

INCREASED RATES

Public Service Boards of Three States File Complaints With Commerce Commission.

INDUSTRIES HELD MENACED

Advances in Freight and Express Declared to Be Discriminatory and Without Authority of Existing Law.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 13.—Public Service Commissions of Washington, Oregon and Idaho today filed complaints with the Interstate Commerce Commission attacking the 25 per cent increase in freight and 10 per cent increase in express rates as applying to fruit, vegetables, berries and fish shipped from the Northwest.
