HILLSBORO FOLK REJOICE

Parade and Patriotic Addresses
Form Demonstration.

HILLSBORO, Or., July 19.—(Special.)
—Blowing of the fire siren and ringing
of church bells for a quarter hour this
afternoon followed the receipt of news
of the continuation of the American of-
fensive. Tonight a procession which in-
cluded practically all men and a large
proportion of the women in the city
paraded the principal streets, led by
Mayor Wall and the Cornet D. T. Finley,
retired Canadian army officer, to the
accompaniment of the terrific din of
cow bells, horns and drums.

The parade ended at the courthouse
plaza, where patriotic addresses, which
included the prediction of further cause
for celebration by Mayor Wall and the
Representative W. G. Hare, were cheered
by a large crowd.

FOREST GROVE, Or., July 19.—(Spe-

STAFF IS ANNOUNCED

Colonel Leader Prepares for Next
Officers' Training Camp.

EUGENE, Or., July 19.—(Special.)—
Colonel John M. Leader, military in-

structor at the University of Oregon,
has announced the personnel of the
staff for the second Summer officers'
training camp at the University. Lieut-
enant John F. Bovard, of the Uni-
versity Battalion, will be chief of staff,
succeeding Captain W. F. G. Thatcher,
who has gone to the Presidio cadet of-
ficers' training camp. Lieutenant Karl
W. Onthank will be adjutant; Lieuten-
ant A. E. Caswell quartermaster, and
Lieutenant Dean H. Walker will in-
struct in bayoneting and bombing.
Company commanders will be as fol-
lows: Company A, John F. Bovard;
Company B, Karl W. Onthank; Com-
pany C, E. E. Brosius; Company D,
Charles Comfort.
Captain James A. McKinnon, com-
mander of Company A in the present
camp, will command a company of 50
men from the first camp who will re-
main for the second camp which will
open August 3.

YOUTH RELEASED BY COURT

Lawrence McGovern, Check Forger,
Given Chance to Make Good.

Lawrence McGovern, carnival em-
ployee, was given another chance to
make good yesterday, when Presiding
Judge Tucker continued his case of is-
suing worthless checks for six months.
If the young man keeps out of trou-
ble for that length of time two in-
dictments now pending against him
will be dismissed.

McGovern recently completed a one-
year sentence at San Quentin for the
same offense and came to Portland
with a carnival company. He was re-
cognized here by the police and ar-
rested for an offense committed more
than a year ago. He is said to have
passed two worthless checks amount-
ing to about \$45. His employer repaid
the theft and assured the court and
Deputy District Attorney Collier that
he would keep the young man out of
trouble.

CLARKE RICH IN ORCHARDS

Large Portion of Trees Classified as
Five Years Old or Under.

VANCOUVER, Wash., July 19.—(Spe-
cial.)—The magnitude of the fruit in-
dustry in Clarke County is shown by a
census of orchards just completed by
L. R. Fletcher and Chat Knight, fruit
inspectors for Clarke County, work-
ing in conjunction with the County As-
sessor. The census shows a total of
838,341 fruit trees in the county, of
which 665,990 are prunes. Next in im-
portance are apples, with 84,700 trees.
There are 7925 cherry trees, 2181 peach
trees, 26,886 pear trees, 50,611 trees of
various kinds in family orchards, 7136
walnut trees, 1750 filbert trees, 33
almond, 18 fig, ten mulberry, 50 quince,
25 chestnut and 20 apricot trees.

A large portion of the trees are soon
to come into bearing, 150,850 being
538,000 being listed as 5 years old or
under.

NEW DIVISION TO FORM

Officers and Men to Be Transferred
From Two Infantries.

CAMP LEWIS, Tacoma, July 19.—Suf-
ficient officers, non-commissioned of-
ficers and privates to form a nucleus
for the two National Army regiments
of the 18th and 26th brigades will be
transferred from the First and 44th in-
fantry, both regular Army organiza-
tions, to the 75th and 76th National
Army regiments, it was announced to-
day. This is the first move to begin
the organization of the 13th division,
which will be formed here in the next
few weeks.

Both the First and 44th will be bri-
gaded with the two National Army
regiments, the depletion in the ranks
of the two regular organizations being
filled by the transfer of National
Army men. No other word has been
received in camp regarding the forma-
tion of the division.

William Hutchinson, president of the
International Brotherhood of Carpen-
ters and Joiners, of Indianapolis, ac-
companied by Thomas Neale, secretary
of the organization, and a number of
delegates to a conference of the Pacific
Coast Maritime District Council,
passed through Portland yesterday en
route to their homes.

The council met at Seattle and con-
sidered many matters of interest to
members of the brotherhood.
The council reaffirmed the policy
of the brotherhood of carpenters and
joiners against working over time, ex-
cept in cases of emergency," said Mr.
Hutchinson.

LABOR WILL HAVE VOICE

Employers and Employees to Meet in
Recruiting Councils.

WASHINGTON, July 19.—Admission
of employers and workers to the coun-
cils and operation of the Government's
war labor recruiting and distributing
machinery, which will be put into effect
as regards unskilled labor on August 1
was announced today by the Depart-
ment of Labor.

The recruiting of workers, according
to plans today, calls for the formation
in each state of a state advisory board
of employment service, composed of
the state director of employment serv-
ice, state representatives of employers
and workers.

The representatives of labor in each
case will be named by labor organiza-
tions and the employers' members by
employers' associations.

GOLD MINING ESSENTIAL

Priority on Supplies and Materials
Assured for Industry.

WASHINGTON, July 19.—Gold mining
has been listed as an essential indus-
try, the War Industries Board an-
nounced today and all reasonable pri-
ority on material and supplies used in
the production of gold will be given.
This action was taken on request of
the Treasury Department.
This decision was interpreted by an
official of the priorities committee to
mean that every assistance possible,
short of giving priority to essential war
work, would be given the gold mined.
It was said that needs in the mining
of other metals, such as copper and all
the lesser metals used in war work
already were on the priorities list.

BOARDS ISSUING CARDS

YOUNG MEN WHO REGISTERED IN
JUNE BEING CLASSIFIED.

Calls to Report for Physical Examina-
tion Also Are Being Sent
Out in Some Cases.

Classification cards for the young
men who registered in the selective
service draft June 6 are being sent out
by practically all boards of the city.
These give the preliminary classifica-
tion of the holders.

Most of the boards are sending along
with the cards the calls to report for
physical examination, the next step in
sifting the men into the various groups
according to physical fitness. Next
week the examinations will be in pro-
gress in every local division.

Several Portland boards are con-
cerned because of their inability to lo-
cate special and limited service eligi-
bilities to fill the calls for experienced
seamill and logging workers, such as
chickens, doggers and trimmermen.
Two boards which have been ordered
to furnish such skilled laborers for
transmission to Vancouver July 29 re-
port that they have none on their reg-
ular lists.

Boards 3 and 9, and presumably oth-
ers, are facing this dilemma. They
are employing any men of their divi-
sions in classes 2 and 3, capable of do-
ing the work specified, to come for-
ward for voluntary induction.

HARVEST SEASON EARLY

Labor Situation in Eastern Wash-
ington Is Held Serious.

SPOKANE, Wash., July 19.—(Spe-
cial.)—The harvest season is opening
nearly two weeks earlier than usual
this year and consequently the labor
problem is in a serious situation.
Thus B. A. Hunter, of the United

the labor situation this morning.
"The hot winds and dry weather in
the region of Farmington and other
places east of here have ripened the
wheat crop so that it is absolutely
necessary to start work at once," said
Mr. Hunter. "With this condition we
are badly in need of workers to go into
the harvest fields, and we can line up
good fellows for jobs with good pay."

CANADA'S DRAFT LAW VALID

Supreme Court Upholds Act Affect-
ing 40,000 Men.

OTTAWA, Ont., July 19.—Constitu-
tionality of the amended military serv-
ice act, abolishing certain exemptions,
was upheld by the Supreme Court of
Canada today, in dismissing the ap-
plication for a writ of habeas corpus
made on behalf of a drafted man. The
appeal division of the Supreme Court
of Alberta had previously decided the
amended law was invalid.

The whole fabric of the Canadian
draft law was involved in the case.
The status of 40,000 men now in serv-
ice hinged upon the tribunal's ruling.

3000 BAKERS JOIN STRIKE

Efforts Loom to Bring About Gen-
eral Walkout in Argentina.

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina, July 19.
—One-half of the 6000 bakers employed
in Buenos Aires have joined the general
strike movement, under the direction
of an anarchistic strike committee. Ef-
forts have been made to bring about a
general strike of all labor through-
out Argentina.

The employees of power houses
threaten to walk out within the next
few days and the government is pre-
paring to use naval engineers and fire-
men in their places.

Zeppelin Burns Near Dalheim

AMSTERDAM, July 19.—A Zeppelin
fell in flames at the German frontier
near Dalheim on Monday evening, the
Rotterdam Courant announces to-
day.

PIONEER WOMAN PASSES

Mrs. Mary E. Bryant Dies in Her
87th Year.

Mrs. Mary Elizabeth Bryant, one of
the oldest pioneers of Oregon, who
crossed the plains in infancy, died yes-
terday at her home, 2113 East Mill
street, at the age of 87 years. She had
been in failing health for more than a
year. Funeral arrangements have not
yet been made, but will be in charge
of J. P. Finley & Son.

For many years Mrs. Bryant was a
member of the First Congregational
Church of this city, of Alpha Temple
No. 1, Pythian Sisters, Albany, Or., and
of Gordon Granger Relief Corps, No. 45.
She is survived by her daughter, Mrs.
H. E. Yeager, of Portland, and the fol-
lowing grandchildren: Mrs. Lucy Mc-
Intyre, Sacramento, Cal.; Anna Nance,
Chicago; George G. Yeager, U. S. N.;
Eldridge, Gladys, Ruby and Gertrude
Yeager, all of Portland.

CONFESSION THIEF FREED

W. V. E. Helmer Paroled at Solli-
tation of Grand Jury.

At the solicitation of the Multnomah
County grand jury, Presiding Judge
Tucker yesterday granted extreme
clemency to W. V. E. Helmer, con-
fessed thief, and granted him a parole
after imposing an indeterminate prison
term of from six months to one year.
Helmer admitted stealing \$400 in
gold from the Wells-Fargo Express
Company several months ago. He was
formerly employed by the express com-
pany as a transfer clerk, and admitted
stealing the gold from a money pack-
age which was in transit from Seattle
to the Federal Reserve Bank at San
Francisco.

After his arrest and indictment Hel-
mer repaid the total amount he ad-
mitted stealing.
