

RUTHLESS POLICY THREAT OF TROTSKY

Minister of War Denounces
Landing of Allies on Mur-
man Coast.

SOVIET SPLIT PROBABLE

Stormy Scenes and Recriminations
Mark Proceedings of Bolshevik
Congress—Maria Spiridon-
ova Leads Opposition.

LONDON, Aug. 21.—Belated Reuter dispatches say that the outstanding feature of the all-Russian congress was the denunciation by War Minister Trotsky, of the action of the allies, in landing on the Murman Coast. He threatened merciless measures of defense.

A final breach between the two revolutionary parties in Russia was manifested from the opening of the congress. Upbraiding scenes and recrimination marked the meeting of the congress.

An assertion that a majority of the people in the provinces were opposed to soviet rule was made by Maria Spiridonova, of the social revolutionists, of the left.

The soviet majority in the congress repudiated all possibility of a renewal of the war. The Social Revolutionists of the Left insisted on a merciless struggle against all imperialistic plunderers and German robbers.

On July 3 all the delegates of the Social Revolutionists of the Left to the all-Russian congress were arrested and the government of Volodga was declared in a state of siege owing to an anti-soviet uprising at Jaroslavl.

On July 13 11 former officers who had served under General Alexieff were summarily shot in Moscow as counter revolutionaries.

On July 17 French and British military officers were prohibited from moving one town to another and a strict watch on their movements was ordered.

A Moscow dispatch received in Amsterdam July 26 reported that Maria Spiridonova had been arrested and that of social revolutionists shot for the murder of German Ambassador Von Mirbach.

AMSTERDAM, Aug. 21.—The former Russian grand duke Paul Alexandrovitch, says a Moscow dispatch to the Lokal Anzeiger, of Berlin, has been arrested by the Bolsheviks. He is an uncle of the late former Emperor and father of Grand Duke Dmitri Pavlovitch.

Several hundred officers arrested in Moscow have been shot, according to a letter written in Moscow on August 14, by Dr. Alfons Paquet and published in the Frankfurter Zeitung.

Dr. Paquet says that several hundred British and French businessmen have been arrested in Moscow and adds that further arrests are expected.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 21.—No objection will be raised by the Finnish government to the passage through Finland of Americans seeking escape from Russia, the State Department was advised today through the Swedish Foreign Office.

BRITISH TEAR OUT MILES

machine guns, fired a rain of bullets, but while they were doing it they must have suffered severely not only from machine gun fire but from shells.

As it is inevitable when a battle rages with such intensity as along this embankment the exact situation is obscure, but reports have been received that the British have broken down the German defense at various places and have passed through to the eastern side.

Behind the embankment there may not have been a great force of German reserves when the battle began, but by this time the harassed enemy certainly is rushing men to the scene as fast as he can, for another disaster threatens him.

The battle opened with a sudden crash of guns of all calibers just as the day was breaking. Great billows of thick fog such as are seen only on this side of the Atlantic hung over the scene. The infantrymen and tank crews could scarcely see 100 feet ahead of them and the fire of countless blasting cannon was smothered, while ex-

ploding from their mouths rolled up into a continuous deafening roar.

The fog was most favorable to the attacking formations, for it effectively shielded them from the eyes of the enemy and at the same time caused the Germans opposite to believe that the attack was not directly against them.

"The guns sounded a long way off," said one of the early prisoners, "so we congratulated ourselves that we were not to be attacked. Just then a tank followed by infantry rolled right over our position and I surrendered."

As tanks and men followed behind a sweeping barrage, the atmosphere became even more thick for mixed with the fog were great banks of smoke from innumerable shells fired for just this purpose of increasing the protecting screen.

The German guns retaliated only feebly, but there was sharp fighting at various points where machine guns and snipers put up a stiff battle.

At the little shell-ridden village of Courmes, about the center of the battle front, the German garrison made a desperate fight, and for a time the advance of the infantry was held up at this place.

Then the tanks arrived on the scene and charged into the enemy positions, quickly transferring them from strongholds to shambles. The tanks repeated this performance at other places in the line where the stubborn Boches held out courageously.

But their courage availed nothing in the face of the great tanks, dipping in and out of shell holes and old trenches that have seen some of the war's fiercest fighting, and the smaller whippet tanks and armored cars which sped over the ground at a great rate in their mission of clearing the way for the infantry, sweeping in from the rear of the positions from which the enemy was working his guns.

Boche Resistance Weak.

In comparison with the harder fighting it is worthy of mention that at some places no resistance of any practical importance developed. For instance, the village of Beaumont was taken with only three casualties. One wounded man returning from the fighting said he went in three kilometers through the enemy lines before seeing a single boche. This is explained by the fact the German positions were very thinly held at some points.

As to prisoners, there is no definite information, but some 1000 have reached the cages and they have come in from a considerable distance, most of them having been captured during the early fighting. Some of the first prisoners arrived at the cages with handbags and long curved porcelain pipes. They seemed clean and were as pleased with themselves as if going on leave. One of them, on being questioned, said he was very happy to be taken.

Machine Gun Silenced.

A wounded British soldier told of being separated from his platoon in the fight, but he pressed on nevertheless and joined other groups. One said that, plunging blindly through the fog, he ran directly into a German machine gun, which opened fire on him. It managed to get in one shot, taking off a finger, but the British soldier finished off the Germans with his rifle.

In the early forenoon the fog cleared away completely and the sun appeared, and ever since the battle has been progressing under a broiling sun. As the fog disappeared the roar of airplane motors increased and the British machines pursued the same tactics as at the Somme, harassing the enemy at the rear and strafing the German troops generally, upsetting them completely at many places.

Tanks Exact Big Toll.

The fast little whippet tanks had, as one tank officer said, "gone out into the wide world" and there is no doubt that they are exacting as great a toll here as they did south of the Somme. The armored cars had gone into action also, operating far forward, chasing the Boches from his many lairs and making quick work of those who would not run.

In this battle the advancing troops did not stop a moment at their early objectives. Several formations joined forces and pressed on together. Successive echelons were merged at the place where the going was heavy.

The battle continues with unabated fury and there is no sign that its conclusion is near.

Some 200 prisoners were taken with great promptitude. They were chiefly from the Second Guards division and the Fourth Bavarian division.

Cannon Are Captured.

Some field guns fell into the hands of the British very early in the attack. The German infantry was discovered not having more than a strength of 50 of all ranks.

In the first hour of the offensive, the British captured Abinezeville, Beaumont and Moyenville.

All the German outposts and positions along the important Dranoutre ridge, between Roudegot and the Loire Hospice have been attacked by the British. This front is in the Lyons salient.

Although prisoners said the Germans had been expecting the attack for a week, it was a tactical surprise. Tanks and infantry advanced through the heaviest fire in the gray morning light.

The British tanks performed the same gallant services that they did in the battles to the south of the Somme. It is noticeable that here, as in the battles south of the Somme, the British casualties have been exceedingly light. This probably is partly due to the efficiency of the tanks.

Substantial Progress Recorded.

No reports have been received from Louesot Wood, where the enemy was supposed to be in force, but the advancing British have progressed for some distance on both sides of the wood, and if a large enemy force is there it is in a precarious position.

Aside from the battle between Arras and Albert, which was progressing satisfactorily, the British pushed on at various parts of the front.

Along the Dranoutre ridge, between Roudegot and the Loire Hospice, where the British attacked the whole of the enemy's outpost positions, sharp fighting continued. On another section of the front Le Touret has been occupied.

South of the Somme the enemy attack yesterday completely broke down, but there may be more fighting.

Late yesterday evening the British advanced line at Fampoux was viciously attacked by the enemy, who was driven off with heavy casualties without achieving any gain.

In the Somme River zone no extraordinary activity has been reported.

AUTO WRECKED; LADS HURT

Chester Douglas, of Oregon City, Is Seriously Injured.

OREGON CITY, Aug. 21.—(Special.)—Chester Douglas, a young picture operator at the Star Theater, sustained serious injuries Wednesday, when the car he was driving was wrecked on the Eighty-second-street hill near Clackamas.

Douglas, with George Snook, was returning to Oregon City, as they swung round the curve at the southern end of East Eighty-second street the car left the pavement and plunged into the ditch with its occupants, after turning turtle. It is believed that Douglas' skull was fractured. He was thrown through the windshield and landed upon his head and shoulders in the ditch.

Snook, while badly bruised, was not seriously hurt. The boys were taken to Clackamas by passing autoists after the accident and from Clackamas were brought to Oregon City by Deputy Sheriff Joyner.

OTANI IN SIBERIA

Commander of Allied Forces
Reaches Vladivostok.

EMERSON JOINS CZECHS

American Directs Activities of Forces
Engaged in Repairing Railroad
Bridges—Big Stretch of
Line Controlled.

LONDON, Aug. 21.—General Otani, commander of the entente allied forces in Siberia, has arrived at Vladivostok from Japan, according to a dispatch to the Daily Mail from Vladivostok dated Sunday.

Czecho-Slovak leaders left Vladivostok Saturday, the newspaper adds, for Washington and Tokio to urge the sending of more assistance to Siberia.

HARBIN, Manchuria, Aug. 16.—Colonel George H. Emerson and party, from whom no tidings had been received for more than two months, are now co-operating with the Czecho-Slovak troops near Irkutsk, according to a telegram just received from Colonel Emerson. The party is engaged in repairing bridges.

Czecho-Slovaks are in control of the railway from Lake Baikal to the Ural Mountains.

It is reported that 10,000 Czecho-Slovaks are on their way to the Manchurian front, and that the Japanese are going from Vladivostok to the Ussuri front, where they are replacing Czecho-Slovak forces that have been fighting there.

Colonel George H. Emerson, former general manager of the Great Northern Railway, went to Siberia last November to superintend the work of double-tracking and re-equipping the trans-Siberian railway.

VLADIVOSTOK, Aug. 17.—(By the Associated Press.) At the request of General Dietrich, the commander of the Czecho-Slovak forces in Siberia, the head of the American forces is dispatching a limited number of troops to occupy points along the railway between here and Nikolai, the junction point of the trans-Siberian railway, with the line running to Khabarovsk.

This will release several hundred of the Czecho-Slovaks for service on the Ussuri front.

Assuming that the Japanese will take responsibility for safeguarding the line from Nikolai to Khabarovsk, there is an apparent need that the Americans provide for the operation of the trans-Siberian railway westward to Manchuria station, where a clash with the enemy is inevitable.

This operation would be under allied supervision and is made possible through the presence of the party of railroad experts under the leadership of John F. Stevens. This party includes 250 men, among whom are railway executives.

The allied commanders are impressed with the fact that the 1200 miles of single track line which constitutes the only communication between the coast and the field of operation, is only 20 per cent efficient.

STUDENT PLAN FAVORED

MILITARY TRAINING SCHEME APPROVED BY SENATE

Youths to Be Sent to College by Draft Boards; May Apply at Once to Institutions.

EUGENE, Or., Aug. 21.—(Special.)—Secretary of War Baker has approved the plan providing that qualified high school graduates and college students may be voluntarily inducted into the Army through draft boards and be sent to college to receive special training, according to a telegram received today from President P. L. Campbell, of the University of Oregon, who is now in Washington, D. C., as secretary-treasurer of the American Council of Education.

This is the first definite step by the War Department in putting into effect the plan to utilize the colleges as schools for officers, doctors and professional men in meeting the military needs of the Nation. Other announcements of a preliminary nature outlining the plans for the organization of the students' Army training corps paved the way for the action of the Secretary of War which makes the educational institutions of the country a part of the great war machine.

The course for students who plan to attend school during the coming year to pursue will be to make applications immediately and secure admission to

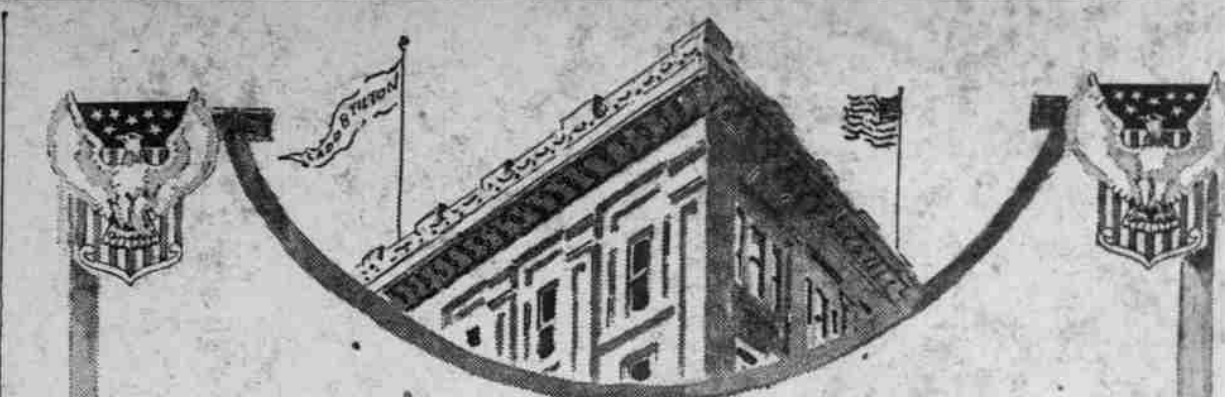
