M. ALBERT IS DEFENDANT—M. Albert, former manager of the Western Salvage and Machinery Company, is the defendant in two suits filed yesterday in the Circuit Court by his former employers. In one the company demands judgment for \$10,000 for damages alleged to have been sustained in July when Albert started attachment proceedings against it. In the other, the company seeks the return of \$1500, which it paid to Albert for stock which he held in the concern. The complaint states that Albert induced the company to pay that amount for stock which was only worth \$100. Fraudulent representations on his part are charged.

ASTORIA FINEST \$100—One hundred dollars was the fine imposed yesterday in Federal Court upon Peter Stanovich, an Austrian, arraigned for the hoarding of flour in violation of the orders of the Federal Food Administration. United States Attorney Hanev asked for leniency in the case, as it was apparent that Stanovich, who does not speak English, was unaware of the nature of his offense. The board was discovered in the case, as it was Fifteenth and Oregon streets and comprised 16 sacks of flour. Stanovich maintained that that was all he had, but that a neighbor had an equal share in the cached flour.

W. K. NEWELL GOES EAST—W. K. Newell, assistant Federal Food Administrator for Oregon, left yesterday afternoon for Washington, D. C., where he will attend a conference of state administrators with Federal Food Administrator Hoover. The dates set for the conference are September 4 and 5. The new conference will discuss rationing, price publications, sugar rationing, price and distribution of flour, price and distribution of mill and other feeds, and distribution of all products, are some of the subjects which will be discussed. Mr. Newell expects to return to Portland about September 15.

NEOLITHIC CAMPER FIRED—Warning of a neolithic camper was found in the fine imposed upon Camille M. daniel, who left a campfire burning in the Wenatchee National Forest. Madaniel, who is a packer for a stock-raising outfit, was found with his camp to go into town for supplies and neglected to extinguish the fire. The blaze spread over a small area and might have done considerable damage, had it not been discovered by Forest employees. Judge Davis, of Leavenworth, Wash., fined Madaniel \$10 and costs.

LETTERMAN AYER ARRIVES SAFELY—"OVER THERE"—Lieutenant Frank A. Ayer, commissioned in the airplane service, has arrived safely overseas, according to a telegram received by his sister, Mrs. Lee Davenport, 845 East Madison street. Lieutenant Ayer, who was a mining engineer with the Arizona Copper Company, visited in Portland a year ago and has many friends here. The telegram to his sister was forwarded, upon his return to New York, by the captain of the transport on which Lieutenant Ayer crossed.

EX-CONVICT PLEADS GUILTY—Clark Schrader, an ex-convict from the Washington State Penitentiary, yesterday pleaded guilty to an indictment charging him with forging a mortgage. He was sentenced by Presiding Judge Tucker to an indeterminate term of from six months to two years in the State Penitentiary. Schrader was returned from Washington a week ago upon his completion of a term for forgery. The local indictment was returned against him in 1916.

PERMANENT APPOINTMENT MADE—Miss Irma Lambrecht, who has been on temporary detail in the district office of the United States Forest Service, has now been transferred permanently to the North Pacific district. Until coming to Portland, Miss Lambrecht was employed in the Missoula, Mont., office of the service.

SALARIES TO BE INCREASED—Salary increases affecting 14 deputies in the office of County Clerk Beveridge will be granted this morning by the County Commissioners. All deputies heretofore receiving \$110 to \$120 are increased to \$125, under the salary increase agreed upon yesterday. These increases will not affect the Circuit Court clerks.

ASSISTANT DISTRICT FORESTER BACK—C. J. Buck, assistant district forester, has just returned to the Portland office of the Forest Service after a several weeks' inspection trip through the Deschutes, Ochoco and Fremont National Forests. The trip was made in the interests of fire protection.

FINE IS \$25—Charles Malarkey, arrested for marketing catfish on which the tax had not been paid and which were not properly tagged by the State Fish and Game Commission, pleaded guilty to the charge against him and Monday was fined \$25 and costs.

CHESTER WILCOX DIES—Chester Wilcox, a native of Portland, died of pneumonia in Palo Alto, Cal., Monday, August 26. He was a graduate of Oregon Agricultural College and for many years had charge of the poultry department of one of the state institutions at Salem. At the time of his death he was connected with the Leland Stanford University. He was 38 years of age and leaves a widow and a mother. The body will be sent to Salem for burial.

BOAT COOK IS DROWNED—Bert Jones, a cook employed on the steamer Undine, fell from a gangplank when walking over to the steamer Anna Cummings, at the foot of Alder street yesterday and was drowned. City Grappler Brady searched several hours for the body, but was unable to find it. Jones was 34 years old and married. His wife, employed on the Undine as stewardess, saw her husband fall and gave the alarm.

SHOPMAN DIES OF INJURIES—G. E. Peterson, an employee at the Williams Iron & Steel Works, died late yesterday at St. Vincent's Hospital from injuries received while working in one of the shops. A piece of iron pipe fell a distance of 30 feet, striking him on his head and fracturing his skull. The body was removed to the morgue. Mr. Peterson was 41 years old and married. His home was at 4305 Fifty-fourth street, Southeast.

JAMES FUNERAL IS HELD—The funeral of Lawrence Jackson James, son of Mrs. Ellen James, 1110 East Fifty-third street, was held yesterday, burial being in Rose City Park Cemetery. Mr. James had served some time in the Navy and on the same day he received his honorable discharge, August 19, he was killed by electrocution in an accident at the Atlas powder plant, Baltimore. Six men detailed from naval headquarters acted as pallbearers.

ORPHAN BOY NEEDS CLOTHING—A 14-year-old orphan boy, a ward of the Pacific Coast Rescue and Protective Society, is in need of clothing and shoes before the opening of the school term. CAMPERS INCREASE FIRE HAZARD—The large number of people on week-end outings in the mountains, coupled with the present dry weather, greatly increase the forest fire hazard, according to the Portland office of the United States Forest Service. All excursionists are cautioned to use the utmost care in selecting places for campfires and are warned to extinguish all fires before breaking camp.

HERBERT BAKER PROMOTED—Another Portland boy who has just achieved a promotion through capable service on the western front is Herbert Baker, a former employee of the Knight Shoe Company. In a letter to Will Knight, young Baker, who accompanied the National Guard units to the border during the Mexican crisis, tells of his advancement to the rank of sergeant.

MRS. COSTELLA BOYD—Mrs. Lila E. Costella, of 415 East Yamhill street, arrested Monday on a charge of stealing \$675 from J. Knowlton, who has been occupying apartments in the same building, was bound over to the grand jury by Municipal Judge Rossman yesterday. Her bail was reduced from \$1500 to \$1000.

GARAGE FIRE COSTLY—Fire starting from a defective battery, a garage fire caused damage of about \$3000 early yesterday morning in the garage of Regner & Fleider, Grand avenue and East Burnside street. Twelve cars were more or less damaged before the fire was extinguished. Engine No. 7 and truck No. 4 responded.

STATEMENTS ARE DUE

RETURNS AS TO CORPORATION TAXES BEING RECEIVED.

Extension of Time to September 30
Granted Regarding Figures as to Capital Stock.

Returns are being received at the offices of the United States Collector of Internal Revenue on the 10 percent tax against undistributed net incomes of corporations, due August 25, and blanks are now being sent out to various corporations and the compilation of returns on the capital stock tax.

Returns are due 60 days after the expiration of six months from the close of the calendar year or the fiscal year, as the case may be, making the date August 29 in a majority of cases. On the capital stock tax returns were due originally July 31, but an extension of time was granted to September 30, because blanks had been delayed in delivery from Washington. These are now being sent out to the various corporations doing business in the state.

The capital stock tax exempts capitalization up to and including \$25,000. Remaining capitalization is taxable at the rate of 50 cents per \$1000 of stock. In cases of illness or absence of necessary officers and when notification is given before the expiration of the period set, extension for a period of 30 days will be granted.

WAR WORK WILL BE SEEN
of Honor at Chamber of Commerce Luncheon on Saturday.

Distinguished Visitors to Be Guests
of Honor at Chamber of Commerce Luncheon on Saturday.

Members of the Italian Press Mission to America, guests of the United States and touring the country in charge of Robert Whiting, member of the committee on public information, are scheduled to arrive in Portland Friday night. The party consists of seven of the leading editors and publishers of Italy, Dr. Cassuto, Dr. A. Agresti, Dr. L. Vitti, Dr. A. Pedrini, Dr. F. Cappa, Dr. F. Raineri, and Dr. P. Solari. The visitors will spend Saturday and Sunday in Portland, leaving Sunday night for Seattle.

Arrangements for the entertainment of the distinguished guests were completed at a meeting of the committee held yesterday afternoon at the Chamber of Commerce. The members of the reception committee are: Robert W. Schmeier, chairman; Mayor Baker, C. W. Hodson, M. G. Montezza, Edgar B. Piper, C. S. Jackson, Albert B. Ferrara, J. E. Wheeler, John K. Kollock, Otto Colletto and Mrs. Alice Benson Beach.

Delegations of the local Italian societies will meet the visitors at the Union Station upon their arrival and escort them to the Portland Hotel, Saturday morning at 8 o'clock they will be taken to Vancouver to inspect the spruce cut-out plant, returning to the Liberty Temple at 11:45, where there will be a brief address by speakers of the party. At 12:15 the members of the party will be guests of honor at the Chamber of Commerce. Robert W. Schmeier will preside and Mayor Baker will welcome the visitors to Portland. Some of the talented Italian representatives will speak and Henry L. Corbett, president of the Chamber of Commerce, will tell of Portland's part in war work.

At 1:30 the official party will proceed to the yard of the Northwest Steel Company for an inspection of that plant and will proceed thence for a trip through Portland harbor to the Grant Smith-Porter ship plant, which they will visit. Thereafter they will be shown the Eastern and Western sawmill and plant. At 3:00 P. M. there will be a parade of the Italian organizations of Portland from the Courthouse to Liberty Temple and a programme of speaking. At 8:00 o'clock an address will be delivered by Countess Madeline de Brigny.

Sunday morning there will be no special entertainment, but at 1:30 P. M. occupying official cars driven by girls of the Motor club, the party will be taken over the Columbia River Highway.

During the trips arranged under the official programme the guests of honor will be accompanied by Governor Withycombe, Brigadier-General Beebe, Colonel Disque or Major Stearns, Colonel Van Way and Bert E. Haney, United States Attorney.

SCHEE TO MANAGE FAIR

INTERSTATE EVENT TO OPEN AT PRINEVILLE OCTOBER 1.

Arrangements Made to Furlough Director of Former Fairs From Army Service to Permit Services.

PRINEVILLE, Or., Aug. 27.—(Special.)—The Oregon Interstate Fair will be held in this city, October 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5, and from present indications it will surpass all previous like events held in Prineville. R. L. Schee, who acted as manager for the last three years, is now in the Army at Camp Lewis. Arrangements have been made whereby he will take care of the advance work on the fair while at Camp Lewis, but will be granted a furlough next month to come here and take active charge of the fair.

One reason why the fair this year should excel all previous fairs is that the railroad is now completed into Prineville and will be in operation before fair week. The Interstate fair has without question been the largest fair in Oregon for the past three years and is growing each year. This year's livestock show will be the best ever and in fact the exhibits in all departments will be up to the standard.

TIMBER RIGHTS BOUGHT

2700 ACRES IN NORTH BEND DISTRICT INVOLVED IN DEAL.

Glasgow Coal & Timber Company Sells to Bay Park Lumber Company.

Operations to Start.

NORTH BEND, Or., Aug. 27.—(Special.)—The Bay Park Lumber Company of this city has closed a deal with the Glasgow Coal & Timber Company for the purchase of the timber on its property across the bay from this city. The tract is known locally as the Glasgow townsite holding and embraces some 2700 acres of land, a part of which is timbered. The property is situated in the North Bend district and is estimated that there are about 26,000,000 feet of merchantable timber on the property, a part of which is old-growth fir and spruce of superior quality. Active logging operations under the supervision of W. T. Pierce, a well-known logger of this section, will begin at once and the logs will be used to fill large orders for ship timbers and airplane material now being cut by the Bay Park mill.

The Glasgow Coal & Timber Company is composed of several prominent Portland business men, among them being Charles Ladd, ex-Senator Jonathan Bourne, O'Brien and former Governor Mitchell, and the property involved in the present deal was acquired by the company more than 20 years ago.

Large coal outcroppings have been discovered on the property and eminent geologists who have examined the indications report that there are millions of tons of high-grade subbituminous coal contained in the deposits. It is reported that negotiations are now under way with Eastern capital for the purchase of the property when the timber is logged off, with a view of developing the coal deposits.

NEUTRALS CAN WITHDRAW

Chance Is Given Holders of First Papers to Forego Citizenship.

Subjects of neutral countries who have taken out first papers in the United States and now prefer not to be amenable to military duty have the prerogative of withdrawing their declaration. By doing this they automatically debar themselves from ever becoming American citizens.

The forms on which the declarant swears to take the decision to forego the opportunity of completing citizenship are now being distributed from the office of Captain J. E. Cullison, state selective service examiner. There has been much agitation for the eventual deportation of those who take advantage of the privilege, but Congress has not yet authorized such procedure.

Albertina Kerr Nursery and Louise Rescue Home to Benefit.

The society has been authorized by the coordination committee of the State Council of Defense to hold this day for the benefit of the Albertina Kerr Nursery and the Louise Rescue Home and the other philanthropic and rescue work done by the organization.

ELECTRICAL SCHOOL PLAN

Workers Will Be Trained for Service Under State University Direction.

An electrical school will be opened this Fall in Portland, under the direction of the University of Oregon, according to J. E. Caine, electrical inspector for the city, and all men who have served an apprenticeship of three years in the electrical field are eligible for entrance.

Preparation of men for service for the Government is the main object and more than 200 men are expected to enroll.
