

FARMERS WARNED TO RAISE SHEEP

Wool Grower Declares Shortage So Great Only Hope Rests in Small Flocks.

GOVERNMENT TAKES ALL

Civilians Will Have to Do Without Unless Ranchers Throughout Nation Can Be Induced to Come to Rescue of the Public.

Unless practically every farmer in the United States places a small band of sheep on his farm, thus relieving a crisis now faced by sheepmen, the wool supply of this country within another year will become so depleted that there will be no wool at all for civilian purposes.

This is the prediction of Robert N. Stanfield, prominent Oregon wool-grower, who has been in Portland the past several days in conference with Lewis Penwell, Federal Wool Administrator.

"The Nation's wool supply for this year is approximately 220,000,000 pounds short of what it should be," Mr. Stanfield said. "The needed supply is 300,000,000 pounds, but only 280,000,000 pounds were received. Practically every bit of this will be used for Government purposes, and although the Government has not yet commandeered the wool output, the woolgrowers are selling to the Government at the Federal price of between 25 and 45 cents a pound for wool in the grease."

It is imperative, Mr. Stanfield said, that the farmers be educated into raising medium-sized flocks of sheep the same as they have with chickens for years past.

The Pacific Coast farmers must be awakened to the seriousness of the situation, he asserts, and if this is done Portland can continue its Nation-wide recognition as a wool market. Portland at the present time is the second city in the country as a grease wool market, there now being 15,000,000 pounds of wool stored in this city from the 1918 wool clip.

"The worsted mill at Sellwood has been ordered by the Government to discontinue its present manufacturing activity and devote its entire time in the manufacture of army cloth," he said. "The entire output of the Portland Woollen Mill is being devoted to Government work, and in fact, practically every woolen mill in the country is engaged exclusively in making woollens for the Government's needs."

Mr. Stanfield, who is the largest individual wool grower in the United States, left last night for Montana and Nebraska on a special mission for Wool Administrator Penwell.

Mr. Stanfield's 1918 clip of 1,600,000 pounds—the largest individual clip in the country—went to the Government.

Large Snake Is Killed.

ALBANY, Or., Aug. 18.—(Special).—On the same farm on which a large rattlesnake was killed a few weeks ago—the farm of James Nichols, near Plainview—a blowsnake 4½ inches in length was killed Friday. This blowsnake was the first snake of the kind ever seen in that vicinity, and was the largest snake of any kind ever killed near there.

Foul Play Is Suspected.

CENTRALIA, Wash., Aug. 18.—(Special).—It is feared that Henry Kilby, who disappeared from his home on Ford's Prairie on Aug. 6, has met with foul play. Mrs. Kilby has enlisted the aid of Sheriff Berry in locating the missing man. Mr. Kilby, employed at the Foron coal mines on the prairie, started for his work on the day of his disappearance, but did not arrive there. He is known to have cashed a check for \$174, shortly before he was reported missing.
