Mr. Barnes Issues Round Robin.
The statement on the round robin issued by William Barnes follows:
"I signed the call addressed to Theodore Roosevelt to enter the Republican primary as a candidate for Governor because I believe that Republic

Ideal Citizenship Urged.
The Colonel adhered closely to his prepared speech, except on one or two occasions, notably when he appealed to his hearers to practice the ideal of citizenship. At no time did he refer to the reported death in France of his son, Quentin, but his audience felt he had

"In this great world crisis, perhaps the greatest in the history of the world during the Christian era, when the events of the next few years will profoundly influence for good or for our children and our children's children for generations: surely in this era

Besides Colonel Roosevelt's address the convention listened to a patriotic keynote speech by ex-Representative J. Sloat Fasset, elected him temporary chairman, named platform and credentials committees and received and referred to the platform committee several resolutions.

One of these demanded that United States Senator Wadsworth support the Federal suffrage constitutional amendment or resign. Another called for a referendum on Sunday baseball.

The platform committee subsequently elected Miss Mary Garrett Hay, of New York, as chairman, she being a conspicuous member of the anti-suffrage group.

At tonight's session Elihu Root, H. Hays, National Republican chairman, and Miss Helen Varick Bosworth, executive secretary of the organization of Republican women of the state were speakers.
