

DISQUE CHOOSES ADJUSTMENT BODY

Board Will Settle Problems
Arising Between Employer
and Employee in Industry.

FIRST MEETING IS CALLED

Council for Inland Empire Division
Not Yet Completed—Arrange-
ments to Defray Expenses Are
Made—L. L. L. Named.

Names of the 16 members of the central council, conceived as a board to adjust problems arising between employer and employee in the Government-controlled lumber industry of the Northwest, were announced yesterday by Colonel Bruce P. Disque, in command of the Spruce Production Division, Bureau of Aircraft Production. Members of the eight district councils, which are interlinked with the central body, were also made known.

This central council is that only of the Coast division, or region west of the Cascades. The council for the Inland Empire division has not yet been completed.

Names of the employee members were announced at the time the Loyal Legion of Loggers and Lumbermen convened in Portland, this body doing the selecting. Identity of the employer members was not disclosed until announced by Colonel Disque.

Central Council to Meet

In order to begin promptly the important task of framing regulations and by-laws the central council is called to meet in the Spruce Production Division headquarters in Portland at 10 o'clock Monday morning, August 19. It is possible that the council will be consumed in the deliberations. As a means of defraying expenses of the Loyal Legion council members while attending this and subsequent sessions a per capita tax of 15 cents per member is proclaimed, in accordance with decision of the delegates in the recent convention. The fund is to be handled by the treasurer of the Loyal Legion Monthly Bulletin.

Colonel Disque's bulletin asks for selection of local secretaries, preferably the delegates who attended the Portland meeting, who are fitted to serve as chairmen of the local council in each lumber plant. The council represents the ultimate ramifications of the arbitration system being worked out. General problems affecting employees are to be presented to the council through the local council. If satisfaction is not obtained appeal to the district council is authorized.

There are eight districts in the Coast Division and four in the Inland Empire Division. Each has its committee of three employees and three employers.

DIVORCE DOCKET LARGE

FORTY-TWO DEFAULT CASES NOW
AWAIT DETERMINATION.

Greater Congestion of Docket Is Expected as Result of Delay in "Hurry-up" Decrees.

Multnomah County's divorce docket promises to be more congested during the September term of court than ever before in the history of the county. This will be due to the new rules recently promulgated, denying "hurry-up" divorces to impatient persons. Yesterday there were a total of 42 default divorce cases on the docket awaiting final determination, and this number, say county officials, probably will be increased to more than 100 before the Fall term of court is started. Five new suits were filed yesterday, containing the usual allegations of misdeeds committed by the spouses. Ruby S. Hayden says that William F. Hayden, whom she married in Portland in 1912, gambles constantly and fails to provide for her. She wants a decree and the right to resume her maiden name of Ruby Weston. Deserion is charged in the complaint which W. F. Henry filed against Cora Henry, to whom he was married in Massachusetts in 1909. Deserion also is the plea of Nellie Stigmiller in her complaint against John Stigmiller. They were married at Great Falls, Mont., in 1902. Eleanor L. Roth charges William R. Roth with extreme cruelty. They were married at Vancouver, Wash., December 2, last. Deserion is charged against Harry Quimby in the complaint of Jessie Quimby. They were married at The Dalles in 1907 and have a young daughter. The plaintiff asks for her permanent custody.

CLARKE COUNTY PROSPERS

Assessed Valuation This Year Will Exceed \$15,000,000.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Aug. 15.—(Special.)—For the first time in its history, the assessed valuation of property in Clarke County will exceed \$15,000,000 this year. J. J. Claret, County Assessor, has been figuring on the new buildings and industries started here and the increase in assessable property in Vancouver exceeds half a million dollars. Among the new industries are the Motor Construction Corporation, the G. M. Standifer Construction Corporation, the Great Northern Shipbuilding Company and the Pendleton Woolen Mills.

CHANGES ARE URGED

County School Superintendent
Makes Recommendations.

UNIFORM TAX IS FAVORED

Suggestions Made Also Regarding
Appointment and Bonding of
Clerks; Total Enrollment for
Year Reported as 42,278.

A number of recommendations are incorporated by School Superintendent Alderson, of Multnomah County, in his annual report to the State Superintendent of Public Instruction. He urges that school clerks of the county be bonded by a blanket bond instead of individually, thus effecting a considerable saving. He believes that a vacancy in the office of school clerk or director should be filled, until the next regular election, by appointment by the County Superintendent.

A uniform special tax for school purposes throughout the county is urged. Instead of varying levies as at present. He also recommends that the question of consolidating two or more districts should be determined by a majority vote of the legal voters in the entire territory affected, and that the time for holding such an election should be optional with the County Board.

County Enrollment Large.

Interesting figures are given in the annual Multnomah County report. The number of persons of school age in the county as revealed by the last school census was 42,278. The total enrollment of pupils for the past year was 22,778. Of these, 2739 completed the work of the eighth grade during the year, while 7657 were enrolled in grades above the eighth. The teaching corps totaled 1252, of whom 227 were normal school graduates, 152 were university or college graduates, 169 had had partial college or normal school training, 221 were high school graduates only, and 95 had had less than a full high school course.

Receipts for the year totaled \$2,216,711.11, while disbursements reached \$2,371,391.98. Of this last amount \$1,618,689.11 went for teachers' salaries, \$271,311.80 was expended for new buildings and sites, while repairs and improvements took \$234,026.19.

School to Open September 9.

The schools of the county outside of Portland will open for the Fall semester on September 9. There are few teaching vacancies, and no dearth of teachers, according to Superintendent Alderson, although his office receives frequent calls for teachers from other counties of the state. He reports that numerous changes have been made in the teaching staffs, and that practically all the vacancies have been filled by normal-trained teachers.

George Bennett, Former Kelso Man,

KELSO, Wash., Aug. 15.—(Special.)—George Bennett, a former resident of this place, was found dead Monday morning at his camp, near the Upper Coweeman by Jake Nordvik, a nearby rancher. Mr. Nordvik had failed to see any smoke about his camp and went to investigate. Bennett had suffered from heart weakness for some time and had been on a camping trip for a month endeavoring to recuperate. He lived here for 10 years, being employed as night clerk at the Rockwood Hotel. According to instructions from his sister, Mrs. William Russell, of Santa Cruz, Cal., the body will be sent there for burial.

DECOMPOSED BODY FOUND

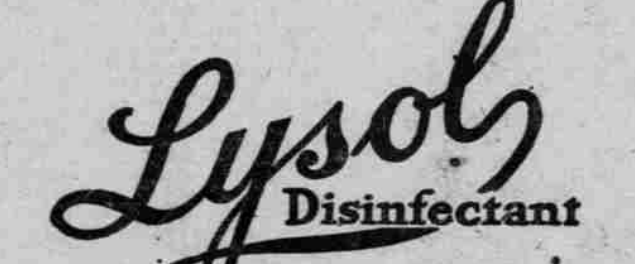
