Caruso Signs.

ENRICO CARUSO will really appear in motion pictures. The report of a week or two ago that he probably would make one or two pictures for Famous Players-Lasky has been followed by the signing of a contract and the famous tenor will start work this week in New York or Port Line on two pictures, adapted from operas.

It is pointed out that Mr. Caruso's final decision to accept a motion picture contract was largely prompted by a patriotic motive. His usual summer engagements in Europe seemed out of the question because of war conditions there, and rather than spending these months in idleness the celebrated star of the opera expressed particular pleasure at the opportunity of being busily engaged in artistic endeavor and incidentally turning over to the government a large sum of money in the way of income and film taxes as a result of his activities before the motion picture camera.

Victims of Auto Accident to Be Buried at Eugene.

FATAL GUNFIGHT RECALLED

Husband of Mrs. Nunn Mortally Wounded at Marcola, Shot Assassin Eleven Years Ago.

THREE VICTIMS OF SUNDAY'S AUTOMOBILE TRAGEDY AT CASCADE LOCKS.

Walter Price, Mrs. Margaret Nunn and her sons, Earl and Frank.

Price, and members of her family left Eugene last Friday to make their home in Portland, where one of the older boys in the family, Nevie Nunn, is employed in the shipyards. Price, who was separated from his wife and who had made his home with Mrs. Nunn for several years, accompanied them expecting to secure work in connection with the shipbuilding industry.

Nunn Once Police Chief.

Mrs. Margaret Nunn's husband, Herbert Nunn, was killed about 11 years ago in a shooting affair at Marcola. He had been previously chief of police at Cottage Grove and was a brother of Mrs. J. E. Alexander, who resides at 1433 Oak street, Eugene.

Mr. Nunn at the time of his death was employed as an engineer by the Fisher Lumber Company. A man named Crawley and a woman named Cruzan had been arrested for keeping a disorderly house and selling liquor to minors. Nunn was a witness at the trial which resulted in their conviction. Crawley declared that he would kill every man who testified against him and shot Nunn in starting out to make good his threat. Nunn, after being wounded, shot and killed his assassin.

Boy Employed in Portland.

Following her husband's death, Mrs. Nunn moved to Eugene and her children attended school here. Earl, who was killed in the accident at Cascade Locks, left this city about two years ago and went to Portland where he had since been employed. Frank, also a victim of the wreck yesterday, was a student at the junior high school in

Eugene at the close of the school year. Ruth Nunn and George Nunn, who were injured, attended the Washington grade school in this city.

Wallace Price is survived by Mrs. Price, and two sons, William Price, of Eugene, and Wallace L. Price, of Marcola.

CAR USED WITHOUT LEAVE

Machine in Cascade Locks Fatal Accident Was New One.

HOOD RIVER, Or., July 15.—It developed at the investigation of the Cascade Locks freight train and automobile collision, in which four were killed yesterday, conducted last night by Coroner S. E. Bartness, that Earl A. Nunn, the young man driving the car and one of the victims, had taken the machine without the knowledge of the owner, Rudolph Schneider, who conducts the Rose City Dairy. The machine, owned by Mr. Schneider for only two days, had been driven less than 250 miles. Mr. Schneider did not know that his car was missing until he heard of the wreck.

Young Nunn had been using the car in making collections for Mr. Schneider by whom he was employed.

UNCLE SAM TO SAY

Federal Prisoners' Petition Sent On to Washington.

WORK PREFERRED TO JAIL

District Attorney Evans Investigating Legality of Permitting Sheriff to Parole Trustees for Farm Work.

Approval of the plan of permitting County Jail prisoners to answer the urgent demand for farm labor in Oregon this Summer will be sought of United States Attorney-General Gregory this week by United States Attorney Haney. Mr. Haney yesterday told Sheriff Hurlburt that he would submit the question to the officials at Washington at once for decision.

District Attorney Evans is now investigating the legality of permitting county prisoners engaged in this same class of work, and if he holds that Sheriff Hurlburt has authority to let trustees go out into the farms of the state, arrangements for sending the men will be made at once.

Sheriff Hurlburt yesterday transmitted to United States Attorney Haney the petition signed by 82 County Jail prisoners asking that they be permitted to do their "bit" on Oregon farms while serving out state and Federal sentences. Most of those signing the petition are Federal prisoners who are serving time for various offenses.

The prisoners ask that they be made "honor men," and they pledge themselves to every trust which might be placed in them. In his letter to United States Attorney Haney the Sheriff asserted his confidence in the men signing the petition and declares his belief that all who go to the farms for work will return to jail to complete their sentences.

County Commissioner Muck gave official approval of the plan yesterday in behalf of the County Board, and if District Attorney Evans approves the legality of the movement, the county prisoners who signed the petition will be sent to the farms probably the latter part of this week.
