

FAIRGROUND MAY BE SHIPYARD SITE

Bethlehem Company After Land Where San Francisco Had Exposition.

256 ACRES IN NEGOTIATION

Chairman Hurley in Address at Hog Island Declares U. S. Merchant Marine Will Benefit Latin America.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 26.—The transformation of the Panama-Pacific International Exposition grounds here into a shipyard site is in prospect. Negotiations for the transfer of 256 acres of ground, the site of the exposition of 1915, have been opened between officials of the Bethlehem Shipbuilding Corporation, Limited, and the directors of the exposition, it was announced here today.

PHILADELPHIA, July 26.—Latin-American diplomats, the guests of the Shipping Board at an inspection of the Hog Island shipyard, were told today by Chairman Hurley that the great merchant marine now being built by the United States must bring prosperity to America's neighbors as well as to this country or the pride of the United States in the achievement will be diminished, he said.

Headquarters for Both Telephone and Telegraph Offices May Be in Federal Building.

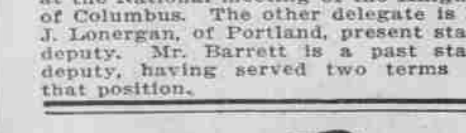
SPOKANE, Wash., July 26.—(Special.)—That Postmaster Dana Child will become manager or director of the telephone and telegraph service in this city July 27, when Postmaster General Burleson will become director-general of telephones and telegraphs of the country, is the substance of a forecast from Washington.

It is predicted also that the main telegraph and telephone offices in Spokane will be located in the Federal building here. Manager B. S. Jones of the Western Union and other telegraph and telephone companies here stated today that they have received no direct information of the proposed changes.

WASHINGTON, July 26.—The graduated excess profits tax of from 10 to 85 per cent, not in any other country, and exemption of \$2000 plus 10 per cent on the amount of invested capital, tentatively decided, will be reached, were practically adopted by the House ways and means committee today.

Taxation of luxuries, estimated by the Treasury as capable of raising \$2,000,000,000, will be considered Monday.

Complaints of inequalities are expected to be remedied by the committee's action in repealing a section of the present revenue law. The effect will be that excess profits tax will be levied on the net income of individuals and partnerships.

The committee decided to retain substantially the same text of "capital invested" and other definitions as are in the present law.

While not definitely deciding the matter, a majority of the committee was favorable to a provision that in no case should the excess profits tax exceed 10 per cent of the net income, not be less than 10 per cent of the net income in the case of corporations with a capital exceeding \$200,000.

Several members of the committee were disposed to favor a flat tax of 80 per cent, but the committee rejected the proposal as discouraging to initiative.

The committee disregarded pre-war comparisons for taxation. There is still a discrepancy of almost \$2,000,000,000 between the revenue estimated to be yielded by the excess profits and income taxes as proposed and the \$6,000,000,000 sought from these sources under the \$8,000,000,000 revenue programme.

RED CROSS DAY NEARS

BIG BENEFIT TO BE GIVEN AT THE OAKS AUGUST 6.

Portland Ad Club Pledges to Sell 25,000 Tickets in Advance—Sam C. Bratton is on Job.

Twenty-five thousand admission tickets will be sold in advance by the Portland Ad Club for Red Cross day at the Oaks, Tuesday, August 6. This is the club's pledge.

Originally it was planned to dispose of 10,000 tickets, and the task of selling these tickets was one of many that Chairman Julius L. Meier, of the Oaks Red Cross day committee, gave over to Frank McCrillis, president of the Ad Club. Mr. McCrillis is sponsor for the Ad Club's publicity and for the entire sale of sorts of the big task of classification, selection and decision on Tuesday of next week.

"I wouldn't waste my time selling 10,000 tickets," said Mr. Bratton. "Let me have 25,000 at the very least, and if the members of the Ad Club, and this committee especially cannot sell those, our resignations will be in order."

Mr. Bratton's first customer was Julius L. Meier, chairman of the Red Cross day committee, who purchased 2000 tickets in a block and will present one to each of his employees.

Body of Drowned Man Found.

KELSO, Wash., July 26.—(Special.)—The body of Gust Janusius, the Greek section hand, who was drowned in the Cowhite River north of here July 15, was recovered Thursday morning by two Greeks who had gone in swimming with him. Janusius had ventured out beyond his depth and was drawn under by the current. The body was brought here for interment. He had no relatives in this country.

BEEF MEN INDICTED

Twenty-One Persons Involved in Alleged Theft.

ALL BUT ONE ARRESTED

Defendants Accused of Underchecking at Delivery Depots and Selling Surplus Product at Big Profit.

NEW YORK, July 26.—Twenty-one persons were indicted here today by the Federal grand jury on a charge of being implicated in the theft of beef consigned to the United States Army.

The defendants, who include butchers, purchasing agents, Government checkers and truck drivers, are accused of violating the United States criminal statute which has to do with conspired to embezzle and dispose of Government property without authority.

All of the defendants except one have been arrested and they were held in bail from \$1000 to \$10,000 each.

According to E. Paul Yasell, Assistant United States Attorney, the plan of operation was for checkers to tell foremen at the delivery depots to give receipts to drivers for a smaller amount than had been loaded upon their trucks.

As a result diplomatic relations between Roumania and the Ukraine have been resumed.

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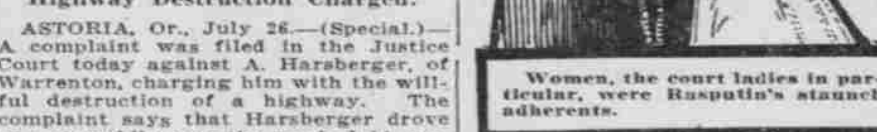
