

BOLSHEVIKI GROWL AT ALLIED NATIONS

Advices by Way of Berlin Say
Slavs Resent Landing of
Troops in Siberia.

THREAT OF WAR REPORTED

Official Washington Sees Teutonic
Influence Back of Development.
Gurko Takes Command
on Murman Coast.

AMSTERDAM, July 25.—What purports to be a threat of the Bolsheviks to begin hostilities against the allies is conveyed in a Moscow dispatch to the Lokal Anzeiger of Berlin. The dispatch says that the Bolshevik government considers the action taken by the entente powers in landing troops on the Murman Coast as tantamount to a declaration of war. The Bolshevik government, the newspaper dispatch adds, has announced that it will take counter measures accordingly.

BASEL, Switzerland, July 25.—According to Russian newspaper dispatches received here General Gurko, former commander of the armies on the Russian southwestern front, has been placed in command of the entente allied forces in the Murman Coast region.

WASHINGTON, July 25.—The reported declaration of the Bolshevik government that it will take counter measures against the landing of allied troops on the Murman Coast, which it regards as tantamount to a declaration of war, is believed by State Department officials to have been inspired by the German government.

Official Washington Skeptical.
Washington officials do not believe it possible for the Bolsheviks to send an army to the Murman Peninsula.

The original protest of the Bolsheviks upon the landing of allied troops at Kola reached the State Department several weeks ago. No attention was paid to this protest, because the United States has not recognized the Bolshevik government.

No word has been received directly from Ambassador Francis since July 11, and there is a feeling of apprehension in official circles here regarding his position in view of the latest turn of affairs. It is known that efforts to get messages through to the Ambassador within the last few days have failed.

The Bolsheviks are in control of Volgoda, where Ambassador Francis was at last accounts. The Ambassador has had no official relations with the Bolshevik government, but if the occupation of the Murman Peninsula by allied troops is regarded as a declaration of war, the question arises as to the standing of Ambassador Francis in Russia.

Hospital supplies, ambulances, medical personnel and necessary funds for the care of wounded Czechoslovak troops who have been in battle near Vladivostok have been rushed to the Siberian port by the American Red Cross.

Secretary Daniels reported that an American warship is caring for 83 wounded, but that the facilities were wholly inadequate for the rapidly increasing number of wounded.

Aid From Tokio Ordered.
Dr. R. B. Tiesler, head of St. Luke's Hospital, at Tokio, was requested by cable to hasten to Vladivostok with necessary supplies and assume charge of the work.

Pending his arrival Charles L. Preston, an American merchant at Vladivostok, took charge of the immediate relief needs.

AMSTERDAM, July 25.—A dispatch from Kiev to the Rheinische Westfälische Zeitung of Essen says: "The peace conference culminated in an open quarrel between the Russians and the Ukrainians. Friction also developed between the Ukrainians and the delegates representing the republic of the Don Cossacks owing to territorial claims, but these negotiations will be continued. All relations were broken off with the Crimean Republic."

Father Moran in France.
EUGENE, Or., July 25.—(Special.)—Rev. Father Moran, formerly pastor of St. Mary's Catholic Church in Eugene, has arrived in France, according to a cablegram received by Rev. Father D. P. Curley. Father Moran resigned his pastorate here a few weeks ago to become a chaplain in the Knights of Columbus war service.

Draft Board Clerk Resigns.
CHEHALIS, Wash., July 25.—(Special.)—Chief Clerk H. H. Swafford has resigned from the local registration board, effective August 1. Mrs. Katherine Robertson who succeeds him. The latter's husband is in France and she has been a clerk on the board since it was established.

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STEEL CALL ISSUED

U. S. Shipbuilding Requires
Four Million Tons Yearly.

SCHWAB GIVES FIGURES

Manufacturers Summoned to Confer
With Director-General—Big
Diver Launched—Destroyer
Built in Seventy Days.

PHILADELPHIA, July 25.—Charles M. Schwab, director-general of the Emergency Fleet Corporation, today called a conference in New York Monday of representatives of all the big steel plants to devise means for keeping the Government supplied with steel, so that the war programme will not be interrupted.

He said the shipbuilding programme now called for a total of 4,000,000 tons a year.

"We now are getting steel at the rate of about 3,500,000 tons annually," Mr. Schwab said. "That amount would suffice if we had been able to build up a reservoir in each yard on which to fall back in emergencies. Until we have such an accumulation in the yards, the larger figure of shipments will be essential. There is nothing to do but to speed up and get it."

Mr. Schwab returned from the Pacific Coast chiefly to take up the steel situation, complicated by the many demands by the Government, the allies and the less essential industries of the country.

WASHINGTON, July 25.—A new world's record in destroyer construction has been established at the Mare Island (Cal.) Navy-yard in the commissioning of the Ward 79 days after her keel was laid, the Navy Department announced today. The Ward was launched 17½ days after the first plate was laid. Formerly it required 24 months to construct a destroyer in this country.

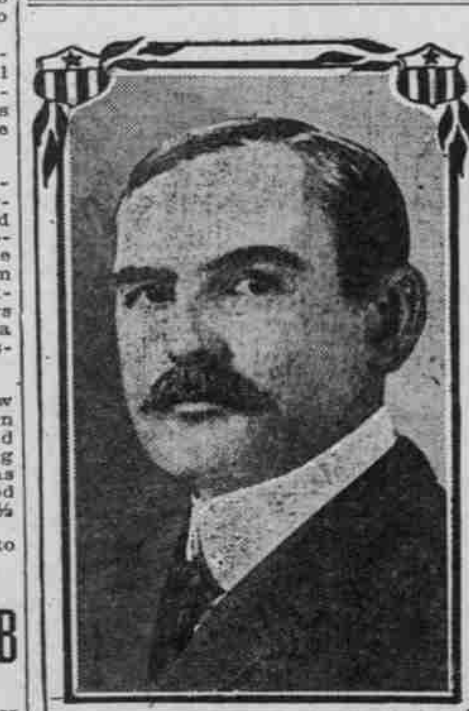
A third member of the alleged moonshiner gang escaped. Information has reached the officers that the man lost himself in the Idaho mountains east of Snake River outside the State of Oregon.

MR. RYAN HERE 3 DAYS

DIRECTOR-GENERAL OF AIRCRAFT
PRODUCTION DELAYED.

Arrival Now Expected Next Wednesday Night—Luncheon to Be Given
by Chamber of Commerce.

Advices received yesterday by the Chamber of Commerce place the prospective visit of John D. Ryan, director-general of aircraft production, at a day later than originally announced. Accompanied by Major-General William L. Kenly and staff, Mr. Ryan will arrive in Portland next Wednesday night to remain for three days.

Thursday noon the guests will be entertained at the Chamber of Commerce, where a luncheon is to be given in their honor. Covers will be laid for 600, and reservations must be made in advance. Owing to the lack of space no ladies will be present at the luncheon and admission will be by ticket only. Reservations should in all cases be made before 11 A. M. on Thursday next.

Colonel Disque will preside at the luncheon, as head of the spruce production work of the Signal Corps. Business and professional men will be in attendance, as will many military officers. RYAN PARTY VISITS BUTTE

Mine Whistles on Anaconda Hill
Send Forth Greeting.

BUTTE, Mont., July 25.—John D. Ryan, Director-General of aircraft production, and Major-General W. L. Kenly, in command of aviation forces of the United States at home and abroad, arrived at Butte shortly after noon today. They were met at the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul station by committees of citizens representing civic and other interests, the Red Cross, scouts, a company from the 14th United States Infantry and a great crowd. As Mr. Ryan stepped from the train, the mine whistles on Anaconda hill began a chorus that continued a quarter of an hour. The party was escorted to the Finlen Hotel, where an informal reception took place in honor of Mr. Ryan, who, as president of the Anaconda Copper Mining Company, formerly lived in Butte. At this reception were Governor S. V. Stewart and other state officials. Following the reception, the Ryan party was entertained at the Silver Bow Club at a luncheon given by the Chamber of Commerce and Butte Rotary Club. Mr. Ryan made a brief address following the luncheon. This evening Mr. Ryan and General Kenly will make addresses at the Broadway Theater. They will leave immediately after this meeting for Spokane.

Speaking informally at a reception tendered him this afternoon at the Finlen Hotel Mr. Ryan said: "We cannot all have a crack at the Hun with rifle and bayonet, but we can all have a crack at him here. Every man who does his duty in the mines and shops of Butte if he is best fitted for this work, is equally contributing his part to the winning of the war. It is his job to stick it out. The war will be won that way."

ARGUMENT ENDS; BOTH WIN

Two Dr. R. B. Millers, of Albany,
Found to Be in Service.

ALBANY, Or., July 25.—(Special.)—An argument last week between two Albany men as to whether or not Dr. R. B. Miller, of Lebanon, had entered the service has been settled, with both parties to the argument victorious. One man insisted the doctor had gone into the Army and the other that he had not, and each was right in his contention.

The paradox is explained by the fact that there have been two men named "Dr. R. B. Miller" in Lebanon, and the men arguing were each referring to a different one.

Dr. R. Bruce Miller is a physician and Dr. Roland B. Miller is a dentist. Both resided and practiced their professions in Lebanon until last week, when the latter left to accept a commission as a first lieutenant in the dental corps of the Army.
