

PERMITS EXPECTED

Kenton Traction Franchise Is Counted Probable.

ACTION IS DUE TOMORROW

County Commissioners and Company Officials to Confer Relative to Use of Approach to Interstate Bridge.

Final action on the franchise application of the Kenton Traction Company for use of the Derby street approach to the Interstate bridge probably will be taken tomorrow morning, when the County Commissioners will meet with the traction company officials at the Courthouse. At a conference yesterday practically all the details of the franchise were adjusted, but Chairman Holman asked for time in which to decide whether he would insist on remuneration for the county. The Kenton Traction Company, represented by C. C. Colt, president, and Charles H. Carey, counsel, held that the county should grant free right of way under certain restrictions. Both officials called attention to the fact that their company originally had given Multnomah County free right of way for the construction of the Derby street approach, and all they now seek is permission to use a 15-foot strip of this land for the tracks of their company.

Purpose of Line Stated.
Both Mr. Colt and Judge Carey assured the county officials that the Kenton Traction Company is not a money-making concern, and that the sole purpose in operating this three-mile line is to serve the growing industries in the Peninsula district. They declared it needed now to serve workers employed at the Foundation shipyard.

"We do not even own our rolling stock," asserted Mr. Colt. "We rent our streetcars."
Under the terms of agreement reached orally yesterday the county will pave that portion of the right of way occupied by the tracks of the Kenton Traction Company when it is found that this paving is necessary. The company agrees to maintain this stretch of pavement. Whether the traction company shall pay some annual rental for the right of way, after the paving is laid, will not be determined until the conference tomorrow.

Fare Might Be Reduced.
Judge Carey agreed that some provision might be made whereby the fare over the Kenton line would be reduced at a later date if it should be found that the company is earning more than 8 percent interest on its investment, although he cautioned the board that in his opinion it would be many years before such an earning would be realized, if at all.

Commissioner Muck expressed willingness to grant the franchise without any rental restrictions. He held that the county should assist the traction company in building up the Peninsula district and incidentally help promote the war work under way there. Drafts of franchisees made by District Attorney Evans and Judge Carey are being carefully considered and it is believed that a suitable permit will be agreed upon at the conference tomorrow.

DAY'S REGISTRATION LIGHT

Draft Boards Report Little Doing in Monday Enrollment.

Few youths of the latest 21-year-old selective draft class were enrolled in Portland yesterday, or in the state, according to meager reports last night. The day was set aside for registration of youths whose religious scruples prevented their enrollment on Saturday. The aggregate locally is estimated at 20 to 25 new registrants.

Scattering returns from state boards indicate that the aggregate of new draft eligibles—those who have become 21 since June 5—will be somewhat above 700.
In June the seven counties reported 640 young men. They registered 120 already listed under the new registration. The comparative results, with the latest registration given first, are: Clackamas, 43 and 185; Clatsop, 187; Douglas, 22 and 124; Gilliam, 6 and 33; Hood River, 8 and 25; Lincoln, 2 and 22; Tillamook, 8 and 54.

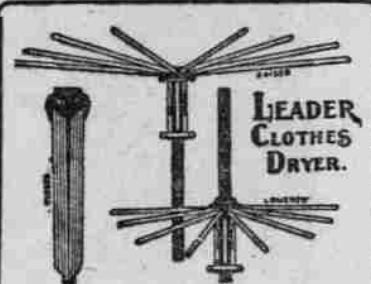

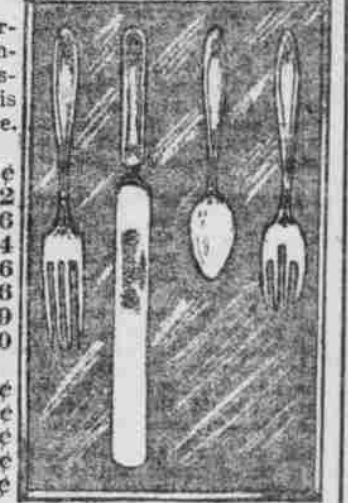

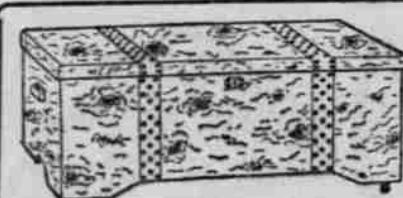
