

G. O. P. RETAINS ITS CONTROL IN MAINE

Early Returns Indicate That Senator Fernald and Four Congressmen Win.

LEGISLATURE SEEMS SAFE

Democrats Cut Deeply Into Republican Vote; Much Interest Exists in Today's Primary in Washington State.

PORTLAND, Me., Sept. 9.—The Democrats made deep inroads in the Republican vote in the election in Maine today, but early returns indicated that they had failed to wrest control from the Republicans.

On the face of figures from five-sixths of the state it appeared that Senator Fernald and four Republican Congressmen had been returned to office.

Senator Fernald ran far ahead of the remainder of the ticket. The indications were that he would have a margin of well over 15,000 votes.

For Governor, the Milliken plurality appeared likely to reach 7000.

Figures for 659 precincts out of 656 in the state gave: For Senator Fernald, 49,628; For Governor, 49,588; For Representative—Milliken, 75,782; McIntire, 43,482.

Early patriotic returns indicated that the Republicans would continue in control in both branches.

SEATTLE, Wash., Sept. 9.—(Special.)—The state-wide primary election tomorrow has attracted little attention and interest despite the fact that five Congressmen and five Judges of the State Supreme Court are to be nominated, as well as the members who will compose the House and part of the Senate of the next Legislature.

Little Opposition Likely. In the First, Second and Third Congressional Districts, Representatives John F. Miller, Lin H. Hadley and Albert Johnson, Republican, are without serious opposition and will be re-nominated.

In the Fourth District Representative W. L. La Follette, Republican, will probably be re-nominated.

McCroskey Wins on Democratic Side. The Democratic candidate will be Will E. McCroskey, of Palouse.

In the Fifth District, Judge J. Stanley Webster, Republican, who resigned from the Supreme Court, has the closest race for Congress.

Webster Conceded Winner. Judge Webster is generally conceded the winner in the Republican primaries.

HELENA, Mont., Sept. 9.—Declaring that "we deplore the seeming efforts that are being made in certain quarters by the party in power in the Nation to use the war as a means of promoting party advantage and gaining party power," the platform reported to the Republican state convention here today promises to use "the force and power of our organization to the utmost in aiding the vigorous and efficient prosecution of the war."

The platform condemns the fixing of prices for wheat and wool while no price is fixed for cotton, and recommends the fixing of prices for wheat flour substitutes. It indorses National and state prohibition and woman suffrage.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 9.—Army casualties given out today by the War Department total 784, of which 92 were killed in action, 29 died of wounds, 462 were wounded and 136 are missing. The total casualties to date are 28,261.

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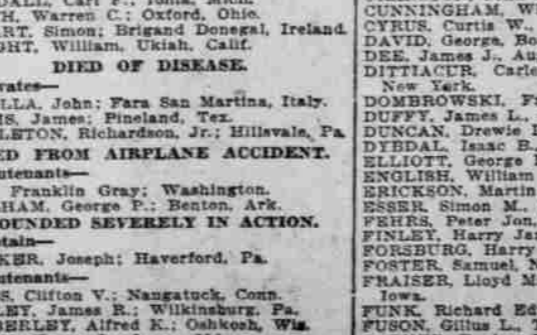
