route of the Government railroad. V. H. Wilhelm, Government

land office surveyor, with headquarters in Juneau, will undertake the work, which will be limited to agricultural lands and will be a continuation of the task begun in the Talekna district last Summer by the Federal Land Office.

WASHINGTON, July 9.—Although National prohibition as a war measure was discussed briefly in the Senate today, the amendment to the emergency appropriation bill was not taken up. When the amendment is reached, Senator Penrose of Pennsylvania, is expected to press a point of order which he made today against the inclusion of it in the bill on the ground that it is general legislation attached to an appropriation measure, in violation of the rules.
