DR. YOUNGSON TO PRESIDE.—Dr. William Wallace Youngson will preside at a luncheon today at the Chamber of Commerce. Those present will include the members of the joint commission for the entertainment of the state Methodist conference that will convene in Portland September 23. Those on the committee are representatives of the Methodist Men's Social Union, officers of the city church extension committee and the president and secretary of the Preachers' Association. Plans for the entertainment of Bishop Homer C. Stuntz who will be here August 12, and plans for the conference will be discussed.

Kaiser's "Friend" ORDERED INTERVIEW.—Interview of John Heshagen, German alien enemy, during the war was ordered in a telegram from Washington to Assistant United States Attorney Veatch yesterday. Heshagen was arrested a few days ago for sedition talk. Among other things he professed an intimate acquaintance with the Kaiser who, he said, was his companion on a number of fishing trips in the old country. Another telegram ordered the parole of William Ruge, a German farmer of Rex, Washington, County, who was arrested recently for venturing within 100 feet of the waterfront.

ITALIAN SMOGLER FINED.—Gus Firmach, an Italian, was yesterday fined \$15 by United States Judge Wolverton upon pleading guilty to smuggling 60 pints of liquor into the state from California last January. Firmach professed ignorance of the law and frankly told the court that he was merely providing for himself a supply of liquor for the long drought for which he thought Oregon was due. He brought the liquor into the state by packing it among his blankets.

DAKOTA G. A. R. COMING.—The department of South Dakota, Grand Army of the Republic headquarters car, will reach Portland at 8 o'clock on the morning of August 10. The accompanying delegates received by Colonel C. A. B. Fox, of Sioux Falls, S. D., who is in Portland. Delegates from all parts of South Dakota will be on this train and the delegation will be accompanied by the Sioux City life and drum corps. The headquarters of the delegation will be in the Multnomah Hotel.

OVER 500 VOICES NEEDED.—At the regular fortnightly "community sing" of the National Choral League this evening at Central Library Professor Tom G. Taylor, the musical director, will enroll names for the civic chorus of 500 voices to be ready for service at public meetings and patriotic celebrations. The programme will consist of American songs and the usual brief lesson in sight-reading. The public is invited to sing. Music is free and there is no collection.

ASSAULT IS CHARGED.—L. Holman, a wholesale jeweler, was arrested yesterday on a secret indictment charging him with an assault on George Crystal, manufacturer of chewing gum, of Newark, N. J. He was released on his own recognizance pending the filing of bonds in the sum of \$250. According to the complaining witness, Holman made a vicious attack on him in a room at the Benson Hotel on July 30.

RAT HOLLINGSWORTH SOUGHT.—Information regarding the whereabouts of one Ray Hollingsworth, about 30 years of age and formerly residing with his mother on West Glen street, is being sought by Private William D. Molyneux, of the cooks and bakers' school at Camp Lewis. Hollingsworth is said formerly to have been employed at the bookkeeper by the Crown Flouring Mills here.

Firemen broke down the front door in their effort to find the source of the smoke and fire. No other damage was done.

WILL MADE OUT IN CHINESE.—In the quaint hieroglyphics of his native land, Lew Kwong wrote out his last will which he realized was fast approaching death. This will, the first of its kind to be filed in the local courts, was filed for probate yesterday. The Chinese, who died last week, left his \$1000 estate to his brother, Lew Hen. The original will, together with the English translation, was made a part of the court records. It was signed by the dying Chinese in a Portland hospital on July 30.

OVER 500 AUTOS ARE WANTED.—An appeal for the donation of 500 automobiles to carry Grand Army of the Republic delegates to and from the encampment to Bonaventure on August 23, the last day of the National encampment, has been issued by W. FOODS CRASHING FARE PUBLIC.—Changes which appeared in the weekly price schedule announced yesterday by the Food Administration price interpretation committee were insignificant in extent, but were said to be generally in favor of the public. In giving out the list the State Food Administration called upon grocers to be chary about selling sugar to strangers and asked consumers to co-operate to solve delivery problems.

VOLUNTEER FIRE AUXILIARY PLANNED.—An effort will be made to organize an auxiliary volunteer fire department, to consist of former members, to serve without compensation. Under the plan members of the organization would turn out for general alarms and be drilled to handle reserve equipment. A meeting to discuss the plan will be held Wednesday night in room H of the Library.

VETERANS MEET TONIGHT.—The recently organized Veterans of Foreign Wars will hold a meeting tonight at 575 Courthouse at 8 o'clock. Matters of importance will be discussed and a full membership is desired. All men who have served in the Army or Navy on foreign lands are eligible to membership in the organization, which is National wide in scope.

DAN CUPID JOLTS MARS

PROBABLE EXTENSION OF DRAFT AGES CAUSES SUDDEN WEDDINGS.

Men Above 32 Years, as Well as Those Below 21 Years, Take Kindly to Homes and Wives.

Dan Cupid isn't "totin' fair." He's slipping one over on Mars, the war god; at least, that's the opinion expressed yesterday by "Cupid" McGrew, of the marriage license bureau.

During the past week alone eight youths of Portland, approaching draft age, have taken out marriage licenses. Under the ordinary run of things eight licenses to boys under 21 years is a high average for a three-month period. The rush of boys between 18 and 21 years for licenses is explained by county officials to the near approach of the new draft law, when it is proposed to open the draft lottery to men between the ages of 18 and 45 years. By getting married before the new law goes into effect these youthful benefactors figure on keeping the home fires burning while somebody else goes across to do the fighting, say the county officials.

The marriage bureau records likewise disclose that men between the ages of 32 and 36 years are now hearkening to Cupid's seductive call. They escaped the first draft registration, but will be included in the one now pending. When the new law reaches close to the passage stage it is predicted that the marriage license bureau will witness a revival of activity similar to that prior to June 3, 1917.

FOOD HOARDING CHARGED

Farmer and Wife Residing Near Roseburg Are Under Arrest.

United States Marshal Alexander received a telegram yesterday announcing the arrest of J. H. Castle, a farmer residing near Roseburg, by Deputy United States Marshals Tichener and Mass. Castle is charged with wrongfully hoarding flour and other food-stuffs.

Castle last week successfully resisted an attempt to arrest him by Special Agent Glover of the Department of Justice, and Sheriff Quine, of Douglas County. These officers went to Castle's farm home and were questioning Castle and his wife when the husband felted the Sheriff with a blow from his fist, while the wife seized a revolver, which she aimed at Glover only to find herself covered by the officer's gun. No further attempt was made to take the couple into custody. Castle is reported to be an American-born citizen of English ancestry.
