

FOOD CRISIS ENDED, DECLARES HOOVER

Administrator in Address at
London Delivers Reassur-
ing Message.

BETTER BREAD PROMISED

Many Distinguished Men Attend
Social Affair, at Which Amer-
ican Official Is Guest.
Conference Opens.

LONDON, July 23.—Speaking at a luncheon given in his honor by the Lord Mayor at the Mansion house today, Herbert C. Hoover, the American Food Administrator, gave a highly reassuring review of the food situation. "We can say emphatically that all anxiety as to the great essentials of food is now past," Mr. Hoover declared.

Reviewing what already has been done in the way of increased production and saving in consumption by voluntary efforts and rationing, Mr. Hoover said the exertion of the American agricultural authorities and farmers had borne such fruit that "there will be no need during the next 12 months for any restriction on the volume of breadstuffs to be shipped to the European allies."

Substitutes to Be Cut Down. Continuing, Mr. Hoover said: "It will be the joint conclusion of my colleagues in the European countries that we can get along with a less moderate mixture of other cereals in the loaf and thus provide better bread for the 220,000,000 people who are opposed to Germany."

Mr. Hoover pointed out, however, that with restricted shipping the entente allies must face a reduction in fodder imports and thus a decrease in animal products until the submarine has been overcome and shipping restored. This degeneration in production, he added, would be continuous throughout the war.

Mr. Hoover added: "In seeking President Wilson's counsel as to the conference of food officials which now is in progress, I received from him this statement of our point of view in all our food negotiations: 'All Eat at Common Table.'"

"That the American people will gladly and willingly make any sacrifice in consumption and in the production of foodstuffs that will maintain the health, comfort and the courage of the people of the allied countries. We are, in fact, eating at the common table with them."

The first speaker was J. Austen Chamberlain, member of the War Cabinet, who expressed the warmest appreciation for Mr. Hoover and the people of the United States for the help rendered in the common cause, particularly through the self-sacrifice of a people in a land of plenty.

"We have been able to tide over times of great difficulty and moments of great anxiety as to the sustenance of our population," said Mr. Chamberlain, "for which we are under a lasting debt of gratitude to Mr. Hoover and the people of the United States."

"This has been America's portion of the war burden, a common fight for right, though now they have come to help us not in foodstuffs alone, but with brave and gallant troops."

Distinguished Men Attend. This was one of the few social affairs which Mr. Hoover will attend during his stay in London. There were present many distinguished public men, including Walter Hines Page, the American ambassador here, the Spanish ambassador, and other allied and neutral diplomats; the Archbishop of Canterbury, Cardinal Archbishop of Westminster, the Marquis of Crewe, Lord Crawford, Viscount Bryce, former Ambassador to the United States; Viscount Harcourt, who was formerly Baron Burnham, Lord Robert Cecil, Assistant Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs; Viscount Devonport, former British ambassador to the United States; Lord Balfour, Foreign Secretary; John Robert Clynes, British Food Controller; various of the colonial premiers and cabinet members who are here attending the imperial conference; Oscar T. Crosby, Financial Commissioner for the United States; Major-General John Biddle, commanding the American forces in the United Kingdom, and many imperial and civic officials.

FOOD CONFERENCE OPENS

The conference of food controllers of the allied governments was formally opened this morning by John Robert Clynes, the British Food Controller. Mr. Hoover attended the meeting, as did the food controllers of Italy, France, Belgium and other countries.

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OVER FIVE MILLION TO BE MOBILIZED

Limits of Draft Age Will Be
Extended to Provide Ad-
ditional Man Power.

ALL MAY BE SENT ABROAD

Work or Fight Order Likely to Be
Made to Reach Many Additional
Lines of Occupation With-
in Next Year.

WASHINGTON, July 23.—The draft age limits are going up as well as down, and the Government is preparing to increase the Army to a strength of from 5,000,000 to 6,000,000 men.

These will be mainly men without dependents, and every one of them will be sent to France, if necessary, to vanquish the Hun. The Government does not contemplate the invasion of the deferred classification of the draft for at least two years, if at all.

There will, however, be an increasingly rigorous coming out of deferred classification of men in places of a sentimental war industrial. The "work or fight" order will be extended to many additional occupations within the next year.

The plan of the five million army will be presented to Congress within the next six weeks according to War Department.

Baker to Present Plan. "When Congress reconvenes," Secretary Baker said today, "I shall present a plan which will involve increased appropriations, modifications of the draft age and somewhat larger mobilization of our military forces."

The question as to the draft age limits is being studied to determine how we can get the necessary number of men with the least interference with the industries of the country."

Secretary Baker said he could recommend definite age limits, lowering the minimum below 21 and raising the maximum above 31.

The age limits which are now under consideration are 18 to 45 but Secretary Baker previously has recommended 19 as the minimum and 45 as the maximum, with a minimum as well as a maximum short of 45.

300,000 on Filing Line. The last official report stated that 300,000 Americans were on the filing line. There are approximately 1,300,000 men in the training camps in this country.

Secretary Baker has been severely criticized for delaying the extension of the draft age. It has been contended that class I will be exhausted within two months, when it will be necessary to slow down Army training and transportation or invade the deferred classification of men.

There were originally a little more than 2,000,000 in class I. There are now less than 275,000, but Secretary Baker expects to raise the number to 1,000,000 by the class I men of 1918 registration, the classification of men in deferred classes and the addition of new subjects drafted under the treaty soon to be proclaimed.

300,000 Men in August Call. There are to be 300,000 called to the colors in August, 150,000 each in September and October, 150,000 in November, and 125,000 in December. A total of 875,000. In this way Mr. Baker plans to make the 1,000,000 men he expects to have in class I last until additional class I men can be provided under the plan he will present to Congress in September.

SALVAGE BUREAU AIDS MORE THAN \$600 IS CLEARED FOR RED CROSS SINCE JULY 4.

Reports to this effect were given yesterday at a largely attended meeting of the captains of various districts of the city. The bureau is not a day, but a successful business venture, the officers declared.

Plans for organizing the whole city into a working partnership with the bureau were outlined. Mrs. Josephine Sharp, of the Northeast district, has the cooperation of the schoolboys and expressmen in the collection of salvage, she reported. Mrs. S. M. Blumauer promised the co-operation of the Junior League with the beginning of the school term.

In answer to a call for the service of volunteer automobiles for the carrying of light articles, Miss Helen P. Pilling has offered her machine. This is the first on the list of private machines that the management of the bureau hopes to receive as a solution to the transportation problem. A truck has been offered for Sunday use.

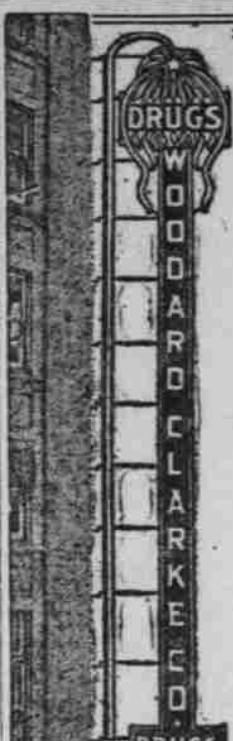
A plan was made that all who can do so deliver their bundles to the nearest stations.

SLAVS FACE FAMINE

Prospects for Harvest This Year Very Poor.

FINANCIAL RUIN THREATENS

American Red Cross to Rush Food, Clothing and Medical Supplies.

Ukraine to Resume Relations With Roumania.

WASHINGTON, July 23.—Starvation, as well as economic and financial disaster, threatens Russia, according to information reaching the State Department. Prospects for the 1918 harvest are described as very poor and financial chaos is said to be almost complete.

Information further furnished by the Russian commissariat for economic affairs shows that the Russian harvest in 1918 compared with 1916 are 38 per cent in the government of Yakutsk; 40 per cent in Voronezh; 53 per cent in Kharkov; 28 per cent in Saratov; 30 per cent in Samara and 34 per cent in Kazan.

Preliminary aid from the American people for Russia soon is to be rushed on a special ship by the American Red Cross. It will include food as well as clothing and medical supplies.

A CANADIAN PACIFIC PORT, July 23.—Paul S. Reinsch, United States Minister to China, was aboard a liner which touched here today on its way from the Orient to the American port. Sentiment in China is overwhelmingly in favor of joint allied intervention in Siberia, Mr. Reinsch asserted.

NEW YORK, July 23.—Expressing the hope that President Wilson will declare his sympathy with Finland and the intention of the Finnish government to see that Finland is allowed to retain full independence after the war, H. C. Donner, president of the Finnish Constitutional League of America, issued a statement today in which he said his danger of a Finnish republic.

Based on late advices from Helsinki, Mr. Donner said that the efforts of German propagandists to persuade the Finns to favor a constitutional monarchy had utterly failed.

Rumanian newspapers interpret this to mean that the Ukraine republic recognizes the union of Bessarabia with Rumania.

AMSTERDAM, July 23.—The Ukrainian Foreign Minister has asked resumption of diplomatic relations with Rumania and also informed the Rumanian government, according to a January dispatch by way of Bucharest and Berlin.

CHICAGO MAN MUST ANSWER TO CHARGE OF CONSPIRACY. Accused Man Fails to Appear in Federal Court at Appointed Hour and Judge Bean Issues Warrant.

When he stepped from an incoming train at the Union depot last night, O. T. Hopson, of Chicago, was arrested by a Deputy United States Marshal on a bench warrant issued earlier in the day by Federal Judge Bean and lodged in the County Jail in default of \$10,000 bail.

Hopson was wanted here for trial on the charge of having conspired with others as stock salesman for the defunct United States Cattle Company, to use the mails in a scheme to defraud.

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ITALIANS TAKE HILL 900

Troops Continue Advance in Albania and Occupy Heights.

ROME, July 23.—The Italians are continuing their advance in Albania. The War Office announced today that Italian troops pushing along the crest of Malisiovo captured hill 900. Further to the east French parties occupied the heights on the left bank of the River Horta.

ST. JOHNS TO GET MILL

Proposed Flour Mill May Cost \$100,000 and Capacity Will Ultimately Be 1000 Barrels Daily.

W. R. BAGOT LEASES ACRE AT MUNICIPAL TERMINAL.

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Ratification of a lease covering one acre of land at the St. Johns Municipal terminal to W. R. Bagot, to be utilized as the site for a flour mill to start with a capacity of 1000 barrels and later to be increased to 1000 barrels, is expected to be made at tomorrow's meeting of the Commission of Public Docks, the terms having been agreed to yesterday. The mill is to be located in an eight-story concrete building and an additional structure will contain cleaning equipment, storage room for grain and the offices of the corporation.
