FIRE BUG SUSPECTED

Dynamite Cap and Fuse May A flirtation in two appointments Beauty Chorus. Explain Mill Blaze.

FIRE MARSHAL ON GROUND

Boys Playing Near Rice-Kinder Lumber Plant Site Find Sack Containing Explosives-Officers Start Investigation.

With the finding of a large sack filled with dynamite caps and about 50 feet of coiled fuse yesterday afternoon. by small boys playing near the ruins of the Rice-Kinder lumber mill, which was almost destroyed by fire a short time ago, the belief that the fire was of incendiary origin has been substanof incendiary origin has been substantiated, according to State Fire Marshal Stokes. He investigated the cache where the explosives were found. The damage to the plant at the time of the fire was between \$50,000 and \$50,000, partially covered by insurance, according to officials of the mill.

At the time of the fire various opinions were given as to its cause, although Mr. Kinder, vice-president of the lumber company, and several other

the lumber company, and several other officials were confident that the blaze started from an explosion near the roof of the main plant over the boilers.

After an investigation conducted by officials of the city fire department, employes of the mill and mill authorities, it was ventured by some that fire started in sawdust in the boiler-room. After yesterday's investigation by the State Fire Marshal, he gave as his opin-ion that the mill was wiped out by a fire of incendiary origin, and the aucritics are investigating a number of
