

HARRY McKAY DEAD

Well-Known Physician Passes Away Suddenly.

DOCTOR POPULAR IN CITY

End Comes at Country Home Near Lents Junction—Funeral Will Be Held Sunday Under Auspices of Elks.

Dr. Harry F. McKay, one of the most prominent men in Oregon medical circles, Multnomah County Physician and president of the State Board of Medical Examiners, passed away at 4:45 yesterday afternoon, at his home near Lents Junction. Dr. McKay, who was 56 years of age, suffered a nervous breakdown some five years ago, and had never fully regained his health. Hardening of the arteries was the immediate cause of his death. For some weeks he had been taking a needed rest. It was only a few days ago that his condition became critical, and his somewhat sudden demise was a shock to friends.

Dr. McKay was born in Ireland March 21, 1862. He came to America about 28 years ago. He had long been prominent in the medical profession in Oregon and for the past six years had served on the State Board of Medical Examiners, his present term not expiring until 1920.

Dr. McKay was an active member of a number of fraternal organizations. He was past exalted ruler of Portland Lodge, No. 142, B. P. O. E., and was one of the prominent Elks of the city. At the Elks' convention in 1915 he was chairman of the reception committee, and he was active in securing the handsome new Elks building for the city.

The doctor is survived by his widow, Mrs. Jessie McKay; three sisters and two brothers. Miss Kate McKay has made her home with her brother, and another sister, Mrs. Arabelle Johnston, also resides in Portland. The third sister, Mrs. Maggie Shannon, lives in Belfast, Ireland. The two brothers are William McKay, of Australia, and Robert McKay, manager of the Ulster Bank at Caven, Ireland.

Funeral services will be held Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock from the Elks' lodge rooms. The ceremony will be under B. P. O. E. supervision, and the pall-bearers will all be past exalted rulers of the order. Gus C. Mosser, State Senator, and a close friend of the doctor, is in charge of the funeral arrangements.

BAKER IS FOR SERIES

WAR SECRETARY TO RECOMMEND DELAY TO CROWDER.

Details of Championship Baseball Games Will Be Announced Today, Says Johnson.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23.—It was learned officially today that Secretary Baker will recommend to General Crowder delay in enforcement of the "work or fight" regulations so far as they affect baseball players who will participate in the world series to September 15, in order that these games may be played.

Mr. Baker's decision, which was forecasted by his yesterday, was made soon as he received a communication on the subject from the National Commission. This, it is understood, contained only the request that the regulations be extended to September 15.

CHICAGO, Aug. 23.—President Ben Johnson, of the American League, said tonight the details for the world's series arranged at the special meeting of the National Baseball Commission in Cincinnati probably will be announced tomorrow. Provisions have been made, according to reports, to give a share of the receipts to the charities and to reduce the price of the box seats from \$5 to \$2. Otherwise the usual world's series prices will prevail.

The series, according to the tentative plan, will start on September 4. Chicago has practically won the National League pennant, as today's victory gave the Cubs a lead in 19½ games over New York, runner-up.

AUTO DRIVER IS ARRESTED

Failure to Stop After Running Down Two Boys Charged.

George Misner, of East Sixth and Clay streets, was arrested by Patrolman Rudolph and Shaffer and charged with failing to stop the machine he was driving and giving aid to two small boys run down by him at East Eleventh street and Harrison late yesterday.

It was alleged by eyewitnesses, reported the officers, that the lady was dragged nearly a block by the automobile before Misner brought his machine to a standstill. Although severely bruised and shaken up, the boys were able to proceed to their homes after the accident.

CHECK FORGER IS JAILED

Man Wanted at Grants Pass Is Arrested at Sutherland.

ROSEBURG, Or., Aug. 23.—(Special.)—After an edict chase of 15 miles over the Pacific Highway Wednesday night, Deputy Sheriff Rafferty overtook and arrested C. M. Hall at Sutherland. Sheriff Lewis, of Grants Pass, notified the Sheriff's office here that Hall, in company with a woman, was making his way north in an automobile and that the man was wanted on a charge of passing worthless checks.

Hall reached Roseburg at a late hour and, stopping at a garage for gas, was recognized by the man in charge. Sheriff Rafferty then took up the chase. Hall was turned over to the Grants Pass office.

Brothers Meet After 37 Years.

Among the many reunions effected by the G. A. R. encampment was that of Captain D. C. Daugherty, of Twin Falls, Ida., and Lieutenant F. M. Daugherty, of Nepelem, Wash., brothers who had not seen each other for 37 years. The latter is an early resident of the Nepelem section, having established the first store there. He has traded with the Indians for many years. Captain D. C. Daugherty and an older brother each raised a full company in Iowa, but as that state had already filled its quota they took their men over the boundary and mustered in as part of the Tenth Missouri Infantry. All the brothers saw service under Grant and Sherman.

PUBLIC COST IS HIGHER

PRIVATE INSTITUTIONS CARE FOR CHILDREN CHEAPER.

Figures Given by Dr. W. H. Slingerland, of Russell Sage Foundation, in Address.

Under the auspices of the City Federation of Women's Organizations, Dr. W. H. Slingerland, of the Russell Sage Foundation, who has been making a comprehensive survey of the children's welfare institutions of the state, spoke last night at the Central Library upon "Child Welfare Conditions in Oregon."

Dr. Slingerland reported that there are 21 public institutions in the state of Oregon for children, and 15 private institutions. Of the 15 private institutions 10 are for one year averages \$275 against \$180 per capita for one year in the private institutions.

Dr. Slingerland cited several reasons as to why the state institutions cost more, among them that state institutions are political, and that they are manned by persons who have obtained their positions through political pull. He believes that if the proper steps are taken state institutions may be prevented from becoming purely political.

AUTO DRIVER RESTRICTED

Vancouver Court Decides He Can Drive Between Farm and Town.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Aug. 23.—(Special.)—Ben Carpenter, a youth from Fishers, arrested and charged with driving past a streetcar on Third street, while discharging passengers, knocking down several of them, pleaded not guilty before W. S. T. Dery today. However, he was found guilty and will be prohibited from driving an automobile for hire, or driving a machine at all, except between his farm home and the city. He will be sentenced to 30 days in jail if he violates the instructions of the court, and also had to pay the costs.

Ballet Teacher Is Drafted.

Ivan de Marcel, former ballet teacher and organizer in Portland, who left a few months ago to locate in San Francisco when prosecuted for false statements in his advertising, is being inducted into military service by board No. 2. De Marcel is to be sent to Camp Lewis next week by a board in San Francisco, acting for the local officials.

2 PLATOONS SEPT. 10

Fire Department's New System Soon to Be in Effect.

VOTERS TO SPEAK NOV. 5

Permanent Adoption of Plan Then Will Be Decided—Council to Make Financial Provision After Investigation.

Portland will install the two-platoon system in the Fire Department beginning September 10 to continue until November 7. If approved by the voters at the city election on November 5, the system will become permanent.

The City Council at a special session yesterday amended the original ordinance which was to have gone into effect September 1, in order that sufficient time could be had fully to recruit the department.

Provision for caring for the additional expense incident to the two-platoon system will be made after the City Council has made a more thorough investigation of the city's finances. Some members of the Council believe that an additional levy of four-tenths of 1 mill will be necessary, while others contend that there will be sufficient funds in the treasury to meet the increased cost. A report from City Auditor Funk shows that ample funds are now available to maintain the two-platoon system until the people have had an opportunity to pass on the measure.

Emergency Decides Bigelow. The vote in favor of immediate installation of the measure was unanimous, although City Commissioner Bigelow said he was reluctant to vote for it, without first submitting the measure to the people, but decided to favor it because of the alarming emergency which a report points out as existing in the Portland fire bureau.

Investigation by him, Commissioner Bigelow said, disclosed that 90 additional men are needed to meet the two-platoon requirements. The Fire Bureau is now short 14 regular men, he added, and the two-platoon plan requires 75 additional.

Every member of the firemen's committee present at the meeting yesterday pledged himself to assist in recruiting the department with capable men and also to work in behalf of the proposed measure which will be initiated by the City Council.

New Plan Needed, Says Mayor.

Mayor Baker favored an immediate adoption of the two-platoon system, saying that the matter of funds to maintain it could be determined later. If sufficient funds are available in the treasury, no additional levy will be made. Mayor Baker said that an investigation which he has made shows conclusively that the two-platoon system is necessary for the protection of lives and property.

1079 CLASS 1 MEN LEFT

Call for Selectives for Camp Lewis Will Exhaust Oregon Quota.

Of men immediately available for military duty the state of Oregon has but 1079 on its selective service rolls, according to compilations just made in the department of Captain J. E. Cullison, selective service executive in the Adjutant-General's office. This number includes men of class 1 of the 1917 and 1918 groups who have been passed by the physical examiners and are being held for additional military service.

So far as concerns the present available supply of fighting selectives, the call for 1000 of them to be sent to Camp Lewis the first of next week will deplete it.

RELIEF MAP IS 10 BY 14

Oregon City Man's Product Complete in Minute Detail.
