HALF PAY RETIREMENTS RECOMMENDED.
 Five members of the Portland Police Bureau have been recommended by Mayor Baker to the City Council for retirement on half pay. All have served the city more than 25 years. The men are Chief J. J. Ben Branch, Patrolman Frank Patton and John Quinton and Sergeants E. L. Crute and Griffith Roberts. City Commissioner Bigelow, although not opposed to placing the five men on the retirement list with half pay, felt that it was better to complete a pension system for the police department should be submitted to a vote of the people in November.

HARBOR PATROL FIRED UPON.—Even the harbor patrol launch is not permitted by waterfront guards to violate the waterfront protection laws. Upon approaching the harbor patrol boat from in front of the Pacific Marine Iron Works late Wednesday night the police launch was fired upon by one of the armed guards at the plant. This is the fourth time the harbor patrol boat has been fired upon by armed guards.

MANY NEW CASES FILED.—A total of 139 new cases was filed in the District Court during July, according to the monthly report of Clerk C. L. Richmond. Of these, 452 were civil, 93 small claims and 194 criminal cases. The total amount of money received was \$142,934.77, of which \$152,555 was made in fees, \$196,550 in fines, the remainder being paid by litigants in fees and other court costs.

BOND ISSUE IS APPROVED

City Asks Credit for \$579,000 to Purchase Delinquent Property.

Word that a bond issue of \$579,000 for the purpose of purchasing delinquent property has been approved by the capital issues committee in Washington has been received by City Attorney LaRoche.

The machinery by which the city will purchase property on which assessments for street and sewer improvements have not been paid is ready. The city has authorized a bond issue of \$1,500,000 for this purpose.

The city will buy in blocks of property and at the end of three years, if the assessments plus the interest and any penalties that may accrue are not paid, the property will be sold by the city for the amount of indebtedness due the city.

BERRY PICKERS IN DEMAND

Farm Specialist Urges Women and Girls to Help in Harvest.

Five hundred women and girls are wanted to pick blackberries, according to J. W. Brewer, farm specialist. There will be an unusually large berry crop this year, and orders have been received from the Government that blackberries be made into jam for the soldiers. Unless women and girls volunteer their services the crop will be lost.
 Units of 100 pickers are wanted. They will be divided into camps of 25 members each. Each unit will be under the direction of general supervisor, with a local supervisor and cook in each camp. The pickers will be paid not less than 3 cents a pound. Board will be 50 cents a day.

SPRUCE MEN LAUDED

COLONEL BECKETT PAYS VISIT TO VANCOUVER BARRACKS.

Allied Representatives Pleased With Patriotic Response of People of Northwest Districts.

Spruce production in the Northwest and the general spirit back of it has improved greatly in the past four months, is the opinion of Lieutenant Colonel R. M. Beckett, representative of the British high commission, who, with Lieutenant Jean Holland, of the French high commission, is in Portland to confer on the spruce situation. Both men timed their visits here to coincide with that of John Ryan, director of aircraft production.

After conferences with Colonel Dague and Mr. Ryan and after viewing the demonstration at Vancouver on the occasion of Mr. Ryan's visit Wednesday, both allied representatives expressed themselves as much pleased with the situation.
 "Everywhere I am finding the war spirit more united, more loyal and more earnest than a few months ago, and nowhere more so than in your Great Northwest," said Lieutenant Colonel Beckett. "Then there were many disinterested and still others seemingly opposed to the United States taking part in the war, but now I find almost no expressions of disloyalty or hanging back."

"The general spirit now is 'win the war' and 'everything is being bent toward that purpose.' It is wonderful how you have rallied to the support of the spruce workers out here—it is one of the highest contributions this section or any other section can make."

CAPTAIN HARMS WARNS

MORE CARE IN OBEYING TRAFFIC ORDINANCES MUST BE SHOWN.

Twenty Arrests Made in Short Space of Two Hours at Intersection of Sixth and Stark Streets.

Unless drivers of motor and other vehicles in Portland are more careful in the future than they have been in the past in obeying the traffic ordinances, especially for the congested districts, drastic action will be taken against them, warns Captain Harms, of the traffic department of the police bureau.

Captain Harms and Officer Horack took stand at Sixth and Stark streets Wednesday afternoon, and within two hours arrested 20 men for violating traffic ordinances.
 The majority of the violations are minor ones which could easily be avoided but which are highly important to the safety of the public. One of the most numerous is that of turning corners or otherwise changing direction of travel without first giving the proper signal.

Another section of the traffic ordinance often violated requires vehicles to pass to the left of other vehicles and not to pass or overtake them at street intersections. A motor vehicle overtaking any other vehicle, before passing shall give a signal by one blast of horn or bell.

The traffic department also wishes to call attention to the fact that the speed limit in the congested district for motor vehicles of over one ton capacity is ten miles per hour and that all such vehicles, whether in the congested district or not must slow down to half speed, five miles per hour, at street intersections.
