OREGON CITY, Or., July 11.—(Special.)—"I would rather have one old hat of Woodrow Wilson's than own the crowns of all the monarchs," said Dr. Elliott A. Boyd to a large gathering in the auditorium at the Gladstone Chautauqua today.

The speaker's topic was, "The Advantage of a Handicap," and among other things he touched on the need of unified support of the President in the war crisis. He said: "Republicans and Democrats, shoulder to shoulder, should support the Government at this time. President Wilson is not the president of the Democrats, nor the president of the Republicans, but the President of the American people, and we are Americans, first, last, and all the time. Political differences will always continue to be fought out at the polls, but with the country lying in the grasp of war, this is no time to hinder President Wilson by lack of support."

Red Cross Backing Asked.
Among the outstanding points in the speaker's remarks was the plea for the support of the American Red Cross. On the afternoon concert programme appeared the Metropolitan artists, a trio of musicians who handled vocal and instrumental work to a high degree of perfection. They also appeared on the evening programme and were followed by Henry Warren Poor. Mr. Poor showed photographic views of the war to his audience. Mr. Poor also is a platform lecturer of more than ordinary talent, and he was able to convey to his listeners a wonderfully descriptive account of his recent trips abroad.

The 5 o'clock symposium proved a

well-attended and most constructive hour this afternoon, when Mrs. Alice Benson Beach and Mrs. Sarah A. Evans spoke on the problems of the day.

PORTLAND BOY APPOINTED TO ARMY AVIATION SCHOOL.



James Raymond Wilson.

James Raymond Wilson has been appointed to attend the United States aviation ground school at Berkeley, Cal., for training preparatory to receiving a commission in the Signal Reserve Corps. He will leave for Berkeley today. The special orders sent out from the Western headquarters of the Army in San Francisco included Mr. Wilson as the only Portland man in the list. He has been a student at Reed College for three years. He entered Reed College from Spokane, Wash., where he graduated from the Lewis and Clark High School. He has been prominent in student affairs at Reed, being elected to the student council, manager of the Quest, the college periodical, and a leading athlete and football player. He has had special technical training in chemistry and was assistant in the chemistry department during the past year.

SCHOOL DEALS HIGH

No Lack of Patriotism in Oregon Boys and Girls.

MUCH PROOF IS GIVEN

State Superintendent Churchill Answers Query of Spokane Citizen by Statements of Many Evidence of Great Loyalty.

SALEM, Or., July 11.—(Special.)—

Declaration on the part of a prominent Spokane educator to the effect that "there is a lack of true ideal of Americanism in our schools," brought a quick response from Superintendent Churchill today in a letter to X. L. Anthony, of Spokane, with a firm denial that pacifism had anything to do with the alleged lack of ideal.

Oregon Pupils Have High Ideals.

Mr. Churchill says: "In the Oregon public schools the boys and girls have high ideal of American citizenship, and there cannot be found a school in our state where there is a spirit of pacifism among the student body. As superintendent I would mention the fact that from our high schools and colleges a majority of the boys over 18 years of age enlisted when the first call came. When Oregon received her first draft allotment it was found that 92 per cent of her quota had been filled by enlistment. I am informed that a state ranking next had a record of 76 per cent."

Rainbow Regiments Contain 5000.

The next organized demonstration of their loyalty was shown in the sale of thrift stamps and war savings certificates. We have in Oregon an organization called the Junior Rainbow Regiment. In order to secure membership in this regiment a child must have sold or sold and purchased \$20 worth of thrift stamps. In each regiment there are enrolled 1000 children. We have completed the enrollment of the fifth regiment, and names are still coming in to our office. Many of these children have sold as high as \$1000 worth of thrift stamps. So general is the feeling of patriotism in our schools that I am safe in saying that cannot be found a district school in Oregon where there are not children buying thrift stamps."

No Spirit of Pacifism in Schools.

In Oregon we have no spirit of pacifism, and we have no school teachers who have done their full share as leaders in patriotic work in their respective communities. The State Board of Education has always held that the study of citizenship and civics is most important in our schools. This year it is of especial interest to the schools because the various kinds of war work have served as a laboratory for the theories taught in the textbooks."

I sincerely feel that, if your committee makes a thorough study of all this, and goes behind the superficial statements of those who have not examined the evidence, it will find that the spirit of pacifism came from influences outside of the public schools, and that hostility to American ideals has come from that body of people in this country who have never been trained in the public schools.

COWLITZ FIRE CONTROLLED

Portland Lumber Company's Camp Burns Before Rains Come.

KELSO, Wash., July 11.—(Special.)—The logging camp of the Portland Lumber Company on Baird Creek, a tributary of the Cowlitz River, about 30 miles east of Kelso, was completely destroyed by fire Monday with a loss estimated by company officials at more than \$15,000. Along with the camp buildings, material and men's supplies, one donkey engine was burned and considerable line, including one new spool, was ruined. Owing to the dry weather, which made driving of timber impossible, the camp shut down several weeks ago and only a few men were there at the time of the fire. A crew of the Cowlitz River Logging and Rafting Company saved considerable line and checked the spread of the flames toward the other donkey engines and timber several days ago. The camp will be rebuilt and logging resumed as soon as possible.
