There have been times this season when it was utterly impossible for dairymen to obtain necessary feed, regardless of prices. The stuff simply

This, of course, was unfortunate, and many, not fully understanding the facts of the situa-tion, will say it was an unbusiness-like procedure, but if these who condemn the dairyman for his action will put themselves in his place and see the hard facts that he is forced to face, they will understand, and there will be less criticism.
