

## VON KUEHLMANN DROPPED BY KAISER

Foreign Minister's Resignation Accepted—Hintze Expected to Be Successor.

## PAN-GERMANS TRIUMPH

Indications Reported of Collapse of Discipline in Second German Army—Emperor Said to Have Influenza.

LONDON, July 10.—The resignation of Dr. Richard von Kuehlmann, German Foreign Minister, has been accepted by Emperor William, according to a German political wireless dispatch received here.

Although the newspapers unanimously named Admiral von Hintze as his successor, final decision has not been made.

WASHINGTON, July 10.—According to an official dispatch from Switzerland today the retirement of Von Kuehlmann as German Foreign Minister and the appointment of Von Hintze to succeed him is looked upon as a victory for the Pan-Germans.

COPENHAGEN, July 10.—Socialists in the Reichstag, says a dispatch from Berlin to the Politikon, took the stand yesterday that they could not vote for the budget until the new German Foreign Secretary, in succession to Dr. Kuehlmann, resigned.

A proposal was made that the Reichstag adjourn to enable the various parties to discuss the situation created by Von Kuehlmann's resignation.

LONDON, July 10.—Indications of a breakdown in discipline in the second German army are found in two orders issued by General von der Marwitz which have fallen into the hands of the correspondent of the Times at British headquarters in France.

Desertions from the Bulgarian army on the Macedonian front are increasing, French headquarters in Macedonia informs the Saloniki correspondent of the Times.

Hope of Victory Fades.  
All the dispatches say that conditions in Bulgaria have become unendurable and that hopes of an ultimate victory have vanished.

ROME, July 10.—Emperor William has fallen a victim to the influenza, that has been so prevalent in the German army, according to advices from a Swiss source that have reached the Epoca.

These declare that the Emperor has gone home from the French front because of the attack of "Spanish gripe," as it is called, and that several members of the Emperor's family also are suffering from the malady.

AMSTERDAM, July 10.—The German Emperor has replied to a congratulatory telegram from the University of Cologne as follows:

"The invincible bravery and unlimited self-sacrifice of the German nation shine brightly out of the darkness of the mightiest war of all times."

Delay of Victory Admitted.  
"Our victorious armies have not yet succeeded in entirely breaking our enemies' will to destruction, but Germany's sons, with unshakable confidence, are rallying around their supreme war lord and their trusted military leaders to win for the fatherland life, happiness and freedom to create a free path for the development of intellectual and economic forces. God will be with us and our just cause."

PARIS, July 10.—In a recent speech in the Prussian House of Lords Count Behrendorf said, according to a dispatch from Basel:

"We cannot have a peace worthy of our sacrifices without the aid of the good German sword. We cannot make progress by such shameful speeches as have been delivered lately in the Reichstag by responsible personages."

The vice-president, responding, said: "We have vanquished in the east and we shall conquer in the west. Victory is not far distant."

LONDON, July 10.—German and Austrian statesmen began a conference at Salzburg yesterday for the purpose of arranging for closer relations. Advices from Vienna via Amsterdam state that the negotiations are of a purely economic character and that no political or military questions would be discussed.

AUSTRIA REJECTS VON BUELOW  
Commander Unwelcome Because He Brings No Troops.

ROME, July 10.—Austria has declined to accept the German General Otto von Buelow as commander-in-chief of the forces on the Italian front, because Germany refused to send him 12 German divisions with him, according to the newspaper Epoca, which bases the statement on advices from a Swiss source.

Dispatches from Rome through Paris on July 7 reported that Germany intended sending three army corps to the aid of Austria to be put under General Otto von Buelow as commander-in-chief on the Italian front.

Reports from Zurich several days earlier declared that General von Buelow had been appointed commander-in-chief but there has been no official confirmation that such a change in command had been effected or was contemplated.

LOST ONES TO BE TRACED  
Knights of Columbus to Report on Men Who Fail to Write.

NEW YORK, July 10.—The Knights of Columbus announced today the opening of a "lost soldier" department at headquarters here.

Through co-operation with the Adjutant-General's office, the statement said, the bureau will furnish information as to the whereabouts of men who, through carelessness, fail to keep in touch with their families and friends.

LAKE TO BE DRAGGED  
Hugh Brady Will Seek Bodies of Men Drowned Near Bend.

Twenty Men Unable to Find Any Trace of Vernon Forbes and Ralph Poindexter, Lost Sunday.

BEND, Or., July 10.—(Special.)—Hugh Brady, the Portland grapple, will arrive in Bend tomorrow morning to search for the bodies of Ralph Poindexter and Vernon A. Forbes, who were drowned in Crescent Lake Sunday evening. Continued search has failed to reveal any trace of the boat, the fishing tackle or the bodies of the men.

Twenty men are at the lake and every known method has been tried without success. Searchers are relying on the skill and experience of Brady to recover the bodies. It is believed that the Crescent Lake waters present a problem more difficult than any he has ever worked.

The bottom of the lake is jagged with volcanic formation and soundings of 1200 feet have been rumored. Taken some years ago by a party of geologists who visited there, it is also believed that there are submarine outlets and inlets to the lake which will complicate the success of Grappler Brady's task.

City Grappler Brady left Portland last night for Bend, equipped with grappling apparatus and especially long ropes.

OPERATION NOT SURVIVED  
Eugene Hubbard, Oregon Man, Dies in Vancouver Hospital.

VANCOUVER, Wash., July 10.—(Special.)—Eugene C. Hubbard, 47 years of age, who came to Vancouver from his former home at Williams, near Grants Pass, Or., about two months ago, to work for the Motorship Construction Company, died last night at Joseph's hospital, following an operation.

He is survived by his wife, four sons, Corporal Clayton D. Hubbard, Company E, 44th Infantry, at Camp Lewis; William, Frank and Donald, at home, and three daughters, Mrs. J. C. Lemmon of Seattle, and Misses Gladys and Gladys at home. The family had not yet moved to Vancouver, though they were here at the time of Mr. Hubbard's death. The body will be sent to Williams for burial.

CLONBURST DOES DAMAGE  
Colorado Springs' War Gardens Are Injured; Streets Inundated.

COLORADO SPRINGS, Col., July 10.—A heavy rain roused up a clonburst in the western part of the city did considerable property damage, sent streams of water two feet deep down the city's streets and flooded several houses late today. Two families whose homes were flooded were rescued by firemen. Much damage was done to war gardens by the rain and hail.

Fountain River was filled with water, but late tonight had not overflowed its banks, except in a few low places. Flood warnings were issued to persons in the lowlands of the Fountain River in the Pueblo vicinity.

Kelso School Man Married.  
KELSO, Wash., July 10.—(Special.)—Professor Carl Stahlberg, manual training instructor in the Kelso school, and Miss Delta Hann, of Black Diamond, Wash., were married at that place July 2, according to word received here. Kelso. Professor Stahlberg and his bride were students together at Washington State College. He made a great success with his teaching work. Two Kelso schools last year and was re-elected and will return to Kelso to make his home in September.

## WIRE CONTROL BILL WILL BE HASTENED

Administration Measures May Go Through Before the Week Is Out.

## ACTION MAY START TODAY

Resolution to Be Called Up for Consideration and If Prolonged Debate Appears Probable Prohibition May Be Displaced.

WASHINGTON, July 10.—With the formal presentation to the Senate today of the interstate commerce committee's favorable report of the House resolution empowering the President to operate wire and radio systems during the war, sentiment for the Administration measure apparently increased and leaders predicted that it would be passed before the end of the week.

Chairman Smith, of the interstate commerce committee, announced that the resolution will be called up for consideration tomorrow and, if prolonged debate appears probable, an effort will be made to hasten a vote by displacing the prohibition bill.

Managers of the latter measure, it was said, are willing to have the wire-control legislation given the right of way.

Most Administration leaders believe that debate on the wire control will be much shorter than at first anticipated. Adoption of the measure was regarded as certain by the Administration managers, while some of the principal opponents privately admit little possibility of its defeat.

Chairman Smith endeavored to expedite the resolution today by asking unanimous consent of the Senate for its consideration, but Senator Penrose, of Pennsylvania, objected and the resolution was sent to the calendar, subject to being called up tomorrow.

It is expected that several amendments will be offered, including a proposal to eliminate telephone lines, or at least local systems.

HOWARD ELLIOTT RETURNS  
Northern Pacific Re-Elects Former Chief as Successor to Hannaford.

NEW YORK, July 10.—The directors of the Northern Pacific Railway Company at a meeting here today accepted the resignation as president of J. M. Hannaford, who has been appointed Federal manager of the line, and elected as his successor Howard Elliott, who has been chairman of the executive committee.

Mr. Elliott thus becomes president of the Northern Pacific a second time. He resigned the office in 1912 to become active head of the New York, New Haven & Hartford and is still a member of the executive committee of that company.

C. W. Bunn, general counsel, and Thomas Cooper, land commissioner of the company, were elected vice-presidents.

'HARRY DUMONT' ARRESTED  
Actor, Whose Real Name Is Hans Frederick Dreikauss, Is Alien.

WASHINGTON, July 10.—Hans Frederick Dreikauss, known on the stage as Harry Dumont and playing the part of a German Lieutenant with a dramatic company here today, was arrested by the Department of Justice agents for violating the order against enemy aliens entering the District of Columbia.

Dreikauss, who registered as an enemy alien in Chicago last March, reported his arrival here to the superintendent of police and was held, though there would be no objection to his temporary stay.

He was born in 1891 in Germany and educated for the army, but came to America in 1912.

PROFESSOR IS DISCHARGED  
Uproar Created in Court When Savant Attacks America.

DUBUQUE, Ia., July 10.—Frederick Schuchard, professor of drawing, was discharged from Dubuque College, formerly St. Joseph's this morning after causing a sensation in the United States courtroom Tuesday. When asked to explain pro-German statements by United States Marshal Moore, Schuchard refused to answer in the United States courtroom. I resign my citizenship, I owe America nothing. We will never find democracy anywhere else but in hell."

Spectators threatened to attack him, but were restrained. Schuchard was born in New York and educated at the Lutheran ministry in Germany.

NEW ROAD IS FROWNED ON  
County Decides Not to Build Rocky Point Highway Now.

Multnomah County isn't spending \$10,000 building a road which will accommodate but one farmer. At least the present year will slip by without seeing such a highway projected.

This was assured yesterday when the County Commissioners refused to entertain the plea of a Washington County farmer that the Rocky Point road be built this summer. Bond managers said he was the only farmer living along this particular road, and they refused to sanction any movement for
