GENERAL REEBS TO TAKE OVER OFFICE.
 Arrangements were completed yesterday for General Charles F. Reeb to take over the duties of the office of Adjutant-General on Saturday of this week. General Reeb was appointed by Governor Withycombe to succeed Major John M. Williams as acting Adjutant-General. Major Williams has received a commission to active service as a Major in the Adjutant-General's department of the Army. He will report to Camp Lewis within ten days. Colonel John R. Hubbard, of the Oregon National Guard and Oregon Military Police, reported last Friday as having received the same approval for active service yesterday received his commission. It was reported that Captain Walter W. Wilson, now at Newport, Or., also had been approved for such commission.

EXAMINER GOES TO SEQUOIA FOREST.
 A. J. Jaenicke, forest examiner in charge of insect control work in the District Forester's office here, left Friday night for the Sequoia National Forest and National Park in California as the Forest Service representative to co-operate with the bureau of entomology in choosing four or five heavily infested yellow pine areas in which to carry on insect control work and carefully watch results. The final results of the work will be as applicable to the protection of Eastern Oregon yellow pine stands against the ravages of bark beetles as to California pine timber. Mr. Jaenicke will return to Portland during the latter part of September.

REGISTRY BOARD WORKERS NEEDED.
 Draft board officials for division No. 5, comprising the Peninsula and St. Johns districts, are seeking an urgent call for 15 volunteer workers to serve without pay as registrars for the coming work of registering the hundreds of men under the selective service act now pending in Congress and to assist in the heavy office work now before the board. The officials of the board ask that all men and women who will give a part of their time in this volunteer work communicate with the board at the old City Hall building in St. Johns. The call was made yesterday by John R. Easter, secretary of the board.

CHARLES REQUA SOUGHT.—Relatives living in Salt Lake City are seeking the whereabouts of Charles Requa who came to Portland a few weeks ago to find employment. In a letter received from Mrs. T. Requa by Chief of Police Johnson yesterday it is stated that one of his young sons was burned to death when the family home was destroyed by fire recently. Requa is described as being of medium height, heavy set and of dark complexion. Any person knowing of his whereabouts is asked to communicate with Mrs. T. Requa, 165 South Second street, East, Salt Lake City, Utah.

EQUI DEMURRER ARGUED.—An argument on demurrer to indictment in the case against Dr. Marie Equi, well-known local agitator, was heard yesterday by Federal Judge E. C. Campbell and taken under consideration. Dr. Equi was arrested recently for alleged seditious utterances at an I. W. M. meeting. In the argument for demurrer to the indictment, presented yesterday by her attorney, E. Heckbert, it was claimed that nothing in her talk was calculated to obstruct recruiting or enlistment.

NEW DUTIES ASSIGNED.—H. W. Whitney, former principal of Oakley Green School, assumed his new duties as assistant superintendent of Portland schools yesterday, with offices adjoining those of City Superintendent Groot in the Courthouse. W. A. Dickson, former principal of the Woodmere School, will succeed Mr. Whitney at Oakley Green.

MORE PLAYGROUND PROPERTY NEEDED.—Acquisition of more property for the Marquam Gulch public park and playground is sought in another condemnation suit filed yesterday in the Circuit Court by the city of Portland, which demands the condemnation of property belonging to Fred Casper and wife. The owners of the property have failed to come to terms with the city officials.

INJURED SHIPYARD WORKER IMPROVES.—R. H. Lambert, who suffered a fractured skull and collarbone when a beam fell and struck him on the head and shoulder while he was at work last Friday at the Columbia Shipyards, is reported by physicians at the Sellwood hospital where he is confined, to be improving and probably on the road to complete recovery. His condition is yet quite serious.

ALLEGED THIEF BOUND OVER.—T. A. Woodruff, charged with the theft of baggage at Sparks, Nev., was given a hearing yesterday before United States Commissioner Drake and was bound over to Federal Judge Bean for commitment to Nevada. Woodruff was arrested by Portland police and detectives of the Southern Pacific and property alleged to have been stolen was found in his possession.

MILK FUND RECEIVES \$30.—Another substantial contribution to the fund for milk for Belgian babies was made by county traffic violators yesterday. District Judge Jones released all of those charged with minor offenses on condition that they contribute \$1 or more to the milk bottle in Sheriff Hurlburt's office. Something over \$30 was received.

RIGHT TO FIX COAL PRICES GIVEN.—Under powers now extended by the National Fuel Administration, Fred J. Holmes, Oregon fuel administrator, has the right to fix retail coal prices and profit margins in places under his jurisdiction. Authority is granted him also to name committees in districts of the state, which will be vested with the power to set prices. Heretofore coal quotations have been regulated from Washington and largely through the setting of prices at the mines. Under the revised system there is opportunity for the retailers to appeal from decisions of local committees to the state administrator, and the decisions he may make are to go to Washington for review by his superior.

FIGHTERS TO SPEAK

Men From War Zone Will Aid Liberty Loan Drive.

CALL OUT FOR CRUSADERS

Soldiers Who Have Seen Wartime France Are Asked to Volunteer Services and Carry Message to People.

Speakers who have seen wartime France and the trenches of democracy, particularly returned American soldiers and those of our allies, are called by Oregon to volunteer for the fourth Liberty loan campaign soon to open.

In each previous liberty loan drive patriotic impetus and inspiration were imparted by the genuinely stirring messages of men who fought in France. These gave to Oregon a clear vision of the cause for which America has enlisted and the perils and peril confronting the Nation.

The fourth liberty loan will feature in its speaking programme men who have fought overseas, as did the prior campaigns, but particular effort will be made to secure speaking engagements for returned officers and men of the American Expeditionary Force who have either been invalided home or have returned on official missions.

Oregon Campaigners Sought.
 Oregon will recruit most of her own speakers, though several will be assigned to the state by Allen L. Chickering, district director of speakers, from headquarters at San Francisco. It is believed by the local committee on speakers, of which Edgar B. Piper is chairman, that many excellent campaigners who have seen active service may be discovered near home.

Not only are returned soldiers desired as liberty loan speakers, but citizens who have visited the war zone and who are ready to volunteer as message bearers, will be pressed into campaign service. Persons having knowledge of returned soldiers or citizens who have visited the war zone are asked to communicate with liberty loan officials.

The veterans themselves are called upon to volunteer for speaking service by communicating with liberty loan headquarters, 222 Northwestern Bank building, Milton R. Klepper, state director of the speakers' bureau, or Edgar B. Piper, chairman.

Veterans of the French and British armies spoke in Portland and throughout the state during the last liberty loan and awakened great enthusiasm. Though it is probable that similar assistance will be given during the coming campaign, the message for the most part will be conveyed by officers and men who have followed the Stars and Stripes into action against the Hun.

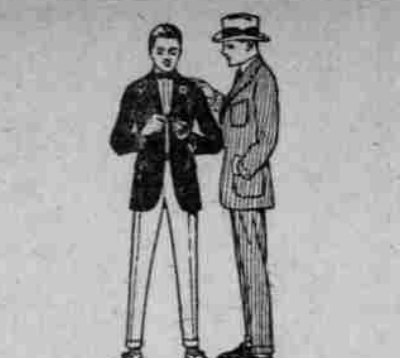
