

MONTHLY GAIN IN SHIPS 100,000 TONS

Present Situation of Allies Compares With 550,000 Loss in 30 Days Year Ago.

GEDDES GIVES STATISTICS

First Lord of British Admiralty, Speaking in House of Commons, Defends National Shipbuilding Project.

LONDON, July 30.—Sir Eric Geddes, first lord of the British Admiralty, gave the House of Commons today a review of the naval situation. He particularly defended the policy of starting National shipbuilding, and his discussion of the shipbuilding programme in connection with the navy estimates.

The first lord compared the situation today with regard to tonnage with that of a year ago. Then the net loss in tonnage, he said, was 550,000 gross tons monthly. Submarines then were not being destroyed as fast as the Germans were building them, and the merchant shipyards were short of men and material. Four hundred thousand tons net loss monthly was the British deficit. Every yard that could take naval work had been placed on naval building.

U-Boat Sinkings Reduced.
Gradually during the last year, he said, the position had changed in many directions. Instead of losing tonnage the world's net result in the last quarter had been a gain roughly of 100,000 tons a month.

The allied and neutral world was as well off on June 30 as on January 1, 1918. This result, he declared, had been obtained by reduced sinkings and increased buildups.

The reduced sinkings had been achieved, he said, by a greater productive effort devoted to warships and small craft of an anti-submarine character. Nothing was included of commandeered or acquired tonnage in this result.

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FLAG CONTAINS 73 STARS

Brooks-Seaton Company, at Bend, Files New Bunting.

BEND, Or., July 30.—(Special.)—A service flag containing 73 stars, including one of gold, was unfurled at the plant of the Brooks-Seaton Lumber Company here today at 1 o'clock, the entire force being present at the ceremonies.

Lieutenant Barabette, in charge of the sanitary division of the work of the Loyal Legion of Loggers and Lumbermen, who was making an inspection tour of this district, delivered an address in which he said that every man represented by the 73 stars is a hero.

Manager J. P. Keyes said today that the 73 stars represented the number of men in the employ of the company who had left to enter the war in some capacity direct from their positions.

The flag is floating on a 90-foot pole in front of the office beneath the Stars and Stripes.

of Clerges, but the slight gain was more than overcome later.

PARIS, July 30.—Northeast of Fere-en-Tardenois the allied troops in local fighting today advanced their line and also retained the ground captured in the region of Serzy, notwithstanding several German counter attacks, according to the French official communication issued this evening.

Attempts by the Germans to retake the village of Steuphrise southwest of Rheims failed, although the enemy made a slight advance to the west of the village.

Serzy Gains Held.
The text of the communication follows: "On the right bank of the Ource some local fighting enabled us to advance on the height to the northeast of Fere-en-Tardenois."

"In the region of Serzy we maintained our gains in spite of several reactions by the enemy."

"Southwest of Rheims the Germans attacked on both sides of St. Euphrase. All their attempts to capture St. Euphrase failed, in spite of a slight advance made by them to the west of the village."

Retreat Limit Suggested.
The fierceness of the fighting Monday, it is believed, was a sign the German retreat has reached its limit, and the enemy will make a stand with

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his right wing on the plateau south of the Crise and with his left on the hill south of the Ardre.

For the defense of this line, it is said, the Germans will devote all of General von Boehm's army and the reserve divisions taken from Crown Prince Rupprecht, of Bavaria.

LONDON, July 30.—(By the Associated Press.)—The Germans have been counter-attacking very heavily along virtually the entire battle front, according to news that reached London shortly after noon today.

Americans Merely Attacked.
Their attack was an especially heavy one in the American sector, and resulted in driving the Americans out of the village of Clerges, about 8½ miles southeast of Fere-en-Tardenois.

Another German thrust drove the French out of Beugues, near Grand Bozy, northwest of Fere-en-Tardenois. This town, however, was recaptured from the enemy.

There has been heavy fighting near Bazancay, five miles south of Soissons, and also in Flessier wood, about five miles from the front. In this latter locality 45 prisoners were taken belonging to three divisions of the enemy now engaged in the Marne salient.

There are 21 such divisions, of which 10 belong to the northern army of Crown Prince Rupprecht, of Bavaria.

Grand Bozy Advance Extensive.
The main advance on the western side of the front seems to have been at Grand Bozy, about five miles northwest of Fere-en-Tardenois. The French here are pressing north on to the crest of the plateau between the Venle and the Ourcq.

The enemy's withdrawal in reported still orderly and military opinion in London discounts the possibility of any rounding up of Germans in the salient.

LONDON, July 30.—Australian troops have captured the village of Morris, southwest of Ypres, according to Field Marshal Haig's report from British headquarters tonight.

MILLION TONS NEEDED
SHIPPING BOARD TELLS OF STEEL REQUIREMENTS.

Reserve Stock to Be Kept as Stimulus to Production, Says Director-General Schwab.

WASHINGTON, July 30.—Steel requirements of the Shipping Board for the next three months call for 1,000,000 tons, an increase of 250,000 tons over the regular monthly schedule for that period. This increase is destined to provide a reserve of 1,300,000 tons by November.

The requirements, it was learned tonight, were placed before the steel manufacturers of the country by Director-General Schwab, of the Emergency Fleet Corporation, at the meeting held yesterday in New York.

The reserve stock is regarded by Mr. Schwab as a stimulus to production, and plans have been made to keep it intact. Allocation of the present reserve of 1,050,000 tons is fairly good, according to Shipping Board officials, although several Pacific Coast yards will be in need of steel.

The steel schedule of the Shipping Board calls for delivery of 250,000 tons monthly, but it was said that request has been made by Mr. Schwab that deliveries during August, September and October be increased approximately 50,000 tons monthly. This increase, it is believed, will provide a reserve for each shipbuilding yard that will act as an incentive to workmen in turning out tonnage.

MARSHALL WAR CHIEF

NEW HEAD OF MILITARY CABINET CHOSEN BY KAISER.

Germans Use Machine Guns to Suppress Strike Movement at Kalk.

AMSTERDAM, July 30.—Major-General Baron Marschall has become chief of the German Emperor's military cabinet, succeeding Lieutenant-General Baron Moritz von Lyncey, who has resigned because of ill health.

A new strike has broken out at Kalk, in Prussia, near Cologne, according to the Belgian press. The strike was used to suppress the movement and the leaders were arrested, the newspaper declares.

The police, it is added, were still busy when the report was sent, dispersing the crowds which continued to gather in the streets.

SEVEN IN PRISON CAMPS

News of American Officers and Men Captured Given Out.

The death in a German hospital of Private Jerry A. Brown, Columbus, O., previously listed as missing in action, also was announced.

ARCHANGEL CLOSED TO ALLIED EMBASSIES

Ambassadors Who Departed From Vologda Recently Have Reached Kandalaska.

CZECHS BUSY IN CAUCASUS

Several Cities Seized—Two Russian Warships Captured and One Steamer Sunk—Moscow Situation Critical.

KANDALASKA, Russian Lapland, July 30.—The allied embassies, which recently left Vologda for Archangel, were not permitted to remain in Archangel and have arrived in Kandalaska.

The embassies left Vologda July 25 in response to a message from M. Tschibchev, Bolshevik Foreign Minister, declaring that they were in great danger and that a bombardment of Vologda was threatened for the next day. He urged the embassies to come to Moscow, but the Ambassadors decided to proceed to Archangel, where they expected to communicate with their governments.

At Archangel the Soviet, acting under orders from Moscow, refused to permit the foreign representatives to remain, but placed two small Russian ships at their disposal and aboard these they left July 28, escorted by a Russian trawler, on an uneventful voyage across the White Sea.

On the night they were leaving Archangel it was reported that the Moscow government had ordered that the sailing of the Ambassadors be prevented.

WASHINGTON, July 30.—Unconfirmed reports reached the State Department today that Ambassador Francis moved his headquarters from Vologda to Archangel. The State Department has called Mr. Francis regarding the report.

Czechs Capture Cities.
Captured by Czech-Slovak forces of several cities in the Caucasus and a Black Sea port, where two Russian warships were seized and a steamer sunk, it is reported in the semi-official newspaper Reichpost, according to information received today by the Czech-Slovak National Council.

The warships captured were against the port of Novorossiysk, the newspaper said, but no details as to damage done were given.

Cities captured included Stavropol, Sirjebriakov and Michaelovka. It was said that the Czech-Slovaks operating with Russian White Guards had occupied Syzran.

Many Czech-Slovaks had been held prisoners by the Russians in the Caucasus and Southern Russia.

Reports of a loan by Japan to the provisional government of Siberia find no reflection in Government circles here. Officials said they had no information on the subject.

The German-Russian commission, considering the Brest-Litovsk treaty, have agreed upon the general terms of the covenant according to Swedish press reports received today at the State Department.

Moscow Jails Crowded.
The situation in Moscow is becoming more critical daily. Wholesale arrests have been made and the jails are so crowded that other buildings are being used for the confinement of prisoners.

NEW YORK, July 30.—Much political importance is attached to reports from Bolshevik sources that there is a decided change of feeling against the Germans among the Russian peasantry by Hans Vorst, writing in the Tageblatt of Berlin, on June 15, a copy of which has been received here.

He says that the peasants who only a few months ago could not be kept in the trenches are now reported to be in a state of exasperation. They fear the writer adds, that the Germans might come to them and that they will lose the land which they have been holding for six months. A fears are said to have arisen in them an inclination to take up arms.

STOCKHOLM, July 30.—A great sensation has been caused among the Jewish workmen in Warsaw by the sudden disappearance of 19 members of the executive council of the Jewish trade unions, according to Jewish newspapers of Warsaw, says the Jewish press bureau here.

The men had been working with the Zionist and Socialist organizations. Their disappearance, it is added, is apparently due to the mysterious arrests connected with the persecution of Jews now going on throughout Poland, Germany and Austria.

SUGAR PRICE MAY GO UP

Cubans Ask Half Cent a Pound Raise for Next Year's Crop.

NEW YORK, July 30.—The price to be paid in the United States for Cuban sugar next year has been referred to representatives of the two governments for determination at a conference in Washington next week.

The international sugar committee recognizes the need of meeting the increased cost of production in Cuba, shown in a brief filed with the committee by Cuban representatives to amount to more than half a cent a pound.

The prospective increased cost, as outlined by the Cuban mission, would mean the addition to the price of sugar in the United States of a full cent a pound.

350-Pound Sturgeon Caught.
ASTORIA, Or., July 30.—(Special.) The largest sturgeon caught in the Columbia River this season was turned in to the Schmidt cold storage plant last evening. It tipped the scales at 350 pounds and is to be shipped to New York.
