

CUBORE REPORTED VICTIM OF U-BOAT

American Freight Transport
Reported Torpedoed in
European Waters.

MANY FISHING BOATS LOST

Fleet of Corporation Operating Off
Grand Banks of Newfoundland
Virtually Wiped Out by
German Raider.

NEW YORK, Aug. 22.—A report that the American steamship Cubore, a new vessel of 7151 tons gross register, had been torpedoed in European waters was received in marine circles here today.

The steamer is owned by the Ore Steamship Corporation, but is in the Army transport service carrying freight.

MONTREAL, Aug. 22.—Virtually the entire fleet of the Maritime Fish Corporation has been destroyed by the trawler Triumph, which was captured by a German submarine crew and armed, according to reports to the corporation's office here today.

The fleet was operating off the Grand Banks of Newfoundland. It was composed of boats of both Canadian and American registry.

Eight Possibly Lost.
The exact number of vessels destroyed is not known here, but the corporation's fleet generally consists of eight or nine vessels.

Schooners reported sunk on the Grand Banks up to this time are: Pasadena (Can.), Unap Saunders (Can.), Lucille Schure (Can.), Francis J. O'Hara (Am.), A. Platt Francis (Am.), Sylvia (Can.), Dela Garde (Can.) (not identified).

WASHINGTON, Aug. 22.—Absence of any definite report of activity today on the part of the raider Triumph, the converted steam trawler armed by 16 members of a German U-boat's crew, strengthened the belief held in naval circles that the vessel is no longer on the North Atlantic fishing grounds.

Triumph May Be Sunk.
While numerous dispatches were received during the day detailing the effects of the Triumph's foray into the ranks of the American and Canadian smacks and trawlers, all dealt with sinkings which occurred yesterday and Tuesday night.

The only possible explanation of the failure of naval patrol craft to capture the raider will be that she has been sunk by her crew, possibly after the men have returned to the submarine.

A CANADIAN PORT, Aug. 22.—A German submarine, presumably the craft which captured the Triumph, is operating with the raider trawler, said Captain Jeff Thomas, of the Sylvania, which arrived here in a power dory after his schooner was sunk by the raider. As he and his men rowed away from the craft which the Germans bombed they saw a large submarine lying on the surface two miles away.

AN ATLANTIC PORT, Aug. 22.—A British freight steamship which arrived here today from European waters was attacked by a submarine yesterday afternoon when near Nantucket.

One torpedo was fired by the U-boat which missed the freighter by about 20 yards, members of the crew said.

LONDON, Aug. 21.—Merchant tonnage losses in July due to enemy action and marine risk was 313,011, which makes the total for the quarter ending with July for allied and neutral countries 953,392.

Ships built in British yards and in foreign yards on British account in July reduced the British deficit to 23,311, which compares favorably with the average monthly deficit during the first six months of this year of 96,000 tons.

WASTE HUGE SAYS AIRCRAFT REPORT

Senate Committee Finds Much
to Condemn in Course of
Its Investigation.

PRESENT ACTIVITY PRAISED

Squandering of Millions, Bad Organization, Favoritism to Contractors Some of Faults Laid to Old Organization.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 22.—Strictures on failures, disappointments and delays in the American aircraft programme are coupled with praise for what has been accomplished, and a statement that quantity production may be expected in a long report submitted today by the Senate military subcommittee on its aircraft investigation.

While commenting favorably on reorganization already effected, the committee strongly urges one-man control through the creation of a new department of aviation, headed by a cabinet member.

Waste of millions of dollars, faulty executive organization, improper location of training fields, employment of inexperienced inspectors and favoritism to contractors are among the faults charged to the old organization by the committee.

Continuous Report Made.
The report, Secretary Baker said, explains that questions of individual dishonesty or official corruption were left for investigation to the Department of Justice inquiry directed by Charles E. Hughes.

It was submitted with the unanimous endorsement of Senators who have conducted the inquiry during the last few months—Senators Thomas, of Colorado, chairman, and Senators Reed, of Mississippi; Smith, of Georgia; New, of Indiana, and Frelinghuysen, of New Jersey. After approval by the full military committee it was read to the Senate.

In a statement later commenting on the report, Secretary Baker said the country should be gratified to know that quantity production of airplanes is assured.

Senator Thomas put a letter into the record from Howard E. Coffin, former chairman of the aircraft production board, disclaiming responsibility for himself and other civilian members for actions of Army and Navy officers.

SOLACE HANDED OUT

Hindenburg Tries to Cheer Up
Vanquished Troops.

MARSHAL ADMITS SETBACK

"This Is Fortune of War With Which We Must Reckon," Declares German Commander to Guard Regiment.

AMSTERDAM, Aug. 22.—Field Marshal Hindenburg, addressing the third regiment of guards, is quoted by the Tages Zeitung of Berlin as saying: "Let us look into the future. Our position is favorable, although we have lately happened to be set back. But this is a fortune of war with which we must reckon."

"We must not permit ourselves to be influenced by it. Success is with us. The enemy begins to show signs of weariness and so long as we do not relax our efforts but remain firm of purpose, we shall attain our goal, which is an honorable, strong German peace."

JURY DISAGREES AGAIN

WILLIAM HAMMOND, JR., TO BE
TRIED THIRD TIME.

Defense Claims California Courts Have
No Jurisdiction in Case of
\$30,000 Check.

OAKLAND, Cal., Aug. 22.—(Special.)—After five hours of deliberation, the jury in Superior Judge White's court today failed to reach a verdict, the members standing nine to three for conviction in the case of William Hammond, Jr., Alameda politician and ex-Councilman, accused of complicity with E. L. B. Zimmer and W. H. Hickey in a photo pass a worthless \$30,000 check in Portland.

Zimmer was caught there, released on parole and disappeared. Hickey, the author of the conspiracy, the alleged plot was still being hatched, and was the principal witness for the prosecution. The case will come up next Wednesday to be set for its third trial, the jury in the first trial having also disagreed.

The specific charge against Hammond was conspiracy, and the defense of Hammond's attorneys was that even if it were done the act had been committed in Oregon, leaving the local county courts with no jurisdiction.
