MODERN WOODMEN PICNIC—Two thousand members of the Modern Woodmen of America assembled at Columbia Park yesterday for a picnic and patriotic programme. Milton A. Miller, collector of internal revenue, spoke on the relation of the fraternal order to the present war. "We must look for great political developments to come out of this struggle," said Mr. Miller. "I expect to see the United States of the world as the ultimate result of the present world war. It may not come now, but it will come some day. Since our Government was organized, 142 years ago, great changes have come about. At that time there was not a kingless nation on the face of the globe. Today there is not a king on the Western hemisphere."

DENTISTS GO TO CONVENTION—Dr. W. Claude Adams and Herbert C. Miller, dean of the North Pacific Dental College, left yesterday morning to attend the twenty-second annual session of the National Dental Association at Chicago August 5-9. Dean Miller will attend a conference of the heads of American dental colleges, which precedes the convention. The association convention programme includes clinics, papers or addresses from two delegates from each of the states. The principal event of the session will be the dedication of a memorial in Lincoln Park to Dr. Greene Vardiman Black, in celebration of the 50th anniversary of organized dentistry in this country.

CLAUDE STRAHAN'S FUNERAL TODAY—Members of the Oregon bar and bench are to attend in the forenoon the funeral services for Claude Strahan, who died in California Wednesday. They will meet at the courthouse shortly after noon today in order to go to the services, which are to be from the Holman undertaking parlors at 1:30 this afternoon. The body arrived yesterday from the south. Mr. Strahan, who was a widow, was the son of Reuben S. Strahan, former Supreme Court Justice of this state.

550 LINN MEN IN SERVICE

Report Prepared Shows Disposition of Draft Registrants.

ALBANY, Or., July 28.—(Special.)—Three hundred and thirty-seven draft registrants in Linn County, who registered in the initial enrollment last year, have been drafted and inducted into the service on special calls since December 15, 1917, and 213 have enlisted in the Navy and Marine Corps.

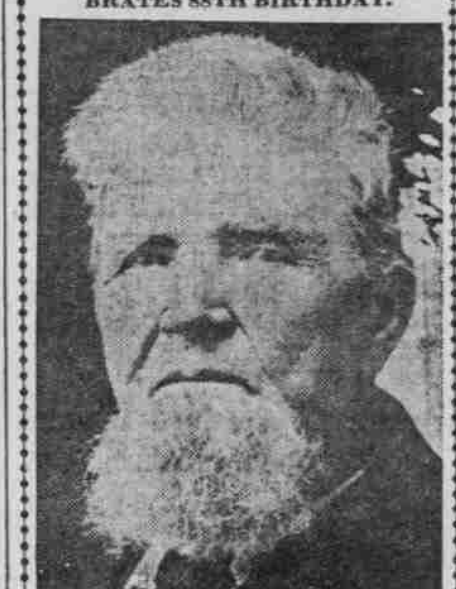
A complete report of the classification and disposition of the 1918 men who registered in Linn County last year has been compiled. It shows that the 550 men mentioned above now are in the service, while the numbers remaining in the various classes are as follows: Class I, qualified for general military service, 29; qualified for general military service but temporarily exempted because of Emergency Fleet work, 20; qualified for limited military service, 64; qualified for limited military service but engaged in Emergency Fleet work, 15; delinquents, 18; total, 146. Class II, 85; Class III, 95; Class IV, 840; Class V, disqualified and aliens, 113.

OLDEST NAVAL VETERAN OF MEXICAN WAR CELEBRATES 88TH BIRTHDAY.

 Robert Starkey, of Marshfield, who celebrated his 88th birthday Thursday, has the distinction of being the oldest naval veteran of the Mexican War. He entered the Navy in 1848 and was at Vera Cruz when that city was taken in March, 1847. Entering his career as a sailor 15 years ago, Starkey has followed the sea all his life. After being mustered out of the Navy he went into the merchant marine and located at Marshfield when that city was but a small settlement.

His poem, "Let the Stars of the Union Remain," written and published in San Francisco prior to the Civil War, was one of the most popular writings of the period and was set to music. A book of his poems has been published.

day at 2 A. M. at his home in Rose City Park. He leaves a widow, Mrs. Fannie De Clark Cox, who was, before her marriage to Mr. Cox, the widow of the late Edward Wheeler, a former Mayor of East Portland.

Mr. Cox died at the age of 64. He was born in Kalamazoo, Mich., and came to Portland in his youth. He is prominently identified with the early history of East Portland, having been postmaster at one time. During his employment in the railway mail service he made his run between Portland and Pocatello.

Funeral services will be held tomorrow at 2 P. M. at Dunning's chapel, under the auspices of Oddfellows' Lodge, interment in Lope Fir Cemetery.

Among a group of naval officers who arrived in Portland Friday to go on a ship is Lieutenant Frank Pulaski, a son of the U. S. S. Lake Moor, a collier which was torpedoed off Fifth of Clyde, Scotland, April 11. Out of 64 men on board but 18 were saved. The boat, which was only 22 miles from Glasgow when it was torpedoed, sank within 70 seconds.

Lieutenant Pulaski lost his officer's papers, enrollment certificate, passport and other valuable papers, which he had wrapped in a leather envelope. Since he never expected to see them again, he was surprised to have them mailed to him July 23, when he was in San Francisco. The papers had been washed ashore on the North Coast of Ireland. Ballahart, County Down, were forwarded to the British government and sent by them to United States Navy officials at Washington.

War Luncheon Topic

Prominent Speakers to Address Rotary Club.

Member of New Zealand Parliament Will Discuss Problem of Caring for Disabled Soldiers.

Military affairs will hold the headlines on the Rotary Club's programme for the Tuesday noon luncheon, when members will assemble in the Hotel Benson's Crystal room. Two prominent speakers, both bearing messages relating to the war and its problems, will address the club.

Honorable Charles H. Poole, member of the Parliament of New Zealand, will talk on the problems presented by the return of disabled soldiers. From the "long white cloud," as the Maori tribesmen name New Zealand, thousands of fine men rallied to the colonial colors of England. Some of them are at home again, battered by war, and it is of these and the manner in which his country met them that Mr. Poole will speak.

Seven wars has Jimmy Taylor seen, and it is the same Jimmy who is going to talk to the Rotarians of these same wars—with the accent on the last and greatest of all wars. Mr. Taylor is in Portland under the auspices of the Y. M. C. A., and has just returned from the allied front in Flanders.

INDUCTEES ARE NAMED

Highway Engineer Reports Progress at Several Points.

SALEM, Or., July 28.—(Special.)—State Highway Engineer Nunn returned yesterday after a trip over the Pacific Highway and through Central Oregon with Commissioners Benson and Booth. He reports 12 miles of work on the Rice Hill section in Douglas County completed, most of the work on the Wolf Creek-Grave Creek grade finished, with the bad grade eliminated, and the Ashland underground crossing, eliminating another bad grade, also ready for use.

The commission also ordered the laying out of a grade between Klamath Falls and Bend, and the survey and location of a grade between Klamath Falls and the Jackson County line.
