

MADDOX SUGGESTS CHANGE IN SURTAX

Partial Exemption of Liberty Bond Income Regarded as Necessary.

STABLE MARKET AIMED AT

Proposal Made in Letter to Chairman Kitchin That Limit on Holdings of Savings Certificates Be Raised to \$2,000,000.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 10.—Partial exemption of income on Liberty bonds from surtaxes was recommended today by Secretary Maddox as a necessary means of stabilizing the market price of these bonds without raising the interest rate on them.

Rise in Rates Alternative.

Mr. Maddox did not suggest the extent to which this exemption should be applied. If the high surtaxes contemplated in the pending revenue bill are applied flatly to income from Liberty bonds, Mr. Maddox intimated that it would be necessary to raise the interest rate above 4 1/2 per cent in order to avoid further depression of the market price of the bonds.
